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Stevenson Delivers Fighting Address Texas GOP Nominates Democrats

Marshall's Attackers,
Bad Use Of Patriotism
Denounced To Legion

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Adlai Stevenson coldly accused the attackers of Gen. George C. Marshall today of hiding under a cloak of patriotism which he called "the last refuge of scoundrels."

The Democratic presidential nominee did not use any names but he left no doubt that one of the main targets of his bitter blast was Republican Sen. Joseph McCarthy of Wisconsin — one-time recipient of an American Legion award for Americanism.

McCarthy has accused Marshall, former secretary of state and former secretary of defense, of being party to a plot against the security of his own country.

Stevenson launched his surprise statement in a speech written for the American Legion convention meeting in Madison Square Garden, where GOP presidential nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower spoke only two days ago.

Also, Stevenson figuratively wagged a finger under the Legion's nose and told them he would not submit to any pressures from the Legion if he thought their demands were "excessive or in conflict with the public interest."

Rankin Defeated For Seventeenth Congress Term

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Rep. John Rankin, the last of Mississippi's old-school white supremacists and denouncer of Yankees, has lost his seat to his former colleague Rep. Thomas Abernethy.

Rankin and Abernethy were opponents because the State Legislature combined their districts last April to eliminate a congressional seat lost in the 1950 census.

Rankin conceded defeat early today after unofficial returns from 341 of the district's 358 precincts in yesterday's state Democratic primary showed:

Abernethy, 26,903.
Rankin, 20,568.

The 49-year-old Abernethy was reserved about dethroning the 70-year-old dean of the Mississippi congressional delegation, who was seeking his 17th term in the House of Representatives.

Rankin, chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, was co-author of the bill creating the Tennessee Valley Authority and author of the measure creating the permanent House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Abernethy, a senior member of the House Agriculture Committee, based his campaign on two issues: his position in Congress to aid farmers and his comparative youth.

'Free' Prisoner Found Stuck In Jail Hole

CASSOPOLIS, Mich. (AP) — Robert Miller is free Wednesday, but still in jail.

The 130-pound, 22-year-old Miller got stuck Monday night as he attempted to wiggle through an eight inch square opening at the bottom of his cell bars.

It was 15 hours later when they finally got him unstuck — with a blowtorch.

Miller, who has served about 40 days of a 60-day bid check sentence, claimed to Sheriff Edgar Probst he wasn't trying to escape: "Just wanted to see if I could get outside."

The sheriff had a different idea, particularly after finding strips from a mattress woven into a rope and an iron bar missing from a mess table in Miller's cell.

Eisenhower's Remark Draws Fire Of Synod

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's reference to "man's brotherhood" struck fire at the 15th General Synod of the Bible Presbyterian Church.

The synod telegraphed Eisenhower yesterday that the phrase is being used by Communists to "condition our people for the so-called brotherhood and solidarity of a socialist order."

The action was proposed by Dr. Carl McIntire, Collinswood, N.J., president of the International Council of Christian Churches.

Eisenhower in his speech Monday to the American Legion convention in New York said that to combat communism Americans must "preach and practice the truly revolutionary values of man's dignity, man's freedom, man's brotherhood under the fatherhood of God."

Recreation Building Ban To Lift Next April

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government disclosed Tuesday that, effective next April, it will lift a two-year ban on building race tracks, pool halls and all recreation facilities. This will be part of a general liberalizing of all construction curbs.

TO AVERT RED COUP U.S. Offers Cash, Britain Relaxation Of Blockade To End Iranian Oil Dispute

LONDON (AP) — Informed sources said the United States and Britain submitted broad proposals to Iran Wednesday designed to settle the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute and avert a possible Red coup in the troubled Iranian kingdom.

The proposals were said to provide for an emergency American aid program and some important British concessions to the government of Premier Mohammed Mossadegh in the festering 18-month-old row.

U. S. Ambassador Loy Henderson and British Charge d' Affaires George Middleton conferred with Mossadegh for three hours Wednesday in what the informants here described as the weightiest Western bid to end the deadlock yet made. The informants gave this account:

Henderson told Mossadegh the United States is ready to pitch in several million dollars worth of aid to tide Iran over her immediate economic difficulties.

Middleton indicated Britain is prepared to enter direct talks on the vital question of compensation

Party Lines Hurdled In Attempt To Carry State For Eisenhower

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Republicans seeking to crush Texas' vote for Eisenhower hurdled ancient party lines and snuffed out the hottest internal feud in state GOP history.

Their convention here Tuesday named a full ticket of already nominated Democrats as Republican candidates for state offices, an action unprecedented in Texas politics.

It healed a threatened split by a series of conciliatory moves and considerable back-slapping — all in an effort to present a solid front for Eisenhower.

