

Black Sox - Studs To Battle Sunday

Baseball heaves its dying breaths of the 1952 summer season for Douglas County this weekend. The limelight will be on the spectacular Black Sox at North Bend where they make a bid for the grand slam in the Southwestern Oregon League semi-pro circles.

Roy Helsner's crew wrapped up the League championship last weekend and also gained berth in the post-season Shaughnessy Playoffs. At 1:30 p.m. standard time Sunday afternoon, it meets the Medford Studs in the first round of the sudden-death four-team tournament. If the Sox can dump the Medford squad as they have four times before this season, they move into the championship bracket Monday afternoon against the winner of Sunday's Bandon - Coos Bay - North Bend game.

The only other baseball action by county teams is found at Drain's home park, when the Evergreen League co-champion Elkton and Sutherlin teams meet Sunday night at 7:30 in the first of a possible three-game tournament for the untested League title.

A decision after the Sunday game will determine if another two games will be necessary. If Elkton wins the first one, the championship may go to it for winning both the first and second half play.

Canada Out Of Own Golf Tournament

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — A quartet of heavy hitters from the United States is holding a golfers' picnic on the roller-coaster fairways of the Capilano course Friday in the semi-finals of Canada's Amateur tournament.

The last Canadian was crowded from the running in Thursday's two 18-hole matches, Bob Roos beating one and Sammy Urzetta and Larry Bouchey disposing of one apiece. This assures an all-U.S. final for the first time since 1929.

But Roos himself was not around at nightfall, getting the heave-ho from Ed Meister of Cleveland in the afternoon quarter-finals.

Left in the running with Meister, Campbell of Huntington, W. Va., Bouchey and Urzetta was Billy who squeezed out Jim Tom Blair 1 up and then walloped Gordon Haskell of Seattle 6 and 5.

Campbell tangles in one 36-hole semi-final with Urzetta, the East Rochester, N.Y., lumber salesman who held the U. S. Amateur crown in 1950. Bouchey, a beaming blond behemoth who sells automobiles in Inglewood, Calif., meets Meister in the other.

Urzetta three-putted an occasional green but made up for it with excellent iron play as he trounced Doug Silverberg of Red Deer, Alta., and then Bob Gray of Winnipeg by identical 4 and 3 margins.

Roos beat Colin Brown of London, Ont., 8 and 7 before he met Meister, who trimmed Eddie Draper of Seattle in the morning, 2 and 1.

Bouchey did not manhandle Capilano's par 37-35 — 72 but he had the shots when he needed them. In his morning round he scored a 1 up victory over Nick Westlock of Windsor, Ont., chief of hope of the Canadians to keep the title at home.

After that close squeak he marched to a fairly easy 3 and 2 decision over Jack Reynolds of Vancouver.

Bears 'Team To Beat' As PCC Gridders Begin

LOS ANGELES (AP) — California's Golden Bears assume their near-perennial role as the team to beat for Pacific Coast Conference football laurels as 575 gridders throughout the loop swing into practice Monday.

"We'll be a contender this fall if several ifs are ironed out," says coach Pappy Waldorf, whose Bears were Rose Bowl meat for the Big Ten three straight years after winning the conference crown from 1949 through 1951.

But don't figure on anything resembling a runaway. Three other outfits — Washington State, Southern Cal and UCLA — rate high. Stanford surprised last year and though manpower losses run deep, the PCC won't underrate Chuck Taylor's defending champions.

Washington has quarterback Don Heinrich, pass pitching sensation of 1950, back after a year's injury sidelining. He could boost the Huskies stock.

Oregon, Oregon State and Idaho seem at this stage to be outside the contenders circle.

Fans get a quick line on Southern California and Washington State when those teams clash in the Los Angeles coliseum, Sept. 19.

Washington State enjoyed its best season in 20 years with a young team during 1951 and nearly everybody is back, with the exception of coach Forest Evaschewski, who moved to Iowa. Alton Kirchner took over the Cougar reins and asked 35 to turn out.

Formidable returns include Bob Burkhardt, chunky pass-throwing quarterback, and end Ed Barker. Mostly on Burkhardt pitch-

ers, Barker gained 864 yards, averaging 86.4 per game last season. Both are records.

Oregon and Idaho have the smallest opening day squads, with 50 men each. Oregon banks on the passing of Hal Dunham, with not much expected from a defensive line lacking depth. Halfback George Shaw, a standout last year as a freshman, figures in plans as halfback, quarterback and safetyman.

Idaho's Vandals won only two games last season and might do slightly better during the coming campaign. Coach Babe Curfman lists 28 sophomores, with his top weapon the senior pass combination of Wayne Anderson to Jerry Ogle. Guard and captain Bob Holder is tabbed the Vandal's pride and joy.

