British Bomber Makes 2-Way Atlantic Crossing
Northern Ireland — A British jet bomber flashed across the Atlantic ocean and back Tuesday in slightly over 10 hours.
The double crossing in a single day was the first in history.
The sleek black Canberra also smashed all previous records for a west to east passage as it streaked from Gander, Newfoundland, western terminus of the epic flight.
The whole trip of 4,144 miles took 10 hours 4 minutes, including a two-hour stopover at Gander.

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
