

John Rankin's Firey Career In House Ends With Defeat

WASHINGTON (AP) — John Rankin will have time to cool off now. For most of his life he's been as active and blazing as a man with a box of matches on fire in his hip pocket.

Rankin, the tireless champion of white supremacy who had his hand called on the floor of the House of Representatives for throwing around words like "Kike" and "Negro" won't be back next year.

Rankin says he always used the word "Negro," but his pronunciation sometimes makes it sound more like "Nigra," a circumstance which once led former Rep. Vito Marcantonio (ALP-NY) to raise a point of order that Rankin had called Singer Paul Robeson a "Nigger Communist." Speaker Rayburn ruled that Rankin said "Negro Communist."

Rankin has been a member of the House from Mississippi for 32 years. This week the voters of his state turned him down for re-nomination in favor of a fellow-congressman, Thomas Abernethy, who is 49.

Lively As A Boy

Rankin, still as lively as a boy at 70, is one of those old men who never seem bruised by the shoving around time gives them. Even his white hair seems to stand up in constant indignation.

There was almost a birdlike quality, an angry bird, in the way he cocked his head as he sat in the House, listening and watching, never wanting to miss anything. He may have set a record for attendance. He seemed forever there.

Unlike some his ponderous fellow-members, far younger, Rankin could be on his feet in an eye-blink for a fight with his mouth or his fists. Size didn't faze him. His fellow-members, presidents or even the Supreme court were all targets for his tongue and his temper.

Swings On Big Man

In 1945 he swung on Frank Hook, a fellow Democrat from Michigan. Hook, one-time iron ore miner, was a lot bigger man. Rankin had accused Hook of consorting with Communists. When Hook called him a liar, Rankin swung.

Communism was on his mind. He was one of the most active Communist-hunters of his time, a pursuit he developed as a leading member of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

He was equally attentive to, and equally against, any anti-racial discrimination moves by the Democratic administration. He was strictly for segregation of Negroes.

At the same time he championed the Tennessee Valley Authority, rural electrification, and war veterans. Veterans were his special province. He was chairman of the

Power Expansion To Give Boost For Aluminum

LONGVIEW, Wash. (AP) — Aluminum production will be boosted at the Reynolds Metals Company plant here as a result of expansion and an increase in electric power.

The Bonneville Power Administration will boost power delivery from 66,000 to 100,000 kilowatts, Administrator Paul J. Raver said. This is made possible by new facilities at the Longview substation.

The three million dollar substation is designed to handle needs of the aluminum plant and other industries in the area through 1960, he added. He said another 100,000 kilowatts of power will be available in November when the Cardwell-Cowlitz 115,000-volt line is completed. This power will come from the Pacific Power and Light Company's Yale project.

Ceremonies Saturday will mark expansion of Reynolds' Longview production. Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington will be chief speaker. Rep. Russell V. Mack, Aberdeen, also will attend.

So will R. S. Reynolds Sr., chairman of the board, and his son, J. Louis Reynolds, vice president in charge of manufacturing, who will speak.

The plant will be open to the public.

Public To Be Queried By Price Control Boss

WASHINGTON (AP) — Tigue E. Woods, the nation's new price boss, said Thursday he will ask the President to lift price controls if he finds the public does not want them.

He told reporters he will make his determination of the public's attitude by touring the country next month. He said he'll ask housewives and others what they think about controls.
