Sept. 5 Jamboree Begins Grid Play

The football season in Douglas County is just a finger count away. No more than nine days remains until Roseburg, Myrtle Creek and Sutherlin tangle here in the annual Jamboree.

Launching the list of a 10-game slate, the Roseburg Indians will have exactly three days of practice before the Sept. 5 Jamboree against the cream of the two A-2 schools after football camp. Roseburg Athletic Director Cece Sherwood has called a meeting of the three county coaches for Tuesday night, Sept. 2 at 7:30 DST for final arrangements.

This is the first of five home games on the slate for the Indians. A week later, the Indians set the 1952 District 5A-1 race into motion at Eugene, the team which shunned Roseburg last year for a more suitable schedule. Then follow four straight home games. Klamath Falls moves on to the local grid, Myrtle Point and Coquille make their show and finally, "loaded" Marshfield comes for the second District game. Bill Reder's Indians take a week away at Cottage Grove for a third District game and return to the local grid for their final home stand Oct. 24 against North Bend.

The former strikeout king was enjoying the last laugh Wednesday following one of his better performances of the year — one which helped the Indians rack up a vital triumph.

The one-time Iowa farm boy came within two outs of winning a hurling duel from the fabulous Bobby Shantz Tuesday night before leaving the mound in the ninth inning with the Indians and Athletics deadlocked at 3-3. The Indians went on to capture a thrill-packed 6-3 triumph in 11 innings to remain within one game of the American League leading Yankees, who whipped the St. Louis Browns, 6-3, in New York. PORTLAND (AP) — Most of the favorites were still in the picture but the ax falls twice Wednesday as 32 contestants head into the second and third rounds of match play in the Women's National Amateur golf championship.

Leading the parade, and doubtless the most reliable favorite in the field, was the defending champion and medalist from Atlanta, Dorothy Kirby.

Playing over the 6,323-yard par 36-37-73 Waverley Country Club course, the field will be cut to eight by nightfall.

Several matches were standout attractions. Champion Dorothy, who played well enough but hardly up to her own standard Tuesday in winning a 4 and 3 decision over Mrs. Frank T. Flak of Portland, teed off against Mary Agnes Wall, of Menominee, Mich.

Then there was the battle of the teenagers — 14-year-old Anne Quast of Everett, Wash., and 19-year-old Pat Lesser, Seattle. Tall Anne registered the day's biggest surprise Tuesday when she ousted Mrs. Lyle Bowman of Richmond, Calif., Trans-Miss. and four-time Oregon champion, on the 19th hole.

Other topflight girls still on hand include Polly Riley, Fort Worth; Barbara Romack, Sacramento; Grace DeMoss, Corvallis, Ore.; Mary Lena Faulk, Thomasville, Ga.; and Edean Anderson, Helena, Mont.

Lost from the tournament was 15-year-old Berridge Long, Huntington, W. Va. Berri, a sensation in the recent Western Amateur, fell before Spokane's pretty 18-year-old Connie Oldershaw, 3 and 2.

Pacific Archers Compete In Roseburg This Weekend

Archers from all over the Pacific slope are expected to swarm into Roseburg this weekend for the 17th annual Pope-Young Tournament.

This year, the year-old Umpqua Bowmen were handed the honor of hosting one of the biggest bow-and-arrow events of Oregon year. They selected the Winchester Rod and Gun Club grounds as a site and high-speed activity is evident in preparations as the Aug. 30 starting date of the three-day tourney approaches.

This tournament every year gains particular attention from archery hunters, whose live-game season opens early next month. Not only do they vie for honors and the prestige of winning a Pope-Young, but they get invaluable practice at stalking and shooting the animals.

This big event of the tournament allows points on the number of hits they make on ersatz animals placed in surroundings paralleling their natural habitats. The archers use 50 broadhead arrows to kill 50 game animals and birds. Scoring is done on a basis of vital hits and wound hits.

This major event is coupled to two others called clout and wand shooting. The total scores from these three events determine the 1952 champion.

The three-day event, ending Sept. 1, is not limited to the hunting, clout and wand actions, however. It serves as an outdoor camping vacation for many and plenty of archery activity is scheduled on an individual event basis to keep any archer busy. These exhibition archery sessions punctuate the big events.

As an aside, this Pope-Young serves a double purpose of bringing crack archers to the local scene for some top-notch shooting in the Centennial which continues the same days.

Dean Bubar managed the only perfect score in weekly scatter-gun practice at the Winchester Rod and Gun Club traps Tuesday. He broke 25 straight pigeons at 16 yards.

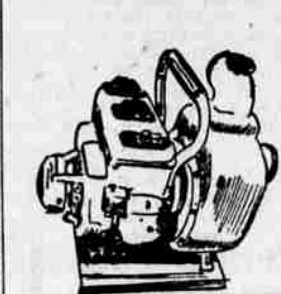
