Hospitalization Insurance Open To Schoolchildren

Two types of low-rate accident insurance are available to every Roseburg school child—one for elementary and one for secondary age pupils. The insurance covers students during the time they're on the school premises, on the school bus, or during any activity sponsored by the school, reports Marvin E. Smith, assistant city superintendent. Students who participate in competitive sports must have additional coverage, which protects them from accidents that may occur during practice scrimmages or during games. Premiums for sports coverages are higher than for general coverage. Rates vary depending on the sport. Information concerning the premium rate and schedule of payments for medical benefits can be secured from the principal of the building where the student attends, Smith said. He urges parents to look into the insurance plans provided for Roseburg school children, as he says school officials are very much concerned as to whether or not all pupils have adequate protection.

Police Raid Cockfight Scene In Oregon City

OREGON CITY — A vacant establishment, which police here said he had been the scene of cockfights, was raided Tuesday and a number of betting sheets seized.
