Oregon Grid Fans To See 'Aerial Circus' In PCC

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — The University of Oregon, which has two fine players, probably will put on the biggest aerial circus in the coast conference this fall.

It will be Hal Dunham, strong-armed senior quarterback from Walla Walla, Wash., doing most of the throwing, backed up by rangy George Shaw of Portland, a sensation as a freshman last season. Coach Len Casanova inherited these two when he took over at Oregon last season, and he promptly turned them loose to set a conference record for the number of passes thrown.

He fully expects them to break their own record this season. Dunham completed 82 of 139 attempts last year; Shaw, who was used mostly on defense, completed 34 of 82 tries.

Bulldogs Fall, 27-0, Before Wolverines

Martin Norris, big 200-pound tackle, turned in a spectacular, one-man performance in an attempt to stop a high-powered Willamette High School football squad, but the Wolverines skirted him well enough to capture an easy 27-0 victory over Sutherlin Friday afternoon.

The Bulldogs faltered after the opening kickoff when Mervin Koozer sparked a drive from his own 34 to the Willamette 31. A fumble by Chuck DeGroot left the Sutherlin squad in a bog, and from then on, it was a story of Willamette offense.

Late in the first quarter, the Wolverines drove into the end zone when Hal Sullivan, a junior halfback pranced around end and shook off three Sutherlin tacklers from midfield to take 36 yards. He made it 7-0 by booting the extra point.

Sutherlin Nemesis
Then, in the second quarter, Sullivan again proved a Sutherlin nemesis. He ran a punt back to the Sutherlin 35 and the Wolverines smelled blood again. They drove down to the nine where Ron Sustello faded back and passed to George Shephard for a second score. Sullivan again kicked on through to push the halftime score to 14-0.

It was in the air the Bulldogs ran into trouble. In spite of the perfect, almost hot, football weather, the Sutherlin squad couldn't overtake the flying pigskin could. It was a matter of a matter of shaky pass defense and inept pass offense.

In the first half, the Wolverines were aided to their second score by some effective passing by Sustello.

Again as the second half got underway, Sustello got outstanding protection as he faded back and dropped a perfect heave from 30 yards out into the waiting arms of Shephard again. Shephard was all alone as the lazy pass drifted into his hands.

Sullivan Snaps Pass
That rocky Sullivan put on the finishing touches to the Willamette victory by snagging one of Dave Crippen's passes on the Willamette 44. He scattered to the sidelines and easily outran the defense. This went for the distance. He made the final point by kicking the extra point.

Mervin Koozer did some effective work from his wingback spot, especially on cutbacks through tackles. With him as a spearhead, the Bulldogs moved to the Willamette 28 when the gun sounded. That was as close as Coach Ralph Devos's charges progressed to the Willamette goal. Koozer gained 17 yards in 17 carries for a 4.5 average.

It was Martin Norris, however, who stole the hearts of the handful of Sutherlin fans who ranged along the sidelines. Especially in the second half, he was tearing enemy plays apart consistently.

Portland's Beavers, driving hard to finish in the Pacific Coast League's first division, were in fourth place Saturday a full game ahead of the slipping San Diego Padres.

The Beavers climbed into the upper half of the standings Friday night by humbling tail-end Sacramento, 8-3, while the third-place Seattle Rainiers dropped the Padres, 5-2, on Vern Kindsfather's 20th win of the season.

Portland trails Seattle by two and one-half games.

In Hollywood, the Stars twinkled brightly as the league pennant flustered only inches from their grasp.

Hollywood's crucial 5-3 triumph over second place Oakland was virtually the Oaks' swan song insofar as their championship hopes were concerned.

Oakland made a present of the first of a vital four-game series by

throwing away one run and giving Hollywood two others. The Oaks now trail by 5 1/2 games and must win all of their remaining 11 games to catch up.

The Oaks gave away a run in their half of the seventh when Sam Chapman crossed the plate after what appeared to be a triple combined with an error. But he'd neglected to touch first base and was out.

In the Hollywood half, with two out and Erv Dusak on third, Left Fielder Piper Davis dropped Ted Beard's fly. Dusak scored as did Davis later.

In San Francisco, the Los Angeles Angels stalled nine innings before blasting across two tallies, both via the home run route. But the Seals, who got off to a sky-rocket start, whipped the Angels 6-2.

Admiring Pitcher Frank Smith and Robby Adams brought the world crashing down around Maglie's ears.

