

Sage Grouse Hunting Opens

Sage Grouse hunting opened Saturday in Harney, Malheur and Lake counties to herald the oncoming bird and game season. Most of the state's hunters are oiling their rifles for the deer and elk season. The deer season opens Oct. 1 on animals having not less than a forked antler. Elk hunting starts Nov. 1, in all but the Baker area of Eastern Oregon. Meanwhile, archers get a head start in several areas of the state on both deer and elk. The season for them in all of the following designated areas opens Sept. 13.

Sox Lead League; Playoffs Remain

The fabulous 1952 baseball season ended Sunday and the Drain Black Sox wrapped up one of the two championships handed out by the Southwestern Oregon League every year.

Only the post-season Shaughnessy Playoffs at North Bend remain to punctuate the League activity with a period. If the Sox win that sudden-death set, they will have all the marbles in their first year of SWO competition.

A little juggle in the final League standings threw the Medford Cheney Studs into third place and put them first on the Drain firing line for the opening round of the Playoffs Sunday afternoon.

Up to the last weekend, the Studs were mathematical contenders for Drain's top spot in the standings, but that was settled at North Bend when the Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks swept them back with a double loss.

The mighty Lumberjack slugs beat Terry Maddox, 5-4, in a Saturday game and Paul Gehrmann, 9-3, in a Sunday tilt. This moved the Jacks into second place and set the stage for a Shaughnessy Playoff championship between the two most pyrotechnic clubs in the League, the Jacks and Sox.

In the Sunday eliminations, the Drain Sox draw a bead on the Studs, who will try for the fifth time this year to overcome Roy Helsers' loaded squad. They failed in the first four attempts.

In the second game Sunday afternoon, the Lumberjacks will take on the Bandon Millers, who completed their season a week ago. The final note on the season gave Coquille a pair of wins over Brookings. This brought Brookings' season total of League losses to 23. But it was no complete blank for the Beavers. They beat Bandon once for their only victory.

In the second Coquille-Brookings game, it appeared the Beavers might end the season on a happy note with their second win. They led, 4-0, going into the bottom of the seventh inning, but Coquille exploded with 10 runs in that frame and for Brookings it

was a rainout. A double-header was scheduled Tuesday with Guy Fletcher, an old Seattle moundsman, facing veteran Al Widmar in the opener.

Portland manager Clay Hopper tapped Lyman Linde to oppose Glenn Elliott at Sacramento.

Hollywood is scheduled against Los Angeles at Hollywood and Oakland will face San Francisco in Seals' Stadium.

Rams Ready For Cards In Portland

PORTLAND (Special) — The Los Angeles Rams, who upheld their prestige as world's football champions with a recent victory over the College All-Stars, are ready to place the mightiest of offensive machine the game has ever known on display for the first time in the Pacific Northwest.

The Rams will meet the Chicago Cardinals here at Multnomah Stadium Saturday night in a game which is almost certain to lure a capacity crowd.

President Harry Glickman of Oregon Sports Attractions, promoter of the banner gridiron encounter, announced Monday that the advance ticket sale has been "amazing."

He pointed out, however, that a sellout isn't expected until game time and that several thousand good reserved seats are still available here at the box office at J. K. Gill's as well as by mail through OSA in the Dekum Building.

5000 general admission tickets, priced at \$2, will be placed on sale at the stadium ticket office at 9 a.m. Saturday.

It was the magic passing arm of Norm Van Brocklin, the former University of Oregon All-American which brought the Rams their victory over the All-Stars, just as it produced the win over the Cleveland Browns last year for the professional championship.

Although he alternates with Bob Waterfield at quarterback, Coach Joe Stydahar has announced that Van Brocklin will get the starting call against the Cardinals.

PORTLAND (AP) — The Chicago Cardinals scheduled their first workout here Tuesday in preparation for Saturday night's professional football game with the Los Angeles Rams.

The Cardinals, minus former University of San Francisco star Ollie Matson who was delayed by an interview with his draft board, arrived here Monday and set up headquarters at the University of Portland. The Rams are due Thursday.

The game will be played in Multnomah Stadium.

Drain Grid Team Starts Training

V. Trucks Hurls Second No-Hitter

Virgil (Fire) Trucks was riding on the clouds Tuesday but if the double no-hit pitcher of the Detroit Tigers was going around in circles, who could blame him?

The 33-year-old righthander, suffering his poorest season in the Majors, suddenly finds himself in the pitchers' mythical Hall of fame, joining Johnny VanderMeer and Allie Reynolds on a special pedestal, reserved for those who achieve two no-hitters in the same season.

Trucks Monday held the New York Yankees hitless at the Stadium and won 1-0 in a sensational thrill-packed performance that cut the world champions' American League lead to one game over the Cleveland Indians, who defeated Washington, 7-2.

The classic came just three months and 10 days after he handcuffed the Washington Senators without a hit or a run on May 15.

A seventh inning double by Walter Dropo followed by Steve Souchock's single off rookie Bill Miller provided Trucks with the winning margin. It was his third 1-0 triumph and his first victory since he hurled a one-hitter against the Senators July 22. In that game only a leadoff single by Eddie Yost deprived him of a third no-hitter.

It was not until the Yankees were going to bat in the seventh inning that Trucks learned he had a no-hitter going.

In the third inning, Phil Rizzuto's simple grounder to short was fielded cleanly by Johnny Pesky but Pesky bobbled it in his glove and failed to catch Rizzuto at first.

The official scorer first called it an error, then reversed himself and called it a hit, and after telephoning Pesky in the dugout, changed his mind again in the seventh and called it an error.

The Brooklyn Dodgers just about killed the Cardinals' slim pennant chances, sweeping both ends of a day-night St. Louis doubleheader, 3-1 and 9-5 to boost their National League lead to 10 1/2 games.

The New York Giants slipped past the Cardinals into second place despite a 3-0 loss to Cincinnati.

Granny Hamner's homer with two on in the 10th gave the Philadelphia Phils a 6-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs in the Majors' only other game.

No other games were scheduled.
