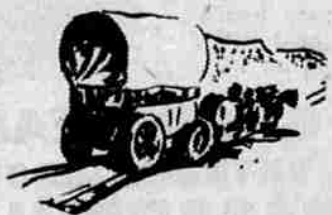

Legion Greeting To Adlai About Same Given Ike
NEW YORK (AP)—The reception of the American Legion convention gave Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois Wednesday when he spoke before it appeared to approximate the one given Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower when he addressed the Legionnaires Monday.

As when the Republican nominee for president spoke, the 20,000-seat Madison Square Garden was not filled. In fact, the attendance appeared smaller than it was for Eisenhower.

The ovation for the Democratic presidential candidate, however, sounded as enthusiastic and lasted as long as the reception given Eisenhower. The audience rose in a standing ovation, waving state banners when the governor entered the garden. The Legionnaires cheered again when National Commander Donald R. Wilson of Clarkburg, W. Va., introduced him.

Stevenson was interrupted frequently by applause. He received his greatest reaction when he mentioned the attacks on General Marshall. At that point an explosion of clapping and cheers halted him for several seconds.

The Legionnaires even applauded when he notified them he would resist pressures from all organized groups, including their own, if he considered them in conflict with the general public interest.

At the end of his address Stevenson received a great burst of applause as the Legionnaires rose to their feet. Their cheers lasted more than a minute.

Officials Plan Extension Work

Roseburg area extension college courses for the coming school year were discussed Wednesday by Byron Moore, of the State General Extension Division, Kenneth Barneburg, County school superintendent, and M. C. Deller, city superintendent.

Courses to be taught here this year are weaving, world literature, psychology of exceptional children, physical science survey, and the Credit will be given for all but the geography of North America, weaving course.

The geography course will be offered in both Roseburg and Myrtle Creek.

No times have been set yet for the courses.

Miss Jean Sutherland from Eugene will instruct the weaving class, which was requested by several local teachers and townpeople. World literature will be taught by Keith Goldhammer from Monmouth. Dr. John Shultz of Ashland will handle the psychology class, which will be a follow up on the County Teachers' Institute set for October.
