Truman May Attend Hospital's Dedication

LEBANON, Ore. — President Truman, who will be in the Pacific Northwest early in October, may attend the dedication ceremony for the new Lebanon Community Hospital.

The Lebanon Express reported Tuesday that U. S. Public Health Service officials in Washington, D. C., said it was very likely that Truman would dedicate the \$750,000 hospital.

It is the 1,000th institution to be built with financial aid from the federal government under the Hill-Burton Act. The government paid about one-third of the cost.

First grade registration will be Sept. 4 and new high school student signups Sept. 5 for Oakland District schools, Millard L. Gilbrath, superintendent, reports. Classes start in the Oakland system on Monday, Sept. 8.

Physical examinations and registration will be held for the first graders from 8 to 11 a.m., PST, in the grade school building. The County health nurse and doctor will be on hand to give the examinations.

All first graders must present birth certificate showing they will reach their sixth birthday by Nov. 15. Certified baptismal certificates will also be accepted.

Grade school teachers will be on hand to meet parents and secure registration material.

New Oakland High School students will sign up from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 3 p.m., PST, on Sept. 5, in the high school office.

Both high school and elementary classes will be dismissed early the first day of school, Sept. 8. Buses are expected to return before noon.

Elementary pupils will spend most of their time registering and receiving assignments. Gilbrath says. High school students will run through their entire schedule with abbreviated periods and receive assignments for the next day's classes.

No cafeteria service will be furnished and there will be no need to bring lunches, Gilbrath reports.
