The story, said Kennon, was obtained from an individual "very close to Taft, a person active in Taft's political fortunes." Kennon said Taft wants to know: 1. Where Eisenhower stands on the Taft - Hartley labor law, which Taft co-sponsored. 2. Whether Eisenhower is sincere regarding a \$60,000,000 budget ceiling for the federal government by 1954. 3. "Most important," where Gov. Thomas E. Dewey - Taft's three-time rival for the Republican presidential nomination and an influential fixture in Eisenhower's nomination - fits into the Eisenhower campaign.

Hollywood pounded out 12 hits against only six by Los Angeles, but the Angels scored five runs on two homers and beat the league leaders, 6 to 5.

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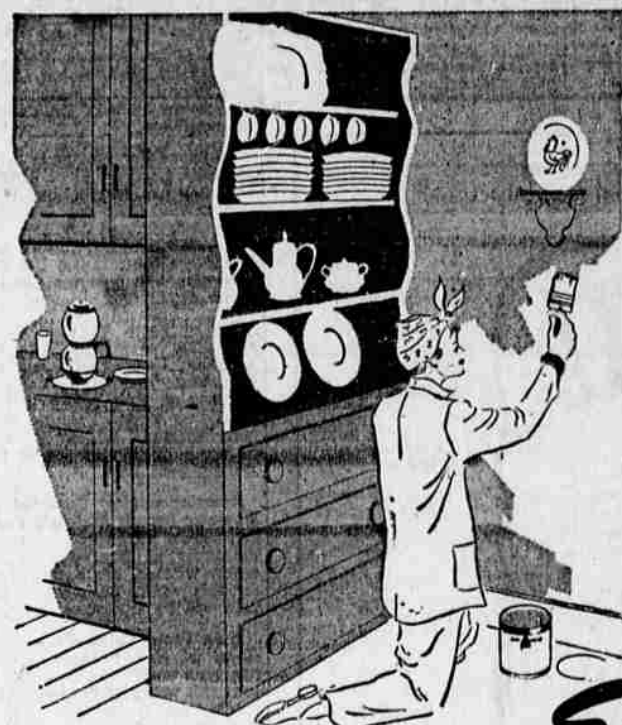
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
