

SW Wage, Hour Division Office In Eugene Closed

Information and advisory services which have been performed by the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division office in Eugene on behalf of the Wage Stabilization Board and the Salary Stabilization Board in Southwestern Oregon have been terminated.

Announcement of the termination was made today by Madison R. Smith, field office supervisor for the Division in Oregon, at the Portland headquarters.

All petitions for wage adjustments, requests for rulings and interpretations, letters of general inquiry and requests for forms, regulations or printed matter on wage stabilization originating in Southwestern Oregon can be sent to the Portland Wage-Hour office until Oct. 1, Smith said. After that date, wage and salary stabilization services will remain available with the respective regional board offices.

The Wage-Hour Division will continue after Oct. 1 to make investigations, under the direction of the regional WSB, to determine compliance with wage stabilization requirements, Smith said.

Death Toll Is Now 28 In Jet Plane Explosion

LONDON — The death toll in the explosion of Britain's De Havilland 110 jet fighter at the Farnborough air show Saturday rose to 28 Monday as a 14-year-old boy died in a London hospital.

The De Havilland fighter disintegrated and showered wreckage over the spectators in diving from 40,000 feet and cracking through the sound barrier.

Test Pilot John Derry and his observer were among the 28 killed. Sixty-three others were injured.

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Speaker Says Mental Illness Not Increasing

alone is more than the cost of our mental hospitals.

The young speaker, in an appeal to our ministers to teach parents and teachers methods of preventing emotional stress, suggested several ideas whereby they may reduce conflicting forces in modern society.

Ideas Suggested

One suggestion, that of involving teen-agers in baby sitting, came about as a result of modern mothers being frightened by their own children. He cited results of a survey taken in 1948 showing that 58 per cent of a group of young women, who were mothers for the first time, had never before held an infant in their arms.

Another suggestion, one of method, was that education involving emotional interplay rather than lectures is more effective in teaching. Murphy explained that education has been dealing with the intellect while we live with emotions.

Murphy proved his belief in the theory of democratic participation by involving the group in a discussion of the mental health of our communities rather than making a regular after dinner speech.

Chaplain Needed

The need of chaplains in our mental institutions was discussed and Murphy suggested church support in a program to provide money for this need.

When questioned about clinics in the several cities of Oregon, Murphy told the group of about 35 that funds should be provided locally to supply a staff until state aid is available. Many times, he said, trained medical specialists are available on short notice but no funds are available from the state until the legislature can provide such for the specialists usually immediately consequently they find work in civilian capacity.

The group of ministers met at the Veterans Hospital at 9 a.m. this morning to witness psychological therapy.

A committee was appointed by Rev. Morris Roach to steer evaluation of the conference Wednesday morning.

Texas Demos Support Ike

In an unprecedented move, the organized Democratic party of Texas marched into the camp of Eisenhower. At an Amarillo convention yesterday, cheering Democrat leaders gave Texas Democratic voters the green light to vote for the general and try to swing Texas 24 electoral votes to Eisenhower in November.

The convention, hosted by Stevenson, voted to put the Democratic candidate's name on the November ballot, but in a resolution went further and asked Gov. Allan Shivers and other party officials to campaign for Eisenhower.

The big news today, however, was the McCarthy sweep in Wisconsin. The jubilant senator called his victory an endorsement of the people "of my campaign to rid the government of subversive forces that would destroy it."

Schmitt, the loser, said McCarthy had won the election through "an amazing and fraudulent hoax" perpetrated on the voters who, he said, some day would be ashamed of their support for McCarthy.

McCarthy's victory will pit him in November against either Thomas Fairchild or Henry Reuss, Democratic candidates. The outcome of their race was still undecided early today, although Fairchild was leading.

Other Wisconsin primary contests saw all incumbent congressmen—eight Republicans and one Democrat—apparently winning re-election.

Hydrogen Bomb May Be Exploded In New Test

them are more than 20 miles from the "shot" islands where conventional atomic explosions have been set off.

Tremendous Heat

In addition to the vastly increased area of blast and heat from a hydrogen bomb explosion, other factors might have to be considered.

Some scientists think that the terrific explosion and the creation of intense heat might produce highly dangerous air turbulence after the blast—perhaps brief but deadly winds of superhurricane force. Even standard A-bomb explosions produce turbulence for a few minutes after the blast.

Moreover, the immense force of a hydrogen explosion only 200 or 300 feet above the level of one of the small coral islands might blast away the island and create submarine landslides which could set off a tidal wave, local in range but still a menace to other islands in the lagoon.

Task Force 132, which will conduct the tests, started to organize a few months after the last series of Eniwetok tests in 1951. Its headquarters, pending departure for Eniwetok, has been in the Pentagon.

Rioting Prisoners Quit When Tear Gas Fired

EL RENO, Okla. — Some 155 prisoners at the federal reformatory here rioted Tuesday, but quickly surrendered when guards fired tear gas into their midst.

Warden W. H. Hardwick said the prisoners overpowered two guards and threw them into a cell shortly after they were released for breakfast.

The guards were rescued unharmed. There was no damage reported.

COBB'S SON DIES

MENLO PARK, Calif. — Dr. Tyrus Raymond Cobb Jr., 42, one of five children of baseball's immortal Ty Cobb, died Tuesday.

Dr. Cobb practiced as a physician at Dublin, Ga., until stricken last year with a malignant tumor of the brain.

Smoke Signals Phone Operators Go Out In Huff

PORTLAND — About the best way to communicate with Stevenson, Wash., Monday was with smoke signals, after all.

That's what Oregon-Washington Telephone Company customers predicted dourly in the recent county fair. Some of them entered a float that portrayed the Indians' smoke signalling as a method superior to the local telephone system.

That so infuriated the six Stevenson telephone operators that they walked off the job Saturday, and said they would not come back until the float sponsors apologized to them.

They put up signs, "Use Sparko-Flamo for better smoke signals." The float sponsors refused to apologize, asserting that no apology was in line, since the float was aimed at the service, not the operators.

For a while telephone service limped along with Earl Dean, vice-president of the company, trying to man the switchboard himself. It must have been too much for him. Repeated attempts failed Monday to raise anyone at the switchboard in Stevenson, a town of 550 across the Columbia River from Oregon.

Secretary-General Azam Resigns Post

CAIRO, Egypt — Abdel Rahman Azam, Egyptian secretary-general of the powerful Arab League, resigned unexpectedly last night. He quit only a few hours before the seven-nation organization opened one of its most important sessions.

No reasons were given immediately for his decision to quit. Egypt has played a dominant role in the league through Azam, who has been secretary-general since its foundation in 1945. His term was not due to expire until July, 1953.

Other states in the league are Jordan, Iraq, Saudi Arabia, Lebanon, Syria and Yemen. 5

Brig. General Britt Dies At Santa Barbara

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. — Brig. Gen. Sereno R. Brett, the first chief of staff of the U. S. armored forces, died Tuesday after a long illness. He was 80.

During World War I, he was second in command of the U. S. Tank Corps under then Lt. Col. George S. Patton. Gen. Brett was thrice wounded and won many decorations.

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
