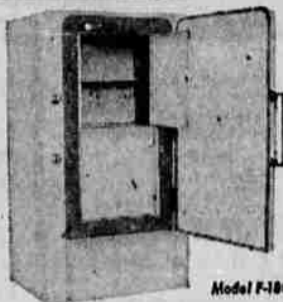

 NEW YORK (AP) — Thousands swung up fifth avenue Tuesday in the American Legion's massive display of the nation's past and present military might.
 The parade of more than 75,000, expected to last at least 12 hours, stepped out from 31st St. at 6 a.m. (PST). Its terminus was 43 blocks north of 74th St.
 Marching with many a former buck private was a five-star general, Dwight D. Eisenhower. The Republican presidential candidate strode at the head of the Kansas contingent. His vice-presidential running mate, Sen. Richard M. Nixon, marched with the California delegation from his home state.

Beetles Increase, Aerial Forest Survey Reveals
 An aerial survey of forest areas in Douglas County infested by the Douglas Fir bark beetle has been completed and reports are expected to be in the hands of local officials shortly.
 The reports will map out the areas in the county where trees have been killed by hordes of the tiny beetles.
 The work was done by the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station cooperating with the Bureau of Land Management, Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. and other agencies.
 With Eugene as headquarters, the survey included much of the forest lands in Oregon and southern Washington.
 The beetle population has increased during the past several years with the increase of fire-burned and windthrown timber. The beetles also breed in logging slash.
 Lloyd Hayes, head of the Forest Research Center in Roseburg, said the heavily infested areas in the county are at the head of the North Umpqua River northwest of Diamond Lake, in areas north of Tiller and Days Creek, on the west fork of Cow Creek and generally throughout the coast range.
 The aerial survey, completed this month, was checked in spots by ground crews.
 When completed, the reports will be placed in local offices and made available to land owners. Maps detailing the infested areas will be provided.
 One of the major problems will be getting the reports into the hands of landowners, Hayes said. Staffs are not large enough to locate the owner of each parcel of forest property. They will be asked to obtain them from local officials.
 The only practical method of control, Hayes said, is to remove the infested trees from the woods—either by burning, or by logging off and placing in mill ponds.

 Portland, Ore., was selected for the 1953 meeting.

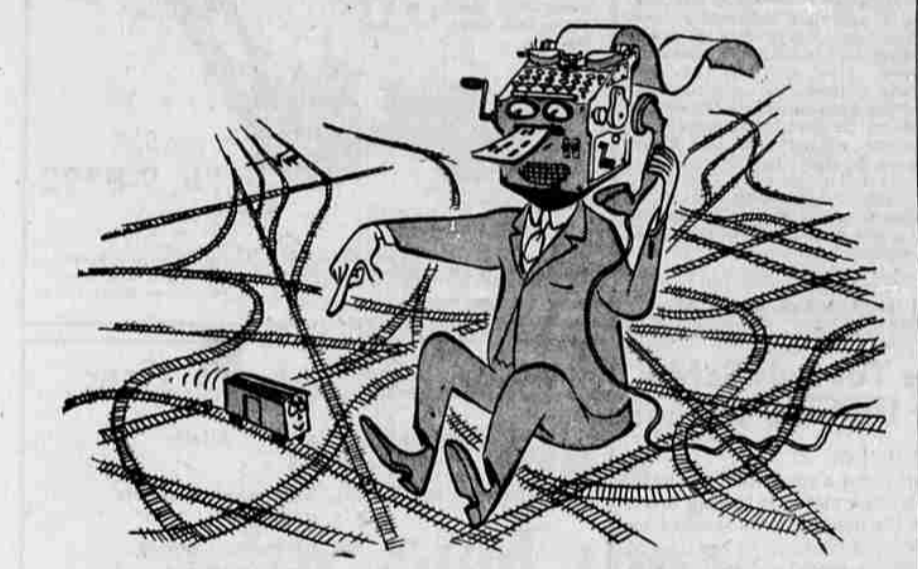
