Recently while the ship was participating in operational exercises off the coast of Southern California, Stumbo was stricken just as the ship had started on morning maneuvers.

Upon examination in the ship hospital, it was determined that he had appendicitis. The Coast Guard in San Diego sent a helicopter with doctor and corpsman.

The copter made an air pickup of Stumbo from the deck of the Powell and rushed him to the Navy hospital in San Diego.

The plane landed on the hospital lawn and by noon the appendix was removed.

Lloyd has now returned to the ship on which he serves with his twin brother, Harold L. Stumbo.

tions, service clubs and fraternal orders, professional, recreational and cultural groups. The knight of Sir Francis Drake by Queen Barbara as Queen Elizabeth, ended episode one.

Indian Folk Lore
Episode II directed by George Shanklin, went back to the beginning of time, as it was believed to be by the Indians, the legend: "In the beginning was a mountain, and on top of this mountain was a table of stone. And on this table was a shapeless mass, and from its center grew a living being in the form of, and was, a woman. She held a male child in her arms, and when she was fully grown she descended, eyes aglow with wonderment at the world spread round her. Leading her child to the valley at the base of the mountain, where the woman-mother, Snows, and the man child, Iswukaw, were joined by the wolf-friend Quartux."

The evil spirits were driven out by good spirits; then came the rain drops, the sun, the rainbow, Indian life was portrayed, leading to the coming of Jeddiah Smith and his party.

Stories of the coming of hunters and trappers, directed by Mrs. Joe Matthews, was episode III. Included were David Douglas, Hudson Bay trappers, Ewing Young, members of the Applegate Party, the Cornwall family, and others who made Douglas County history.

Early Settlement
Early settlement events were portrayed in episode IV, directed by Mrs. Jack Myers, while episode V, directed by Mrs. Harrie Booth brought progress to the present day, and featured skilled ballet dancing, with Patterson, Lucinda Randall, Ulah Rhoden and Sharon Rutter as principals, and many more taking part. "Procession of plants" featured industries of Douglas County.

In conclusion, the statue of liberty was raised behind the stage, and the combined chorus sang in grand finale, "This Is My Country."

To detail each event would not be possible here, but realistic Indian fights, a pioneer caravan burial, struggles for existence, early days at metropolis Scottsburg to sketch but a few, were pictorially portrayed in a manner befitting the efforts of Douglas County citizens who themselves made history in their portrayal of a "century of progress."

Former teachers living in the Roseburg area who are certified to teach in Oregon, are urged to register with the Assistant Superintendent of Schools in the Junior High School building, as substitute teachers.

A list of substitute teachers is now in preparation, which will serve as a source for the coming year.

Certificates Needed
It is important that all substitute teachers have their teaching certificate and health certificate registered with the County Superintendent of Schools at Douglas County Court House. Teachers who are eligible for teaching certificate should obtain their certificate from the Director of Certification, State Department of Education, Salem, Ore.

Need At All Levels
Substitute teachers will be needed on all levels of the public school program from the primary grades through the high school. Building principals will be supplied with a master list of substitutes who are duly certified and will call teachers from this list as needs arise.
