

Young Gals Dominate In Golf Contest

PORTLAND (AP) — Youth takes over for the departed champions Thursday as eight players hook up in the quarter-finals of the Women's National Amateur golf championship.

Dorothy Kirby, the 1951 winner, left the ranks, beaten, 4 and 3, by long-hitting Edean Anderson, the current Canadian champion whose home is in Helena, Mont.

Dorothy's departure left the championship wide open, and the field dominated by young golfers. The age ladder listed 17-year-old Barbara Snook of Portland; three 19-year-olds, Pat Garner of Midland, Tex., Barbara Romack, Sacramento, and Pat Lesser of Seattle; Shirley McFeters, Long Beach, California; 21 Miss Anderson, 22; and two more mature players, Claire Doran, Cleveland, and Mrs. Jacqueline Pung, golfing mother from Hawaii.

Miss Anderson, a stocky, strawberry blonde, supplied the big punch in defeating the Georgia champion, but there were other surprises before the two rounds were completed Wednesday.

Barbara Snook, former Oregon junior champion, defeated former California queen Marjorie Ferrie of Long Beach, on the 19th, and then eliminated Curtis Cup player Mae Murray, Rutland, Vt., 3 and one.

Long Beach was still represented by Miss McFeters, Southern California Public Links champion. Shirley downed Spokane's Connie Oldershaw, 3 and 2, and then defeated beautiful Bonnie Randolph of Linworth, O.

Mrs. Pung almost knocked down the clubhouse on the ninth but steadied to score over a tournament favorite, Grace DeMoss, Curtis Cupper from Corvallis, Ore., 4 and 3.

Hottest round was by Pat Lesser. The pig-tailed Pacific Northwest champ had a 3-under par 33 on the first nine, and won from Bee McWane, Birmingham, Ala., 9 and 7. And Miss McWane played good golf, none the less. Miss Lesser also ousted 14-year-old Ann Quast, Everett, Wash.

Du Pont Estate Slashed 81 Percent By Taxes

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — An estate estimated at more than 75 million dollars was left by the late Lamont du Pont, but unofficial estimates indicate that inheritance taxes will take up to 81 percent of the total.

Du Pont, who died last July 24 — only six days after the 150th anniversary celebration of the founding of the vast company which he once headed — left some 75 million dollars in personal property and \$325,000 in real estate.

The estimated inheritance tax on the \$75 million, according to unofficial estimates, would be \$36,138,200.

Yanks' 12-7 Win Over Browns Embarrasses Boston, Cleveland

It would not be at all surprising to find the faces of general managers Joe Cronin of the Boston Red Sox and Hank Greenberg of the Cleveland Indians a bit red Thursday.

The discomfiture of the general managers can be laid at the feet of Ray Scarborough, a 35-year-old pickle salesman from Mt. Olive, N. C., who is currently employed as a pitcher by the American League's pace-setting New York Yankees.

Fans in Boston probably are demanding to know why Cronin sold Scarborough to the Yanks. Those in Cleveland must be wondering why Greenberg passed up an opportunity to obtain the tall right-hander.

Scarborough embarrassed the front office chiefs of the Boston and Cleveland organizations Wednesday by gaining credit for the Yanks' 12-7 victory over St. Louis. The triumph enabled the Yanks to stretch their lead to two games over the second-place Indians in the pressure-packed race.

The Indians dropped back by bowing, 6-5, to Philadelphia. Boston's third-place Red Sox remained 3 1/2 games astern as Mel Parnell shut out Detroit, 5-0.

In the remaining American League game, the White Sox defeated Washington, 4-0, as four Chicago hurlers combined to pitch a four-hitter, with the win going to Harry Dorish.

ForGotten Dynamite Charge Deals Death

CHEWELAH, Wash. (AP) — The vibrations of a jackhammer he was using set off a forgotten, year-old charge of dynamite Tuesday and killed a worker at a marble quarry here.

The victim, George M. Buck, 52, was the head powerman since 1942 for the Northwest Magnesite Company's red marble quarry. He was killed instantly. Six other men nearby escaped injury.

