\$40,000 Is Asked In Damage Claim

A \$40,000 civil suit was filed in Circuit Court Thursday by Jess Krummark against N. L. Upper. The suit grew out of a charge by the plaintiff that Upper "wrongfully entered premises" and cut one million feet of merchantable timber from property owned by the plaintiff.

According to the complaint, the plaintiff bought all the merchantable timber from the defendant. Another recovery of money suit was filed by New York Life Insurance Co. against Dewey J. and Charlotte E. Hoven for \$6,650.

The complaint states the plaintiff holds a mortgage on property owned by the defendants in the School Addition to Myrtle Creek to insure repayment of the consideration. The mortgage was assigned to the plaintiff by the Commonwealth Corp. The complaint asks judgment against the defendants or foreclosure of the mortgage.

Beryl Jackson, doing business as Beryl Jackson Equipment Co., filed suit against Clifford Losey for recovery of \$839.77 claimed due on payments for goods.

Idaho State Declared Polio Epidemic Area

BOISE — Idaho was declared a polio epidemic area Thursday.

Health authorities said, however, there was no cause for alarm; the cases are scattered throughout the state.

J. L. Peterson, administrative director of the Idaho Department of Public Health, and Joe Imhoff, chairman of the Idaho Polio Planning Committee, said the state has had 155 cases since Jan. 1. It was declared an epidemic area to assure adequate respiratory equipment and trained personnel.

Reedsport School Sign Up Far Exceeds Expectations

Anticipating a record enrollment of more than 500 pupils, the board and principal of Reedsport Grade School, District 105 C, were overwhelmed when the opening day of school found 622 pupils registered in the already congested class rooms.

And Principal Dale T. Waddell announced, with a mixture of exultation and despair, that enrollment was still growing.

Emergency steps were taken to employ additional teachers. Three rooms are already required for several of the grades, but additional grade break-downs will be necessary to eliminate the congested rooms.

The Reedsport Union High School District U 13, Principal Jack C. Flug, found increased enrollment less dramatic, but very real. A registration of 270 students represents an increase of 15 over the same day last year. The peak registration for 1951 was around 275 students.

The grade school enrollment for 1950 was 493; for 1951, 510. The current 462 is indicative of the recent growth of the community.

The high school announces that interest in new courses recently added to the curriculum is lively.

Highway Right-Of-Way Suit Filed By State

Failure of Frankie L. and Elizabeth E. Boye to yield right-of-way on the Umpqua highway has brought legal action with the filing of a complaint in Circuit Court by the State of Oregon.

The state charges the defendants with failure to yield a right-of-way on the Hinsdale Sloch-Luder Creek section of the Umpqua Highway. The complaint states that the defendants granted the State option to purchase the right-of-way for \$1,886 anytime within six months after Mar. 14, 1951.

The complaint continued that on May 24 of the same year, the plaintiff elected to exercise the option for 4.85 acres necessary for relocation of the highway. At this time, the defendants allegedly refused to execute the deed.

Money Recovery Suits Are Filed

Glen E. Cox filed suit in Circuit Court Thursday against Patricia Wood for a total of \$1,793.05 for damages allegedly received in an auto accident Nov. 16, 1951, on Highway 38.

The complaint states that Cox was driving his car west on Highway 38 about 13 miles east of Reedsport when the defendant, driving from the east, swerved into his lane. She allegedly struck the car Cox was driving and knocked a trailer he was towing over an embankment into the Umpqua River.

Cox charges negligence and asks \$293.05 for damage to the car and \$1,500 for damage to the trailer.

Another civil money action was filed by Frank B. Martin against Frank Martin for \$2,985. On the first cause, the plaintiff asks \$35 for payment for a bolt action gun. On the second cause, he asks \$1,850 for driving a log truck. In addition, he asks \$450 penalty for non-payment and \$850 attorney's fees.

In a third suit, James W. Pickett, administrator of the estate of James Riley Pickett, asks a cancellation of a property deed to May Pickett, widow of the deceased. The elder Pickett died July 1, 1951, intestate. James Pickett, administrator and son of the deceased, states the deed was never delivered and should be nullified on those grounds. According to the complaint, the deed was executed in 1950.

TRIAL DATE SET

The trial of Leroy Barkelov has been set Sept. 12 in District Court, reports Judge A. J. Geddes.

Barkelov was released on \$40 bail after pleading innocent to a charge of vagrancy.

BASIC RULE OFFENSE

Lawrence Shoemith, 27, of Portland was fined \$20 and released on payment Wednesday for violation of the basic rule, reports District Judge A. J. Geddes. Shoemith was arrested by state police.