Chicago swept a two-night double from the Phillies, 5-1 and 7-0. Paul Minner took the first and Bob Kelly blanked the Phils with three hits in the second.

Ralph Kiner hit his 35th and 36th homers in Pittsburgh's first game triumph at Boston, 8-1. The Braves, behind Ernie Johnson, did all the slugging in the second game when they overwhelmed the Pirates, 16-0.

The Philadelphia Phillies called for three in the seventh and three more in the eighth to nip Detroit's four game win streak, 7-6. Freddie Marsh singled home Ray Coleman in the 10th inning for the St. Louis Browns' 5-4 win over Washington.

Locals Start Good; Fumble Ends Spirit

For approximately one minute, the Roseburg Indians displayed a championship caliber that must have turned Coach Hank Nilsen's face white.

Then, advance stages of "buck" fever settled over the Bill Rader charges like a great black cloud. This more than any other factor gave the Eugene Axemen an easy 27-0 triumph in the first meeting of the two teams at Civic Stadium.

It was a heart-breaking debut for the 1952 edition of the Roseburg Indians. It spelled the first District 5-A-1 loss and also started the season off on a sour note.

Their spirit was broken in a single instant. Never has a local team seen the tide of play change so quickly. In the first series of plays, the Indians had the Axemen rocking on their heels. Then showed that rising spirit into the dust.

Stopped On Kickoff

The Axemen received on the first kickoff by Gene Lane and before they knew what happened, they were trying desperately to work away from their own goal line. Scatback Jerry Wilks took the kickoff on his own 15 and was stopped in his tracks. He took the ball on the first play from scrimmage and Jim Gilbert rocketed through the line to smear him on the Eugene 7.

Arden Christensen at the other halfback got a chance and made just two yards. The whole Roseburg wall swarmed over him. On the fourth down, Quarterback Jack Henkel needed no coaching to punt out of danger.

That punt set the stage for the death knell of Indian hopes. The high kick cut diagonally across the field to Roger Ollar on the Eugene 40. He was almost out in the open with sensational possibilities of putting the Axemen in the hole for good.

Into Wrong Arms

Instead, the ball plummeted through the waiting arms of Arden Christensen and Roger Ollar. On the 40, that might just as well have been the end of the game for the Indians.

Surprisingly, it was a running attack that pushed Eugene all the way on that 60-yard drive to the goal. The brilliant passing of Jack Henkel was still to be unveiled.

The jittery Roseburg squad didn't wait long to give him a chance to display his wares. On the next kickoff, the ball floated down to Larry Fitzgerald and bounded away from him to settle in the clutching arms of Arden Christensen on the Roseburg 33.

Elks To Entertain Indian Squad, Coaches

Members of the Elks Lodge will entertain the Roseburg High School football squad and coaches and other athletic officials next Thursday at a luncheon.

Team members will be introduced to lodge members and football movies will be shown. The event is an annual affair.

After the Henkel misfire, he bulleted a pass to Don Alinge for 11 yards to the Roseburg 27. A pair of running plays took the ball to the 6. Henkel flipped a short five-yard gem to Don Smith on the one where Fullback Bob Morgan bulled it over. Stuffed failed to run the extra point over and the score was 13-0 with 10 minutes and 50 seconds gone.

Had Ball Twice
Roseburg got its chance just before the quarter, but the jitters had reached full-scale proportions. All the while, the Indians had their hands on the ball for two plays in the entire 12-minute quarter.

One play after the second quarter started and Bud Backen kicked out of danger—but only momentarily.

Henkel began filling the air with passes that carried his fired-up Axemen to another score.

Again the try for point failed, but the score was a disheartening 20-0.

For a moment after the next kickoff, the Indians appeared to have generated a spark. A line play failed, but Quarterback Backen faded back behind good protection and uncorked a 24-yard pass that End Ron Hicks took on his finger tips. That was the only first down of the first half for the locals. Two jarring losses on the next three plays put a deep freeze on the Roseburg drive.

Ollar Made 12
Roger Ollar churned off 12 yards to launch the second half but again the machine stalled and the ball went to the talented Henkel.

Jim Gilbert recovered a Eugene fumble in the next series of plays. But the Indians couldn't build up the steam to pull out of the hole again.

They were stopped on their own 25 when Danchok failed to make a yard on the fourth down. Henkel's passes and Wilks' running added up to the fourth score and the rout was complete.

The one bright star on the gloomy Roseburg horizon was End Ron Hicks. He played probably the greatest game of his life in spite of the odds. He never
