Oregon Turkey Output This Year To Show Drop
PORTLAND 28 — Oregon's turkey production this year will be 4 per cent under last year's but 7 per cent above the 1939-48 average, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported Wednesday.

This year's crop was estimated 2,134,000 birds. A bigger percentage of the crop will move to market this year before the end of October than in 1951, the department said.