Howard Ziebell, general manager of the company, said Buck was preparing to level a hump of ground, most of which had been cleared in April, 1951. The jackhammer touched off a 50-pound charge of dynamite that had been set for the first leveling and then forgotten, he said.

When the Southwestern Oregon League champion Drain Black Sox invade the North Bend baseball park Sunday to launch the 1952 Shognessy Playoffs, they may miss Jerry Cade but his absence won't be critical.

The 19-year-old left Roy Heiser's Black Sox camp for a more remunerative hurling job with the Vancouver Capilans in the Western International League. TULARE, Calif. (AP) — Olympic decathlon champion Bob Mathias was mulling over an important decision in his brilliant athletic career Thursday.

He is trying to decide whether to go to Japan on a track and field junket at the invitation of Dan Ferris, secretary of the Amateur Athletic Union, or pass up the trip and show up at Stanford University next Monday for the opening football practice.

The 21-year-old Mathias was one of the big reasons why Stanford won its way into the Rose Bowl last season. His first season was a promising one and he is the Indians' No. 1 fullback. If he goes to Japan he will miss the first three games on the Stanford schedule, for although he cuts short the Japanese tour and leaves there Oct. 1, he would be unavailable for Stanford's games with Santa Clara, Sept. 20, Washington State Sept. 27 and Michigan Oct. 4.

Mathias is returning home Wednesday from Europe, where he competed Wednesday night with his fellow townsman, Sim Iness, Olympic discus champion. More than 3,000 persons turned out to watch a parade through the downtown section.

Texas Election Leader Has Only 252 Margin

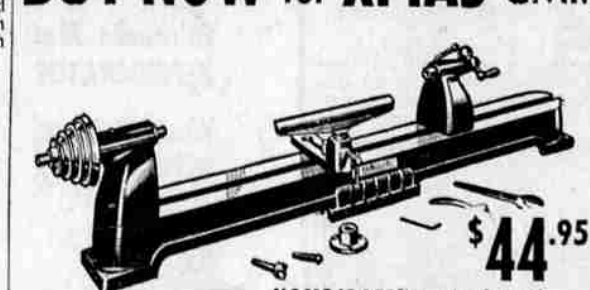
DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Rep. Clark Thompson (D-Tex.) of Galveston had only a narrow margin of votes Wednesday in his bid for re-election.

Thompson was opposed by Wharton County sheriff T. W. Buckshot Lane in the second Democratic primary held Saturday in Texas. Final tabulations of the Texas Election Bureau for the Ninth District showed Thompson with 29,943 votes and Lane with 29,691.

The official canvass of votes will be made Sept. 8.

Thompson attended Reed College and the University of Oregon before Marine Corps service in World War I.

HASTINGS, Neb. (AP) — Salem, Ore., bowed out of the American Legion junior baseball section tournament Wednesday night, victim of a 9-0 trouncing administered by San Diego, Calif.

It was the Pacific Northwest regional champions' second defeat in the double-elimination tournament.

San Diego hopped on three Salem pitchers for a total of 15 hits.

The Californians play Denver Thursday night. The winner will qualify for the Little World Series at Denver next week.

SF 49ers Still Four Players Over 33 Limit

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco 49ers, professional football team numbered four players less Thursday — but still was five over the 33-player limit.

Cut from the squad yesterday were halfbacks Harry Hugasian and Bob Bryan, both of Stanford; Fullback Carl West, University of Mississippi; and center Dick Patrick, University of Oregon.

What he bought instead, he said, was a car equipped with two-way radio, and headed west.

Police charged him with carrying a concealed weapon — there was a blackjack in his car — and asked postal inspectors to decide whether they might want him.

Britain Claims Most Effective Battle Plane

LONDON (AP) — Britain says she has the "most effective fighter planes in the world." Triangle-shaped jet called the Gloster Javelin.

An announcement authorized yesterday by the Royal Air Force said the weird-looking plane is faster than sound — 660 miles per hour at sea level — and is "more maneuverable and docile at lower speeds than any fighter since the biplane era."

The Javelin is the world's first twin-engine fighter of the delta design, in which the swept-back wings form a triangle virtually the length of the plane's body. It is 57 feet long and has a wingspan of 52 feet. The tip of its tail stands 17 feet from the ground.