Nominated as Democrat-Republicans were Gov. Allan Shivers for governor; Atty. Gen. Daniel for U.S. senator; former Rep. Martin Dies for congressman-at-large. Along with them went the full slate named by the Democrats in July for other state offices.

Their names, under a new Texas law, will go on the November election ballot both as Republicans and Democrats unless the individual candidates withdraw.

To meet that contingency, the convention passed a resolution empowering its State Executive Committee to fill any vacancy that might arise.

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Truck, Car Crash; 2 Hospitalized

Two persons were hospitalized and others suffered minor injuries, in the collision of a car with a logging truck three miles east of Tempe at Porter Creek on Highway 42 Tuesday at 3:30 p.m.

Dean Roe, 25, of 1824 N. Stephens, driver of the car, is at Douglas Community Hospital with possible rib fractures and lacerations of the left arm. His three-week-old son, Michael, is at the hospital for observation, although no injuries were apparent.

His wife, Alice, suffered cuts and possible chest injuries and their daughter, Christina, 2, had a laceration on the forehead. Another daughter, Rosemary, 3, and Donna Roe, passenger in the car, from Myrtle Point, was not injured.

State police said that the Roe vehicle turned over on its side on the north side of the highway, after its front bumper collided with the front of the logging truck.

Driver of the truck, Harold Kimble Parker, Route 3, Box 1632, Roseburg, told officers he was coming off the Olalla road onto Highway 42, and had stopped to let several cars go by, but did not see the Roe car coming from the east as he pulled onto the highway.

Removal Of Acheson Demanded By Legion

NEW YORK (AP) — The American Legion convention Wednesday adopted a resolution demanding the dismissal of Secretary of State Dean Acheson and "those in his department found wanting in the proper activation of their duty to their country."

Adopted overwhelmingly by a voice vote, the resolution declared that the State Department requires "new and stalwart leaders" and asserted "our patience is exhausted. We demand immediate attention to this all important subject. We accept nothing less."

Last year in Miami the legion adopted a resolution regarding the State Department.

It called for the "immediate removal of the present corps of leaders whose every action has reflected incompetence, indecision and defeatism."

Roseburg Tip Jails Wanted Californian

Robert Youngbird, Stockton, Calif., was arrested today in Portland, on a tip from Roseburg police.

Youngbird was wanted in California on a child abandonment charge and on a tip from a local citizen was located in Portland.

Portland police, telephoned by local officers, said they had jailed the man on another charge, then released him, but picked him up later today.

Mayor Calls Meeting On Standard Time Plan

A special combination public hearing and city council meeting has been called by Mayor Al Flegel for 7:30 p.m. Thursday night for the purpose of considering a change back to standard time to coincide with the opening of Roseburg schools on Tuesday.

Both school officials and private citizens have called and requested consideration of the matter, Flegel said.

Candidacy Filed For Council Seat; Others Impending

Would Retain Office

Dr. Byron S. Woodruff has filed his candidacy for election to the city council from Ward 4, and indications are that three other persons would be filing.

The others for whom petitions are being circulated are Bill Adair, councilman from Ward 3, seeking reelection, and George Luoma, and Don Bell, both in Ward 4.

Two councilmen whose terms expire announced today that they definitely would not be running again. They are Harrison Winston from Ward 3 and Jack Hart from Ward 4.

Percy M. Varney has already filed his candidacy from Ward 3 for the council seat, and two men, Arlo Jacklin and Percy Croft, have filed for mayor.

Dr. Woodruff has been serving on the council by appointment since April. He is an optometrist, with offices at 137 N. Jackson, and resides at 325 Glen Street with his wife and two children, Jeanne and Scott.

He first came to Roseburg in 1935, graduating from Roseburg High School in 1938, then entering military service in September 1940. After his discharge in December, 1944, he attended Pacific University at Forest Grove, receiving his bachelor's degree and later his doctor's degree there. He then returned to Roseburg to begin practice.

Texas Named To Rent Stabilization Post

WASHINGTON (AP) — James McInnes Henderson, a native of Daingerfield, Tex., was named the new director of rent stabilization Wednesday.

Henderson, now general counsel of the Economic Stabilization Agency, succeeds Tighe E. Woods. Woods was moved up Tuesday from the rent post to head of the Office of Price Stabilization.

Woods succeeds Ellis G. Arnall, former Georgia governor, as price chief.

Sleeping Sickness Not Seen As Oregon Threat

PORTLAND (AP) — Chances of a sleeping sickness epidemic in Oregon such as has taken 34 lives in California, are remote, the State Board of Health reported Tuesday.

The disease — encephalitis — is carried by a certain species of mosquito, which is occasionally found here.