Oregon State's high hopes were dashed as one by one the team's last key men expected back. Quarterback Duane Helbig signed a pro baseball contract, halfback Bill Anderson joined the Air Force, and halfback Dave Mann and line-backer Bob Redkey became ineligible.

So coach Kip Taylor looks for new backfield talent among his 56-man squad to support fullback Sammy Baker and right half Jack Pinion. Capt. Jim Cordial should be the line mainstay at end.

At Seattle where 60 have been asked to show up Monday, Heinrich will have at least a half dozen capable pass receivers in half-backs Bill Earley, Dick Sprague and Bill Albrecht and ends Doug McClary and Phil Gillis. So look for a high powered aerial attack in the North.

Indians Divide Twin Bill With Detroit Tigers 9-3, 1-4

The schedule clearly favors the Cleveland Indians in their quest of the 1952 American League pennant but one disturbing factor in the otherwise serene picture is the Detroit Tigers.

Cleveland is due to meet the tail-end Tigers nine times before the curtain falls on Sunday Sept. 28. At first glance it would appear that this is a feather in Cleveland's cap but the marooned Tigers have a nasty habit of beating the Indians at the most inopportune moments.

Detroit, then in fifth place, upset the Indians' apple cart last year by sweeping a three-game set from the Tribe late in September to kill Cleveland's chances of overhauling the New York Yankees.

The specter of 1951 haunted the Indians again Thursday night as they missed a chance to pick up ground on the front-running Yankees by splitting a two-night twin-bill with the Tigers before 53,988 fans.

Early Wynn coasted to his 17th victory in the first game, won by the Indians, 9-3, but Hal Newhouse turned back the Indians, 4-1, for the 19th victory of his major league career in the second.

As the Yankees were idle, Cleveland remained two games off the pace — but dropped a game in the important "loss" column.

The Red Sox also blew a chance

to gain by dropping the first game of a doubleheader to the rising Philadelphia Athletics, 6-4. The second game was rained out.

Brooklyn, meanwhile, continued its march to the National League flag by dumping the Chicago Cubs, 9-6, to remain 9½ games ahead of the runner-up New York Giants. The Giants swamped Pittsburgh, 14-7, while Cincinnati edged Boston, 5-4, in 11 innings and Philadelphia outlasted St. Louis, 10-6, in the circuit's only night game.

Two Football Men Hired This Year

Any youngster who has participated in sports at Glide High School during the last two years has played under three coaches.

The 1952 season starts out with a fourth and fifth. The rapidly-growing school has hired two coaches this year, which exactly doubles the staff over 1951.

In 1950 Les Wright finished out two years of coaching at Glide and was replaced by Harvey Stroud at the start of the 1951 season. In January of 1952, Stroud was replaced by Tom Jones.

An Air Force reservist, Jones was called back into the service this month. His replacement, starting the 1952 fall season, is 28-year-old Bernie Hill, who will mentor football, basketball and track before doubling as a physical education teacher.

Hill is a 1949 graduate of Linfield College where he majored in physical education. Upon leaving college, he took over the coaching job at Brownsville, Ore. near Sweet Home. The next year, he moved to Philomath, where he coached for two years.

On the personal side of the column, Hill is married and the father of three girls.

Setting a precedent at the expanding school this year, a second coach has been added. He is Bill Oleson, who is named head baseball coach and assistant to Hill in football and basketball.

Oleson was graduated from Oregon State College in 1950. At OSC he majored in industrial arts and minored in physical education. In the next two years, he coached at Halsey. Besides the coaching chores, Oleson also takes on the job of shop tutor.

He too is married and the father of three with an addition expected soon.

Both men are veterans, Hill from the Marines and Oleson from the Army.

The Rams won the first game of the crucial doubleheader at Seattle 3-2. The Rainiers took the second game 10-2 but it left them where they started the evening — one game back of the Padres. A twin would have pushed them into third place.

The Portland Beavers, meanwhile continued to slump. Sacramento handed them their third straight loss 5-0.

Fred Sanford pitched scoreless ball for the Beavers for six innings but was batted out in the seventh as the Sacs scored four runs. The loss dropped Portland below the 500 mark.

Nanny Fernandez clouted one of these homers with the sacks loaded. San Diego bunched four hits in the third inning of the opener to score all its runs.

Cagey Al Nagy was driven to the showers during this bombardment and three other Seattle pitchers saw service before the game was over. The hard-working Vern Kindersfunder hung up his 18th pitching win in the nightcap.
