PORTLAND, Ore. — Only 1,755,680 bushels of wheat were exported from Portland during August, the Merchants Exchange reported Wednesday.

During August of last year 4,273,876 bushels were moved. The August drop this year cut the total for the first eight months of 1952 to about two million bushels under the same period last year.

The exchange reported that total export tonnage, including lumber and other products, exceeded last year's shipments.

Lebanon Hospital Is 1000th Under Government Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — Formal opening of a 40-bed hospital at Lebanon, Ore., Oct. 12 will mark completion of the 1,000th hospital built under the Hill-Burton Act.

Dr. Leonard A. Scheele, U.S. Surgeon General, will be one of the speakers at the ceremony which will be attended by government officials and leaders in the hospital field.

The new hospital, built at a cost of \$193,667 to the federal government, replaces an obsolete 21-bed structure, the Federal Security Agency (FSA) said in an announcement Monday.

The Hill-Burton Act was passed by Congress in 1946 to help communities meet critical needs for hospitals. It now permits the federal government to pay up to two-thirds of their cost. Originally, local interests had to put up at least two-thirds.

FSA Administrator Oscar R. Ewing said the government has put 500 million dollars into such hospitals while states and local communities have contributed about twice that amount.

The FSA said 800 additional new hospitals or additions are in various stages of planning or construction.

The celebration was originally scheduled to take place Sunday, but was postponed when President Truman told public health officials he "hoped to attend." He later advised he could not because of "other commitments."

Pacific Tel and Tel Allowed To Sell Stock

SALEM, Ore. — Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel authorized the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. Friday to sell 105 million dollars worth of stocks and bonds to expand the company's property.

Similar permission has been given by the California Public Utilities Commission. The company has to get the approval from each state in which it operates.

The order allows sale of \$70,337,500 worth of common stock to the company's stockholders, and 35 millions in 27-year bonds at competitive bidding.

Break Down Of Automobile Led To Academy's Founding

Bob Shaffer, whom you see above, administrator of the thriving Canyonville Bible Academy, was in reminiscent mood as I dropped in at his office several days ago. "The Shaffer family," he said, "had left our home near Denver fully expecting to settle somewhere in Southern California."

He recalled in answer to a query of mine: "First, however, traveling through the Pacific Northwest. On our way South we camped one evening in a likely-looking spot in the Canyon Creek canyon just out of Canyonville and when we climbed in our car — an old Willys-Knight sedan — to resume our journey next morning, the engine started o.k., but the gears wouldn't mesh. They just simply wouldn't. This was back in 1923, and cars broke down more frequently then they do today. But we couldn't get that car to budge. After a while a man came along and although he didn't know anything about cars, he did know one of the finest chamber-of-commerce spiels we'd ever heard. 'You're in no hurry to get to California,' he decided. 'Why don't you just continue camping here until you can get your car fixed and in the meantime see something of this wonderfully glorious country around Canyonville? They are picking prunes at Lou Knight's orchard and you can make some friends, and make money too if that interests you.'"

Proposition Appealed

"The proposition appealed to us," Bob continued. "Always we liked to make friends, and we did need money, having very little. We picked prunes that day and when we returned that evening to camp and found the car would work perfectly (without even having had any mechanical attention) we decided to stay until the prune harvest ended anyway. We did and the upshot of it all was we never left Canyonville and are mighty glad we didn't!"

The senior Mr. Shaffer was an evangelist and soon was greatly in demand for conducting church services and holding evangelistic meetings. With the financial support of neighbors and other friends a small church was built, this proving the humble beginning of an effort which later embraced the establishment of a school, a school which has grown and prospered academically as well as financially, until today instruction is given there to 150 students and Mr. Shaffer estimates the investment in buildings and equipment as representing more than half a million dollars.

That breakdown of the old Willys-Knight proved a fortunate occurrence for the Shaffers. I owned a Willys-Knight once too and it broke down frequently — each change of the moon as I recall it — but I never had any luck because of it. On the contrary, which only goes to prove that what's poison, as has been said before but not so philosophically, perhaps.