Dr. S. B. Osgood, epidemiologist for the board of health, said, "August is the month for disease-carrying mosquitoes and it now is close to the end of the season. We could have a few cases but I doubt any wide-spread epidemic."

Smash Given Yearly Take Of \$1 Million

Narcotics Agent Posing As 'Vice King' Brings Arrest Of Gang Chiefs

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A "million-dollar-a-year" heroin ring was reported smashed Tuesday by state narcotics agents, one of whom posed as a "vice king" as a lure to trap its three alleged members.

The arrests, described as the most important in Northern California in a year and a half, climaxed six weeks of investigation, agents said.

George Maloney, supervising inspector of the California Division of Narcotics Enforcement, said the ring used a San Francisco Chinatown soy cake factory as a front for its huge wholesale operations.

Maloney credited agents Tony Gazzola and Louis Noel with cracking what he described as a "million dollar a year ring that operated for two years."

Maloney said Noel, posing as a "Central California vice king," worked his way into the confidence of James Woo, 27-year-old owner of the soy cake factory and alleged leader of the ring.

Maloney said Noel used marked money to buy heroin from Woo on three different occasions and the evidence thus obtained led to the arrests.

Arrested on five counts of violating narcotics laws were Woo and Jue Ying, 48, a woman cook. Bing H. Gee, 38, described as Woo's bodyguard, was booked on two counts.

Brumfield Case Newsman Passes

PORTLAND (AP) — Word was received here Tuesday of the death of Lionel C. Moise, 63, former reporter for the Oregon Journal. He died of a heart ailment in Desert Hot Springs, Calif.

Moise's death recalled a famous Oregon murder case, which he helped solve. The Journal sent Moise to Roseburg in 1921 after a charred and headless body was found near the wrecked automobile of Dr. Richard M. Brumfield, a Roseburg dentist.

Mrs. Brumfield told police the body was that of her husband, but police refused to believe her story. Later the body was identified as that of Dennis Russell, a hermit who lived nearby.

Dr. Brumfield, implicated in Russell's death, was arrested in Canada, tried at Roseburg, convicted and sentenced to death. He escaped the gallows by hanging himself in his cell in the State Penitentiary at Salem.

Dewey Will Campaign
For Ike In N.Y. State

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, spreading victory predictions, said Wednesday that his own campaigning for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will be confined to New York state.

Dewey and New York State Republican legislative leaders spent an hour with the Republican presidential nominee.

The governor, twice a loser himself in presidential races, told reporters he offered Eisenhower no advice on how the general should campaign this time.

F. J. Voyt Appointed
On Welfare Commission

Franklin J. Voyt, 1017 Garden Valley Rd., has been appointed by Gov. Douglas McKay as a member of the Douglas County Public Welfare Commission, County Judge Carl C. Hill announced.

Judge Hill, chairman of the commission, said Voyt replaces Earl Wiley, who resigned last month because of the pressure of his own business.

Voyt was administrator of the Welfare Commission several years ago. His term expires next June 30.

U.S. POLICY 'SUICIDE'

Dulles Proposes Alternate Plan To Shatter Soviet's Red Empire From Within

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP) — John Foster Dulles rapped American foreign policy today as "suicidal" and proposed a plan to disintegrate "the empire of Soviet Communism" from within.

The Republican foreign policy adviser delivered his sharp attack in an address prepared for delivery before the American Political Science Association.

He called upon the United States to pay more attention to the peoples and problems of Asia, Africa and South America and to abandon as a failure its program of "containing" communism.

"The empire of Soviet communism can be disintegrated from within," Dulles said, adding: "Already it is over-extended, covering 800 million people of what were recently 19 different independent nations. The structure could be cracked by passive resistance, slow-downs and non-cooperation."

"That would happen if our nation would today exert the same type of influence in the world that we exerted during the first century of the republic. At that time we symbolized freedom, and we gave moral and sometimes material support to those elsewhere who sought liberty."

"The only alternative way to stop Soviet communism, he said, was by a 'frightful head-on collision.'"

No Increase Foreseen
In Canned Fruit Prices

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department predicted today that retail prices of canned fruits will be no higher during the late summer and fall than a year ago despite prospects of a smaller production.

Apples will be one exception to the general fruit price situation, the department said, because of a smaller production this year and a much stronger demand for processing.

The size of this year's production of dried fruits is still uncertain and will depend largely upon rain output.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — His conviction confirmed by the California Supreme Court, William E. (Billy) Cook, kidnaper-slayer of six persons, Wednesday faced execution in San Quentin Prison's gas chamber.

Date of execution has not been set.

In an unanimous decision, the seven-man court Tuesday upheld the 24-year-old former Joplin, Mo., dishwasher's conviction and death sentence for January, 1951, slaying of Robert Hilborn Dewey, Seattle oil salesman, near El Centro, Calif.
