Railhead Army's Announced Plan For Camp White

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army said Friday it will establish a railhead in the former contentment and warehouse area of Camp White, near Medford, Ore., "in the near future."

It will acquire about 834 acres of land now privately owned.

"The facility will be used only in the event of mobilization," the announcement said.

"It is not planned to station any troops at Camp White at this time."

"Under present plans, basic utility systems, access roads, spur rail line and communications system will be rehabilitated or constructed."

"This will be done that the time required to construct an emergency type camp in the event of mobilization will be reduced to a minimum."

Camp White originally was established in 1942 for the training of armored and infantry divisions.

At that time the installation totaled more than 65,000 acres.

The camp was declared excess to army needs in 1946, and was mostly disposed of as surplus.

Scholarship Rewards Youth Driving Champ

WASHINGTON (AP) — You can relax now, men. A steady-nerved 18-year-old boy is the teen-age automobile driving champion. Those girls some men feared might win and humiliate the male race were far behind.

Martin G. Desilets of Longmeadow, Mass., who can drive a car unswervingly down a line — and then back straight along it, too — won the first national teen-age Road-to title yesterday with an amazing display of control and driving skill.

He defeated 34 other state champions — including two girls — by piling up 861.18 points out of a possible 1,000. That's 27 points better than the runnerup, Milton J. Vaverek of Pontiac, Mich.

Martin, who has been driving for two years and five months, finished the way a champion should. He started out only so-so on the written tests, but when it came to testing driving skills, he was superb.

He scored 375.70 points out of a possible 400, far ahead of anyone else in this department.

Almost Perfect
The simplest looking test proved to be the hardest. It consisted of driving a car in a straight line, and stopping it so that the bumper — and then the wheels — would be inches from a finish line.

Almost all contestants had trouble with this, losing as high as two-thirds of their points here, Desilets was almost perfect.

In the celebrated tennis ball test, in which a driver had to drive a car between balls set so closely together only an inch and a half clearance was left on each side, the champ did all right, too. He knocked off only four.

His reward: A \$1,000 scholarship which he'll use at the University of Virginia.

Vaverek got a \$500 scholarship. Fighting through to victory is no novelty for him incidentally. He was a victim of polio which left one of his legs shorter than the other. But he proved that need be no insurmountable obstacle.



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Abandons Home, Business Because Of Reds' Conduct

HONG KONG (AP) — A Chinese drug store owner who reached Hong Kong from Shanghai said today his store was so firmly in the hands of Communist workers "I had to ask permission to take an aspirin."

The pharmacist is Carl Chang who attended the University of Wisconsin and Massachusetts Institute of Technology in the 1940s. He owned one of the largest dispensaries on Shanghai's famous Avenue Joffre.

He said he got out of the Red-controlled city on the pretext of going to Hong Kong to buy more supplies. Even so it took several weeks to receive an exit permit.

Once here Chang said he has abandoned his home and business and wants no more of communism. He said his nine workers discovered that by allying themselves with a district unit of the Communist party, they could get control of Chang's drug business after a year. The owner said that while his store was making money, he was permitted to take only minimum wages, although he was forced to continue as operator and manager and take all responsibility.

He said the profits did not go to the workers. They went to the Communist party either through forced donations, fines or taxes. Chang said he continued on his job, hoping for a turn for the better until a government campaign early this year against private owners. After that he said he decided there was no use and got out of China as quickly as he could.