Lillie Gives Up Six Guns, Truck For Petticoats

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — The gal from Six-Shooter Junction — who rode a bucking truck to fame and success — is selling out her motor freight line and going into apron-string retirement.

She's Lillie Drennan, who after 24 years of tough competition on the road, is selling her Drennan Truck Line to a larger firm, giving up her truck operator's license, and tuning to petticoats and frills.

"I never thought I'd live to see the day," the 55-year-old Lillie said yesterday when the Houston Freight Carriers Association honored her with a luncheon. "Now's as good a time as any to retire," she said with a touch of remorse in her husky voice.

Time was when Lillie would just about as soon be caught dead as in apron strings and petticoats. She was reared and still lives at Hempstead, north of Houston, the now peaceful little city known for its watermelons which was called Six-Shooter Junction in its volcanic, gun-fighting early days.

It's been said that in those days pistol-packing Lillie's language, when the situation called for forceful expletives, would blister a rock. Lillie, speakers at the luncheon said, always fought for what she thought was right. And she had a reputation for straight-shooting, with her gun or her word. Ironically, the only time she was confronted by a hijacker she had left the gun at home.

She's not as familiar with petticoats and other frilly things as most women, but she can look mighty fancy when the occasion arises — like yesterday at the banquet.

But she feels more at home in a 10-gallon hat and trousers, oil-field boots and shirt.

She entered the trucking business in 1928 driving a 1½-ton model T Ford truck and hauling oil well supplies to the booming, tough East Texas oil fields. Many times her cargo was TNT or dynamite.

"Those were the days," she recalled. "When anybody with a broken-down truck could go into business. It was strictly a cut-throat game with everyone out for every dollar they could get."

Now, she says, she guesses she'll just "take it easy for awhile."

But her friends wonder. Lillie in petticoats?

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Shrine-Polack Circus Sets Up At Fairgrounds Sunday

Like a modern and benevolent Pied Piper, at the Douglas County Fairgrounds, Sunday and Monday, the second annual Hillah Temple-Roseburg Shrine Club-Polack Bros. Circus will exert its magnetic influence over those who are young in years and those still young in spirit.

The circus is to arrive in Roseburg early Sunday morning and immediately start setting up in front of the fairgrounds in preparation for its opening performance at 3:15 that afternoon, another at 8:15 at night, and two more Monday, afternoon and night, at 3:15 and 8:15.

Many children, who otherwise would be able to attend, will be entertained at the matinees through blocks of tickets donated by business and professional men, industrial concerns, fraternal organizations and civic clubs. Various groups of youngsters are to be brought from neighboring towns by bus to Monday's matinee, whereas local school children are urged to turn out for Sunday afternoon's show.

Comes From Eugene

The circus, coming here from Eugene, began its swing through the Pacific Northwest at Seattle and recently played to more than 125,000 people during the 11 days of the Pacific National Exhibition at Vancouver, B.C. Previously, the show won acclaim in 18 cities of California, including Sacramento, Oakland, San Francisco and Los Angeles. After stops at Medford and Klamath Falls, its itinerary will lead eastward by way of Denver.

Birds, beasts and human performers from points of origin all over the world make up the international array of talent of this year's edition.

A special baggage car brings the famous Packs Elephant Prodigies, which comes from Siam, and Joyce's performing Camels, whose forebears were transplanted from Arabia to Australia a century ago.

Birds in the entourage are Spiller's penguins from the Antarctic, which perform with seals from Pacific waters off southern California.

Others of the animal kingdom are Lemke's chimpanzees from the Belgian Congo and Karl's Peterson's horseback-riding jockey dogs, whose Latvian trainer brought them from Europe three years ago. Five are German shepherds, and with them are two terriers, an Airle and a cross-bred Great Dane.

French Dog Expert

Harold Gautier, trainer of the poodles in "Excess Baggage," is of a long line of celebrated French dog experts, though his shaggy performers are of American origin.

Europe is strongly represented among the human performers. From France come Les Geraldos,
