PENDLETON (AP) — Mrs. Kenneth Lewis has joined her husband and her brother-in-law in the polio ward at St. Anthony's hospital.

Her case, reported Wednesday, is mild and non-paralytic. Her husband, 21, and his brother Ronald, 23, are both in iron lungs. Their mother, Mrs. Clint, said they were improving.

Dr. E. E. Berg, county health officer, said Mrs. Kenneth Lewis was one of three new polio cases, bringing the year's total to 41. Only six are still hospitalized.

W.R. Hearst's Widow Sues For \$2½ Million

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mrs. Millicent V. Hearst wants 2½ million dollars from the estate of her late husband, publisher William Randolph Hearst.

In a suit filed yesterday, she said Hearst died owing her \$2,416,500 under two agreements, signed in 1921 and 1927, giving her up to \$20,000 monthly for support of herself and their five sons. Sometimes he failed to make these payments, she said.

The state have neither acknowledged the suit nor rejected her claim, and she wants an accounting.

Hearst's will left most of his estate in two trusts, one for the benefit of the widow and the sons, and the other for charitable purposes.

A Circuit Court suit in which Charles W. Hubbs had asked \$20,000 auto accident damages from Elmer John Denning, has been settled out of court and dismissed.

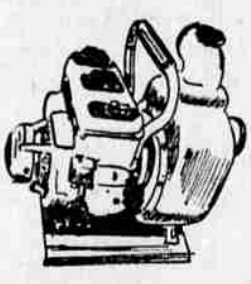
