17 Veterans On Grid Squad As Pre-Season Camp Ends

Deep in the Little River country above Glide, 50 sweating Roseburg football prospects polished off their last practice Friday night at the second annual pre-season camp.

This afternoon at Finlay Field, the week-old squad goes into its first full scale scrimmage while Coaches Bill Reder and Bobo Moore view the results of five days of concentrated practice.

Head Coach Reder feels he has unveiled twice as much football talent from the big traveling squad this year as he could last year. Occasionally barking orders to a slacking player Friday, Reder gazed fondly at his charges and said:

"From my observations at the camp this year, I'm certain our line and backfield should be superior to last year's." Explaining further, he said, "The line should average 20 pounds per man more this year and should have increased speed."

Assistant Coach Bobo Moore was as lavish with his hopes, calling this year's backfield much improved over the 1951 squad. Moore, who fullbacked for Jim Aiken at Oregon in 1950, stated that this year's squad would emphasize passing, with last year's Jayven quarterback Howard Backen drawing most of the tussling chores. Moore has been stressing pass protection along the old Jim Aiken system of the "iron pocket." "The boys are looking good and learning fast," he said.

One factor definitely evident even after five days of grueling practice and aching muscles was the caliber of spirit. The pace was brisk in spite of the dust, heat and baked practice field. At times blocking and running showed flashes of the polished effect Reder and Moore expect to achieve before the first game Sept. 5.

Even in running their laps after practice, the boys showed high

spirits replete with their horseplay and bantering. This high level of morale was particularly interesting since it came after ten three-hour practices in five days.

Reder's optimism peeked through at this point. "Nobody's going to take advantage of us this year," he said.

Aside from the morale and the constructive results of the camp, Reder had at least two other reasons for optimism. One was the 17 lettermen on the squad and the other was the increased weight of the team.

Back for this year's campaigns were the following monogram winners:

Bob Brandt, Jim Gilbert, Ron Hicks, Norm Niblett (transfer from Benson Poly of Portland), Bill Clarenbach, LeRoy Wehde, Gene Lane, Ralph Linnell, John Michaels, Herman Oberholzer, Ron Kress, Bill Landis, Howard Backen, Steve Danchoh, Larry Fitzgerald, Dale Johnson and John Desbiers.

Even with this list, Reder was still dissatisfied. "We lost four boys one way or another, who would have bolstered the squad considerably," he said. He named George Langlois, a first-string tackle prospect, who joined the Navy; Monty Elder, a halfback who quit school; Don Clark, another back, who dropped from the squad; Don Woods, a guard who quit school.

The second reason for rejoicing was the weight angle. The beef trust is evident in such gridders as 230-pound Bill Landis, 215-pound "Sandy" Sandstrom and 205-pound Ralph Linnell.

West Vs. East At Pendleton Tonite

PENDLETON — High school all-stars from east of the Cascades will meet prep all-stars from west of the mountains in the first annual Class-B Shrine benefit football game here Saturday night.

The West team is heavier but the East appears to be faster. The West offensive line averages 180 pounds, 10 pounds more than the East. The West's backs average about 170 pounds compared with 155 for the East.

The East, captained by Ralph Graham, Wallowa, and John Wagner, Heppner, will use a T-formation while the West, with Captains Terrence Mahoney, Gervais, and Alan Brown, Drain, will operate from a single wing.

PORTLAND — Football fireworks plenty are in store for Portland fans Saturday night when the U.S. professional football champion Los Angeles Rams meet the Chicago Cardinals in an exhibition game at Multnomah Stadium.

The Rams, who hurtled to the U.S. crown on the bullet passes of Norm Van Brocklin, will be depending on the former University of Oregon ace as they seek their third straight exhibition win of the season. The Los Angeles have already toppled the College All-Stars and the Washington Redskins.

Van Brocklin, scourge of the secondary during his college career

with the Webfoots, is expected to pull the stops and give the hometown folks a good view of the arm that has made him one of the top passers in pro ranks.

Joe Sydnar, Los Angeles coach, said he would have an All-Coast backfield to throw at the Cardinals at kickoff time, 8:30 p.m., daylight time.

In addition to Van Brocklin, who performs at the quarterback slot, the Rams' backfield will consist of Woody Lewis, also formerly of the Webfoots, at right half, Washington State's Jerry Williams at left half and Jack Myers, the former UCLA pilerdriver, at fullback.

With only a week of football practice gone, Roseburg Football Coach Bill Reder named the two squads which will participate in the Jamboree here Friday night against Sutherlin and Myrtle Creek.

He picked a first string line averaging 178 pounds and a second-string bulwark averaging 173. On both squads, he has 180-pound fullbacks running with speedy halfbacks and a passing quarterback.

In the Jamboree, the first string backs will team with the second-string backfield against one visiting team, and the opposite combination will face the other visitor.

SAN PEDRO, Calif. — Ray Carmassi, the seventh man to swim the rough Catalina Channel, hopes to tackle the English Channel next.

The 23-year-old San Francisco former Marine grinned as he waded ashore Thursday at nearby White's Point, 18 hours and 20 minutes after he left Santa Catalina Island, more than 21 miles away.

Carmassi, who taught combat survival swimming in the Marines, didn't complain about his ordeal in the water. He was ill the first seven hours. An ear plug fell out of his left ear and salt water rushed in. A doctor gave Carmassi ear drops and fashioned a new plug for him.

About noon the waves flipped me over and pulled a left arm muscle and I had very little use of that arm after that," Carmassi said afterward.

right handers to suit the requirements of the situation.

Only One New Coach On 'A' County Roster

Turnover in "A" school football coaching staffs was exceedingly small starting the 1952 prep season.

Only one new name appears on the coaching rosters of the four Oregon State schools. Former Oregon State Rudy Ruppe has taken over the football reins at Reedsport replacing John Seeley.

Here at Roseburg, Bill Reder continues in his second year as head football mentor. Bobo Moore is his assistant.

At Sutherlin, Coach Ralph Dyson tries for his first full season this year, although he was listed as football coach last year. Shortly after the season started, Dyson suffered an eye ailment and had to be benched for the rest of the season. He is aided by Dick Yurk, who coached the Sutherlin seventh and eighth grades last year. Yurk will be head basketball coach, also.

Myrtle Creek's Corky Van Loo holds the job of grid coach again this year. His two assistants are Glen Schroeder and Dick Vanderzanden, both eighth grade teachers. All three played on the same team at Oregon College of Education at Monmouth in 1949. All these coaches began putting their 1952 squads through the paces last Monday.
