Landlords Bribe Bums To Take Over Property

LONDON (AP)—Some landlords—caught between Britain's low rent ceilings and high housing repair standards—are bribing bums to take over their property.

Alex Ling, who presided at a meeting yesterday of the Executive Committee of the National Federation of Property Owners, said he knew of about 30 such cases. A. G. Anderson told the committee he had used the method to dump several run-down houses for their owners.

By paying a tramp a few pounds to accept title to an old house, Anderson explained, "future liability is thus escaped, and the property is abandoned, leaving the local council either to take it over or let it fall down."

The property owners association is asking the government to review laws which have kept rents on unfurnished houses and apartments in Britain frozen at virtually the pre-war level. Much of these meager returns are eaten up as a result of strict laws requiring landlords to keep their houses in repair.

Detroit Dam Open To Public Saturday

PORTLAND (AP)—The Army Engineers reported Thursday that Detroit Dam on the North Santiam River would be open to the public today.

The dam, with a powerhouse at its base, is 49 miles east of Salem. Visitors will be taken on tours from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Although pouring of concrete is about completed, work on the dam and reservoir will not be finished until next year. First power is expected in early 1953.

Although the fourth of the Willamette Valley dams to be built, it will be the first to produce power since Fern Ridge, Cottage Grove and Dorena are for flood control only.
