

Shrine-Polack Circus Billed Sept. 14, 15

Approach of the 1952 Shrine-Polack Bros. Circus is heralded by the advance reserved seat sale, which begins Monday, Sept. 8, at the Shrine Circus Office, 124 W. Cass St.

The circus itself will be presented by Hillah Temple and the Roseburg Shrine Club, Sunday and Monday, Sept. 14-15, at the Douglas County Fairgrounds, with afternoon and night performances both days, at 3:15 and 8:15.

Mostly new is the array of human talents promised by the Shrine Circus Committee. Sam Stinebaugh is chairman of Hillah Temple and Loran O'Neil for the Roseburg Shrine Club.

The Great Wallendas, one of circusdom's most illustrious families, offer exciting high-wire intrepidity, climaxed by their astonishing seven-person pyramid. Aerial heroes of another sort are found in the barefoot adagio teamwork of Les Geraldos. A newly conceived aerial ballet opens the show, and the mid-air pageantry of the nine Ward-Bell Flyers brings it to a brilliant conclusion. Still another aerial thriller is Miss Riotta's "date with danger" atop a 150-foot swaying pole.

Novelty enhances the trained-animal features. Jack Joyce's performing camels remain the only act of its kind in international circusdom. No other elephants move with the speed and precision of the famous Packs herd, presented by Mac and Peggy Macdonald.

Karlis Peterson's jockey dogs perform on horseback. Joe Lemke's chimpanzees combine comedy and skill in near-human antics. That rare Antarctic bird, the penguin, makes its circus debut with Albert Spiller's trained seals. "Excess Baggage" is a surprise presentation by Alma Michaels of Harold Gaultier's precocious poodles.

Korea Situation 'Confident,' Says Justice Douglas

SEOUL, (AP) — U. S. Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, visiting Korea on a Far Eastern tour, said Sunday night, he had found the Allied situation here "bursting with confidence, conviction and resolution."

"Our ability to hold here has saved the rice bowl area of Asia," Douglas said at a news conference. He explained that a Red breakthrough in Korea would have been the signal for Communist invasion of other Southeast Asian countries.

Donald Roy Johnson, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Johnson of Portland, died Sunday, Sept. 7, at the home of his grandmother, Mrs. Bess West, and uncle, R. E. Kirkland, on East 3rd Avenue, N. Roseburg. He had come to Roseburg for a visit 2 1/2 months ago when he became ill.

He was born Nov. 21, 1939 in Portland and had attended the Portland schools.

Surviving besides his parents are a brother, Ronald Johnson of Portland; his grandmother, Mrs. West; his grandfather, Emil West of Drain; an aunt, Marilyn West of Roseburg; three uncles, Kirkland, Franklin West and Arnold Robertson, all of Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held in The Chapel of The Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home, Tuesday at 11 a.m. (PST), with the Rev. Rea Kleinfeld of the First Christian Church officiating. The body will be taken to Portland for committal services and vault interment to be held in the Lincoln Memorial Park Wednesday, at 11 a.m. DST. Spread Of Polio Is Attributed To Raw Milk Use

FREDERICKSBURG, Tex. (AP) — Polio virus in raw milk caused six children in the Paul Pehl family to be stricken with the disease, State Health Officer George W. Cox said yesterday.

Dr. Cox and other health officials made a day-long inspection of the Pehl farm near here to find out why this great number of persons in one family had been infected with polio.

"The polio infection was undoubtedly carried in raw milk," Dr. Cox said. "The polio virus entered the milk during the milk process."

Six of the Pehl children are in a San Antonio Hospital with the disease. The only child not afflicted is a 13-year-old daughter.

Dr. Cox said that one of the Pehl boys apparently got the virus from a close friend who was stricken with polio before the Pehls. He said the Pehls milked their own cows and the chore passed from one child to the other.

Evidently the Pehl boy passed the virus to others in his family when, in milking the cows, he contaminated the raw milk.

Had the milk been pasteurized, Dr. Cox said, the family probably would not have been stricken.

The health officer said the Pehl inspection does not throw any added light on how polio is transmitted.

Sympathetic citizens of Gillespie County have contributed \$3,200 to aid the stricken family.

Weather Outlook Rain; Old Storm Dissipates

Torrential Rains Leave 5,000 Koreans Homeless

PUSAN, (AP) — Torrential rains last week left 5,000 persons in the Southwestern corner of Korea homeless and flooded thousands of acres of rice fields, government officials reported Monday.

Reports of damage were delayed by poor communications. No casualties were reported.

Damage in North Cholla Province was estimated by local authorities at \$15,000,000.

More than 300 farm houses were reported destroyed in South Cholla when four dykes were damaged, letting sea water flood farm lands.

State's Loss In Truck Issue Told By Sprague

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Statesman said Monday that if the truck industry's campaign on motor vehicle tax issues is successful, the state will lose more than 15 million dollars a year in highway revenue.

Publisher Charles A. Sprague, chairman of an organization opposing the truck industry's campaign, wrote that the counties would lose \$4,430,000 and the State Highway Department \$10,820,000 if the truckers' proposed constitutional amendment is approved by voters at the November general election.

The amendment would ban the use of mileage and weights in figuring truck taxes.

The amendment, if approved, would eliminate House Bill 465 which was passed by the last Legislature but which has not been put in effect because of the trucking industry's referendum.

Sprague said the House Bill would provide cities and counties with an additional \$500,000 a year and the state with \$1,390,000 a year.

Sprague said in his article that he had obtained his figures before Gov. Douglas McKay ordered the State Highway Department to stay out of the controversy. The department was authorized to supply information requested about the measures, however.

Sprague, former governor, is chairman of the Good Roads Alliance, a group of seven organizations opposing the truckers' campaign.

The name of the registered heifer is Brooknook Helen Second. Jones has 18 registered Shorthorns and has been trying for this award for four of his seven years in 4-H club work.

Carol Ann Burgin of Days Creek won a blue ribbon in the senior breadmaking contest Saturday.

Miss Burgin also won first alternate for a \$100 college scholarship in the General Foods jam and jelly contest last week.
