

# Good Driving Ahead Near Reedsport

Highway relocation construction which currently represents minor traffic delays for tourists and local traffic in the Reedsport area, in future perspective represents miles of sweeping, level highways, free from sharp curves and steep, hazardous grades.

That's what relocation survey plans developed by the State Highway Department, under the direction of resident engineers, show.

The resident locations office, which had been in charge of Walter Wright, locations resident engineer, for two and half years, mapped out the relocations of east highway 101 from Elbow Lake south to Clear Lake, and of state highway 38, the Umpqua River Highway, between Reedsport and Scottsburg. The locations office closed early this month, its surveys completed.

Resident construction engineering has been under the direction of C. C. McKinney, with P. F. Burnett now in charge of the construction of a section of highway 38. Bridge engineering has been under the direction of Alfred Rear, resident bridge engineer at Reedsport.

**Huge Cut Made**  
Sections now under construction include the Reedsport-Winchester Bay stretch of 3.72 miles, under contract to Berke Brothers, of Portland, which involves such dramatic construction features as a cut increased through solid rock, to a maximum depth of 120 feet from ditch grade to top of slope. A concrete box culvert extends a long distance under the roadbed, which is being increased from 18 feet to 22 feet in width. Rock blasting and earth moving in spite of continuous traffic, with only minor short time delays ne-

cessitated. Detouring of traffic has been impossible because of the terrain.

Engineers anticipate that, with the rough grading well under way, work will continue in this section as long as weather permits, and work in the rock cut will continue as long as equipment can be moved in.

**Eliminate Curves**  
The relocation will eliminate existing steep grades, and sharp curves, reducing the accident hazard which the "cut" has represented in the past.

Berke Brothers also have the contract on the Mill Creek Bridge, highway 38. A modern, concrete pile bridge is replacing a characteristic "land mark" covered wooden structure, and is under the direction of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads.

E. L. Gates and Co., Portland contractors, have the contract on the Winchester Bay-Clear Lake section of highway 101, which continues the relocations of the major coast artery south. Heavy equipment, including several large cat and earth movers, released from a Gates highway project near Coos Bay, is now being moved into the section. A bridge, across Winchester Creek, which empties into Winchester Bay, is being replaced by a 10 by 10 foot box culvert, now under construction.

**Working Day and Night**  
The relocation, which is causing some minor traffic delay at present, will eliminate hazardous curves and grades. The relocations program is extended south on the coast highway, construction work being under way at various points between Reedsport and Coos Bay, and from there south. Gates is working day and night, using flood lights for night work, on the section south of Winchester Bay.

The Winchester Bay-Clear Lake section involves the relocation fill on the edge of Clear Lake, water supply source of the city of Reedsport. Construction plans were worked out in cooperation with State Highway Department engineers, city of Reedsport officials and state sanitation authorities to eliminate possible water pollution hazards.

The relocation program has required the removal and relocating of the PUD power lines in the highway vicinity, the Central Lincoln PUD, of which Clyde Nunnally is the local manager, awarding the removal contract to the Witzik Electric Co. of Corvallis. Passing Lanes Planned

Extensive comparative surveys were made for a proposed water-level grade for that section, but the plan was rejected by the State Highway Department because of excess cost above the present "over-hill" grade, and the hazard of an extensive fill necessitated over a slough area. A third or passing lane will be constructed on the up grade east of Reedsport.

Tom Lillebo, Reedsport contractor, is at work on the Schofield River bridge in Reedsport, part of the highway 101 relocations.

**New Type Bridge**  
The new, modern concrete bridge structure, now under construction, represents a significant development in bridge construction methods. Beams of the bridge were pre-cast, the "prefabricated" sections having been prepared before the bridge construction started. They are to be hoisted onto the structure by cranes.

Lillebo reports that the method is highly satisfactory, representing a construction economy and insuring better curing of the concrete. The method has not been used extensively in bridge construction in Oregon, but has proved successful elsewhere.

The highway construction, entailing an up-heaval on major tourist traffic routes in and out of the Reedsport area, has continued throughout the summer with no major traffic delays and no serious accidents.

**Disgarded Cigarette Causes Glendale Fire**  
The Douglas Forest Protective Association crew at Quines Creek has been busy between fires in improving buildings and grounds.

This year, according to Warden Bud Knowles, only one fire was caused by smokers' carelessness. That was a fire occurring Friday evening along the highway in front of the All-4 Lumber Company plant. It was directly traceable to a cigarette carelessly thrown from a passing car. No serious damage was done although a considerable grass fire was started.

Work has been done on the buildings, and a new well has been dug and water lines installed. The plant now consists of four buildings; a dormitory, warden's residence, garage and warehouse, and a fuel house.

A ten-man crew and foreman and cook occupy the property from June 16 to September 20. The rest of the time, a resident warden and caretaker, Richard "Bud" Knowles handles the work.

Not only does the crew respond to forest fire calls, but the pumper at the station is always available in the case of rural fires. It carries its own water and an 1150 foot hose. Bud Knowles states that a good source of water supplement that carried by the pumper is also important.

Once teeth break through the gums they do not grow except at the roots.

## Caution In Using Vaporizers Urged By Health Depts.

The Douglas County Health Department together with the State Board of Health, urged caution in using several new types of insecticidal vaporizers now being offered for sale.

"While health authorities are interested in all effective measures for insect control, it should be emphasized that vaporizing devices can be considered only an aid to good sanitation practice and should not be looked upon as a substitute for the elimination of insect breeding places, proper garbage and refuse disposal, garbage containers, and effective screens on windows and doors," the board said.

The chemicals going into the vaporizers are toxic to the board said. The following recommendations were offered:

1. The devices should not be used in homes or sleeping quarters.
2. Installation must be made only in commercial or industrial premises, schools, and similar locations where human exposure will be on a working day basis - not continuous.
3. The insecticide shall be released at the rate not to exceed one gram per 15,000 cubic feet per 24 hours. (The average home probably does not have available 15,000 cubic feet of air space.)
4. Devices shall be so constructed that output in excess of that recommended is impossible. Fuses to protect against overloading and high temperatures, and a pilot light to indicate whether or not the unit is operating should be "built-in" features.
5. Units should be mounted above head height and three feet or more from the ceiling.
6. Installation must be such that any material which might condense on nearby equipment, walls, or ceiling cannot be dislodged and fall into or otherwise contaminate food.

**Cashmore Gets New York Democratic Nomination**  
NEW YORK (AP) — John Cashmore, borough president of Brooklyn, is the Democratic nominee for U. S. senator from New York.

He will oppose Republican Sen. Irving Ives at the Nov. 4 election.

Cashmore was named last night on the first ballot after a floor contest at the Democratic State Convention. Ives was nominated by the GOP Tuesday. New York's other senator is Herbert H. Lehman, elected on the Democratic and Liberal party tickets.

It was not known today whether Cashmore will win the nomination of the Liberal party which is organized only in New York State and which could hold the balance of power in a close race between the Democrats and Republicans.
