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Knowland Hits Korean Policy

LA GRANDE (AP) — Sen. William Knowland, California Republican, said Thursday night he did not believe Americans should be asked to fight and die in Korea and be denied the right to win.

His statement was made in criticism of the administration's foreign policy in an address here on a campaign tour of Eastern Oregon for the Republican ticket.

Knowland said he did not consider the Korean War a good example of the operation of United Nations collective security. He added that of the 55 free nations in the U.N. only 17 had contributed men and materials to the Korean effort.

In another reference to the Korean War he said:

"I do not believe that the government of the United States, the President of the United States or the United Nations have the right to ask Americans to fight and die and deny them the right to win."

Senator Taft Offers Support To Eisenhower

He said he will "speak anywhere to the extent of my ability" in Eisenhower's behalf.

Friday's harmony tete-a-tete came after a series of overtures from Eisenhower's camp, expressing hope for an early meeting with Taft. But the Senator had been mostly silent on the subject until Friday.

The Ohio Senator said he is convinced Eisenhower "will carry out the policies of the Republican platform," and that he subscribes to principles adopted by a Republican steering committee in Congress.

But while ready to give the general full endorsement, Taft indicated there were "incidental issues" between them.

Subordinate Differences. It is the nature of a party system, he said, that members must subordinate such minor differences in the cause of basic principles.

He said Eisenhower agreed with him that there was "one great fundamental issue between the Republican party and the fair deal, the New Deal and the Stevenson Deal."

Taft called Democratic presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson "a representative of the left wingers, if not a left-winger himself."

He said that he (Taft) was apparently more willing to speak out against President Truman — "I Secretary of State Acheson than 'Eisenhower seems prepared to do."

Taft was told by a reporter that Eisenhower had said he would not deal in personalities. Senator Taft said:

"I have no hesitation about dealing in personalities. I will say more things about Truman and Acheson."

Dr. Fawcett, Formerly Of Glendale, Passes

Dr. Arthur J. Fawcett, 79, resident of Grants Pass, died Sept. 11 after a short illness in the Roseburg Veterans Hospital. He was born March 21, 1873 in Plattsville, Ohio and came to this community 43 years ago.

He was a former resident of Glendale and practiced medicine there until his retirement a few years ago. He was a member of the BPO Elks of Ashland and of the American Legion Post of Canyonville.

Surviving are the widow, Verle, Grants Pass; a brother, Walter H. Fawcett, Colorado Springs, Colo., and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held Sunday, Sept. 14, at 3 p.m. in the Presbyterian Church in Glendale with the Rev. J. K. Howard officiating. Interment will follow in the Odd Fellows Cemetery in Myrtle Creek. The Roseburg Funeral Home is in charge of the arrangements.

Glendale School News Report

The District 77 School Board met Thursday evening at the school to discuss plans and specifications for the proposed new high school building.

Attorney George Neuner and Mr. Hamblin, Eugene Architect, were scheduled to attend so that the group might study plans and specifications pursuant to the bond issue election.

The plans being discussed, according to Dudley Ross, school board member, call for a building with nine classrooms, including four general classrooms, a home economics room, boys' manual training room, science room, gymnasium, and library.

Fees Explained
School entrance fees this fall at the Consolidated District 77 High School and Junior High in Glendale range from \$9.00 for the Junior High to \$13.00 for Senior High.

Of this amount, \$3.00 is for student body fees, \$3.00 for towel fee, and \$1.50 for general student insurance. Work books of various types, and for the senior high group, textbook rental fees comprise the remainder of the total.

All students are required to carry the general student insurance. In addition, there is an added insurance fee for athletic competition \$4.00 for football, \$2.00 for basketball and \$1.50 each for track and baseball. These latter fees must be paid for any particular sport before a student turns out for practice.

According to the instruction sheet issued to the student on registration day, all fees are due within the first month of school and must be paid within a 45 day period or be turned over to a collection agency.

Pupils of the District 77 Consolidated School in Glendale will be taken by school bus and private car Monday to attend the Shrine Circus in Roseburg. Buses will be attended by a police escort and chaperones will be provided by the Glendale Masonic Lodge.

The Parent-Teachers Association reception for teachers will be held at the regular meeting, Sept. 29 at 8 p.m. in the school gymnasium. The reception was first planned for this week but was postponed because permanent teachers have not yet been hired for three classes.
