

### Indiana Brewer Indicted For Tax Income Evasion

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lawrence P. Bardin, former Indiana brewer whose name has brought into congressional complaints of government tax irregularities, was indicted Friday on charges of trying to evade his 1946 income taxes. The two-count indictment, at Indianapolis, was announced by Attorney General McGranery. Bardin's name figured prominently in charges by Senator Williams (R-Del.) in Williams' recitation of alleged irregularities in the Internal Revenue Bureau. McGranery's announcement described Bardin as former manager of the Indianapolis Brewing Company. The two counts charged that Bardin reported an income of \$528,824 and a tax thereon of \$246,382 for 1946, but should have reported \$759,827 and paid a tax of \$639,841. Williams told the Senate February 14 that Bardin settled a big tax claim for a small amount after Joseph D. Nunan Jr., former commissioner of internal revenue, obtained a special permit to represent the brewing firm. Nunan said, however, that he never represented the brewing company, never spoke to anyone in its behalf and never received a fee from the company.

### Dentist Believes Decay Of Teeth May Be Ended

ST. LOUIS (AP) — A Michigan dentist believes that within 30 years a whole generation of young people may be relatively free of dental decay because of the widespread fluoridation of community water supplies. Dr. W. N. Miller of Flint, Mich., told delegates to the American Dental Association convention Thursday increased fluoridation could revolutionize the practice of dentistry. His prediction of a decay-free generation, however, is based on a fluoridated water supply in the nation's major cities within the next 10 years. Extended fluoridation, Dr. Miller said, would leave the nation's dentists free of time-consuming restoration and replacement treatment and give them more time for treatment of other diseases.

### Soviet Control Commissioner Orders Ban Lift

BERLIN (AP) — Gen. Vasily M. Chuikov, chief of the Soviet Control Commission, notified American authorities Thursday night officially that the three-day "blockade" of U. S. Military police patrols between the city and a frontier outpost has been lifted by his order. The American headquarters for Berlin disclosed receipt of the note from Chuikov which said the Allied military patrols would henceforth be free to cross a disputed strip of Russian zone territory in order to drive from West Berlin to their border checkpoint duty assignments. Soviet tommygunners had halted both American and British MP's starting last Monday night in what looked like a test of the Allied rights of access to the main highway linking Berlin with West Germany, 100 miles away. U. S. High Commissioner Walter J. Donnelly personally intervened with Chuikov with a request to stop what he called unwarranted heckling of the Western occupying powers. Earlier, the blockade had been lifted temporarily to let a patrol go through.

### Congress Budget Cut Hurts Vets, Board Says

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Legion's Medical Advisory Board says cuts by Congress in funds for medical care of veterans have hurt the quality of service given by the Veterans Administration.  
Dr. Leonard G. Rountree of Miami, Fla., the board's chairman, told a news conference yesterday that Veterans Administrator Carl R. Gray Jr. disagrees with that view. He said Gray contends reductions in service to veterans have been in quantity only, not in quality.  
Rountree said the board believes unanimously that one effect of the 31-million-dollar cut voted by Congress in the V. A.'s medical budget requests has been to bring a sense of insecurity to the agency's medical personnel.

### Maryland Theaters May Show Film 'The Miracle'

BALTIMORE (AP) — It's all right for theaters in Maryland to show the Italian film "The Miracle."  
The State Board of Censors reluctantly cleared the film on the basis of a recent Supreme Court decision which held sacrilege was no basis for state censorship of films.  
However, the board called "The Miracle" an "obvious indignity to religious personages and beliefs." The film depicts the seduction of a feeble-minded girl by a stranger whom she confuses with a saint. It previously was banned in the state.
