Psychology Meet Of Pastors Is Scheduled Here

The third annual conference on pastoral psychology for ministers of all religions will again be held at the Veterans Hospital starting Monday, Sept. 8.

This series of lectures and discussions is originated and planned by Dr. John L. Haskins, manager of the hospital, and the Roseburg Ministerial Association, for the purpose of enabling ministers to better rehabilitate veteran patients returning to their homes and to acquaint these religious leaders with the problems and treatment of mental disorders. All the ministers of Western Oregon have been invited to this strictly non-denominational meeting and it is anticipated that about a hundred will attend.

The conference starts off with registration at 1 p.m. Monday and concludes with a noon luncheon on Wednesday. The program consists of lectures, question and answer periods, and general discussions in which all will participate. Speakers will be drawn from the hospital staff of medical doctors, psychiatrists, and psychologists, as well as local and out-of-town ministers. There will be a picnic in the grove at the hospital grounds on Monday evening and a banquet at the Methodist Church on Tuesday night.

Dr. Morris H. Roach, minister of the local Presbyterian Church and part-time chaplain at the Veterans Hospital, will preside at most of the sessions.

YESTERYEAR... AND TODAY

The early-day atmosphere and dress currently seen about the county—particularly in Roseburg—in connection with the Centennial celebration recalls to mind incidents of the old days. Johnny Bryan, father and grandfather of present day operators, founded our store here in Roseburg in 1886.

On the front counter of the store sat a gold balance. Gold dust and nuggets were as much used as a medium of exchange as gold coin. Paper money was rarely seen. Into one of the large pans of the balance went the gold dust. Enough was poured into the pan to balance the weight in the other pan which signified the price of the purchase.

There are many women in Douglas County today who proudly wear hand-made wedding rings crafted by Johnny Bryan. He often remarked that the best gold he could obtain from the miners to use in making wedding rings came from the Coffee Creek diggings, near Tiller on the South Umpqua. He preferred this gold because it was so pure it required little or no refining. Gold from this creek drainage was separated from the rest. This gold he personally alloyed and cast into ingots which were later rolled into gold stock for the manufacturing of jewelry.

Some of the gold was cast into ring blanks which were later rolled to make wedding rings.

Displayed in our window this week are several of the original molds as well as the hand rolling mill which were used in making wedding rings. Also in our window we have placed early day photographs and other items of local historic interest.
