

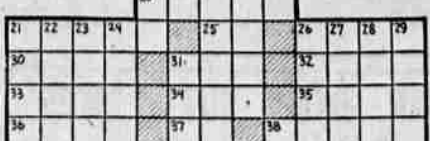

Justice Dept. Officials Named In Tax Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—House investigators were told Tuesday a top Justice Department official approved a grand jury report vindicating the way tax matters were handled in St. Louis in 1951.

Several indictments eventually were returned.

Investigators also heard testimony that leading Justice officials advised a St. Louis government attorney to avoid presenting tax cases to the same grand jury unless asked to do so by the Treasury Department.

One official said the Justice Department didn't "want to be embarrassed" by a jury probe into tax cases, the evidence showed.

These developments came as a House Judiciary subcommittee studied the St. Louis scandals which led to conviction of James P. Finnegan, former collector of internal revenue, on charges of misconduct in office last March 15. His case is on appeal.

Robert A. Collier, subcommittee counsel, said Ellis N. Slack, now an acting assistant attorney general, approved the first report of the grand jury, vindicating Finnegan's administration.

Slack, who was present at Tuesday's open hearing, said this was incorrect.

"The report was read to me," he told a reporter, "but I had no authority to approve it."

District Judge George H. Moore called the report "astonishing" and told the grand jurors to try again. Then they returned indictments against Finnegan and others.

Auto Collision Kills Two Near Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—Two men were killed and two others injured early Tuesday when two cars collided nine miles south of here on Oregon Highway 39.

The dead were Eldon E. Phair, 31, Tulelake, Calif., and Lyle Ray Brown, 29, Merrill, Ore.

Under treatment in a hospital here but in a serious condition were Phair's wife, Florence, and Patrick O'Shea, another passenger in Phair's car.

Brown, alone in his southbound car, was killed outright, Phair, driving the northbound car, died in a hospital here an hour and a half later. Police said the cars side-swiped and both went into the ditch.

Phair operated a Tulelake tavern and O'Shea was his bartender.

The two deaths brought highway fatalities in the Klamath Falls area to five in four days.

Concert Celebrates Edison Anniversary

NEW YORK (AP)—A recent noon-day concert in Manhattan's Bryant Park of oldtime Edison cylinders celebrated the 75th anniversary of the day when Edison got the ideas that led to the phonograph.

The cylinders were played on a machine valued at \$30 about 40 years ago. The horn, concealed in a cabinet, gave out music that was picked up by microphone and transmitted to 200 listeners in the park. The program was sponsored by the New York Public Library and a savings bank.

Tax Commissioner Job Not Wanted By Fatland

SALEM (AP)—Ernest R. Fatland, Condon, former speaker of the State House of Representatives, won't accept appointment as a state tax commissioner.

The Board of Control, which will name a successor to Tax Commissioner Robert Maclean, hasn't offered the job to anybody.

Fatland, who has been prominently mentioned, sent word to the board he wouldn't accept the job. Maclean will leave his job Sept. 20.

The board said it hopes to appoint a new commissioner within 10 days.

Victoria Post Office Puts Ban On U.S. Coins

VICTORIA, B. C. (AP)—The Victoria Post Office has declared a ban against U.S. coins.

Customers Tuesday were politely informed that they should change their coins into Canadian at the nearest bank. U.S. paper currency, however, was still being accepted at the discount of five per cent.

Postmaster John B. Sinclair said the reason for the ban was that the banks were charging eight per cent for handling of all U.S. silver.

U. N. Planes Again Hit Reds' Supply Depots

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—U. N. warplanes roared into North Korea today in a follow-up of last night's heavy bombing of Communist supply depots near the Red capital of Pyongyang and in Northeast Korea.

The U. S. Fifth Air Force said swooping U. N. fighter-bombers dropped explosives on Red front-line installations then dived low and unloaded napalm (burning jellied gasoline) in support of Allied ground troops in the first clear weather in five days.

Sailors Union Agent Jailed For Beating

PORTLAND (AP)—William E. Benz, port agent for the AFL Sailors Union of the Pacific, Tuesday was sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$100 for beating up a merchant seaman two weeks ago.

George Bomareto, 28, received a similar sentence for his part in the shipboard beating of Harold Kyle.

Benz said that Kyle had caused trouble aboard the ship and had fought with other crewmen.



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
