Agriculture Important In County's Economy

households. The per capita buying income of the rural residents of the county is \$992 and the family buying power is \$3,106. This buying income is on a parity with the other counties in the state where lumbering is important such as Linn, Lane, Coos and others and, is higher than the counties in the state such as Washington and Yamhill counties that are largely controlled by an agricultural economy. The total effective buying income of the residents of Douglas County last year, was \$54,659,000 and of that amount \$49,197,000 was spent with the retail stores for consumer goods.

The per capita buying income of the urban residents was \$1,017 and the urban family effective buying was \$3,417. The difference between the urban and rural effective buying income is accounted for by the fact that the income for the purchase of consumer goods is based on a cash income. The analysis does not give effect to the fact that many of the Douglas County households are located on farms. These farms produce the meat, eggs, vegetables, milk and fruits consumed by the farm families rather than converting these products into cash. Therefore, the effective buying income of the farm families is some \$311 dollars less than the urban families.

According to a survey recently made by the U. S. Production and Marketing Administration, farm products distributors and farm association officials, the general agricultural outlook in Douglas County for 1952, appears to be promising of better cash returns and a larger volume of production in almost all lines of farm products.

Roseburg Posts High Valuation On Building List

Roseburg was fourth highest among 19 Oregon cities in percentage increase in building valuation from July to August, 1952, and it held the same rank in increase for August 1952, over August, 1951.

This was shown in a report just issued by the Equitable Saving and Loan Association's statistical department.

Roseburg's percentage increase was 240 for the August over July figure and 78 per cent for the August 1952 over 1951 amount. In August of this year Roseburg had a building valuation of \$250,120, which was fifth highest in the state. This represents quite a jump from the July, 1952, and August, 1951, figures, which were \$73,915 and \$140,164, respectively. The July, 1952 figure placed the city 13th in the state. She was eighth with the 1951 sum.

St. Helens led the cities in August over July, 1952, percentage increase. She was followed by Oregon City and Astoria, in order. The Dalles had the greatest August, 1952, over August, 1951, increase, followed by Pendleton and Astoria.

Roseburg's increases were far higher than the all-state Oregon averages of 14 per cent for August over July, 1952, and 10 per cent for this August over 1951.

And both the Roseburg and the state figures were not in keeping with a definite downward trend in the 46 Pacific Northwest cities studied. The combined building valuations for the entire area showed a 31 per cent decrease from July and 20 per cent from August, 1951.

Major project in Roseburg included in the August, 1952, sum is the \$173,000 Senior High School shop building.

U.S. National Branch Posts 2 New Records

Deposits of the Roseburg branch of the U.S. National Bank of Portland totaled \$17,667,858.88 in the Sept. 5 report to the Comptroller of the Currency, reports H. E. Schmeer, manager. Loans and discounts for the Roseburg branch totaled \$6,229,760.44.

The U.S. National listed deposits of \$619,313,010.03, a gain of \$46,234,614.73 during the year, and an all-time high figure for the institution. Loans and discounts also reached a new record amounting to \$219,446,113.50, an increase of \$27,839,229.18 over the corresponding report date of a year ago.

The U.S. National now lists total resources of \$668,882,910.38 as compared with \$615,395,174.19 reported for the same period last year, Schmeer states.

Africa Missions Topic Of Talk

Stories of the infamous secret societies of the West African Coast will be just one of the tales two women missionaries from Africa will tell at 7:45 p.m. today at the Church of the Open Bible, 942 S. Jackson St.

The two — Miss Lucille Jenkins and Miss Norma Van Hooser, R. N. — will show kodachrome slides to illustrate their account of missionary work in Liberia during the past 104 years of the republic's history.

Miss Jenkins first went to Liberia in 1935. Since her first visit, the Open Bible Standard mission work there has grown to include a full-time clinic, a school with secular subjects through the eighth grade, a Sunday School and Church program, and a training school for national pastors and evangelists. Eight missionaries carry on this program.

Miss Van Hooser, who's in charge of the mission's clinical work, will describe how the mission has changed the native custom whereby those who became helpless were left to die in the jungle. Now they come to the mission for care.

The meeting is open to the public.

Rotary To Show Guide Dog Movie

In cooperation with National Guide Dogs for the Blind Week, a motion picture, produced by Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc., of San Francisco, Calif., will be shown at the weekly Rotary Club luncheon Thursday noon, Rod Neve, program director, announced.

The debt-free, non-profit organization is carrying on a fund-raising drive to further their training program.

One of two guide dog training schools in the United States, recognized by the Veterans Administration, the organization trains the dogs for 19 months, then he and blind student live at the school for one month's intensive training. More than a dozen blind persons in Oregon have received guide dogs worth \$1,500 free of cost from the organization.

Bids Dated On Two Douglas Road Jobs

The State Highway Commission will receive bids Sept. 22-23 for two structural units on the Chenoweth Park-Deady section of the Pacific Highway.

Local school officials have found several shifts of pupils necessary to take advantage of available building space, Marvin Smith, assistant District 4 superintendent, reported today.

Several of the shifts were made this morning.

To lighten the load in the fourth grade rooms at Riverside, eight pupils were transferred today to Edenhower.

The sixth grade class which had been transferred from Riverside to Wilbur before school commenced will be returned to Riverside.

Reason for this change is that there were only 17 pupils in the sixth grade class and other sixth grade groups were overloaded at Riverside. Now, Riverside will have three, instead of the previous two, sixth grades and the pupil load will be lighter in each.

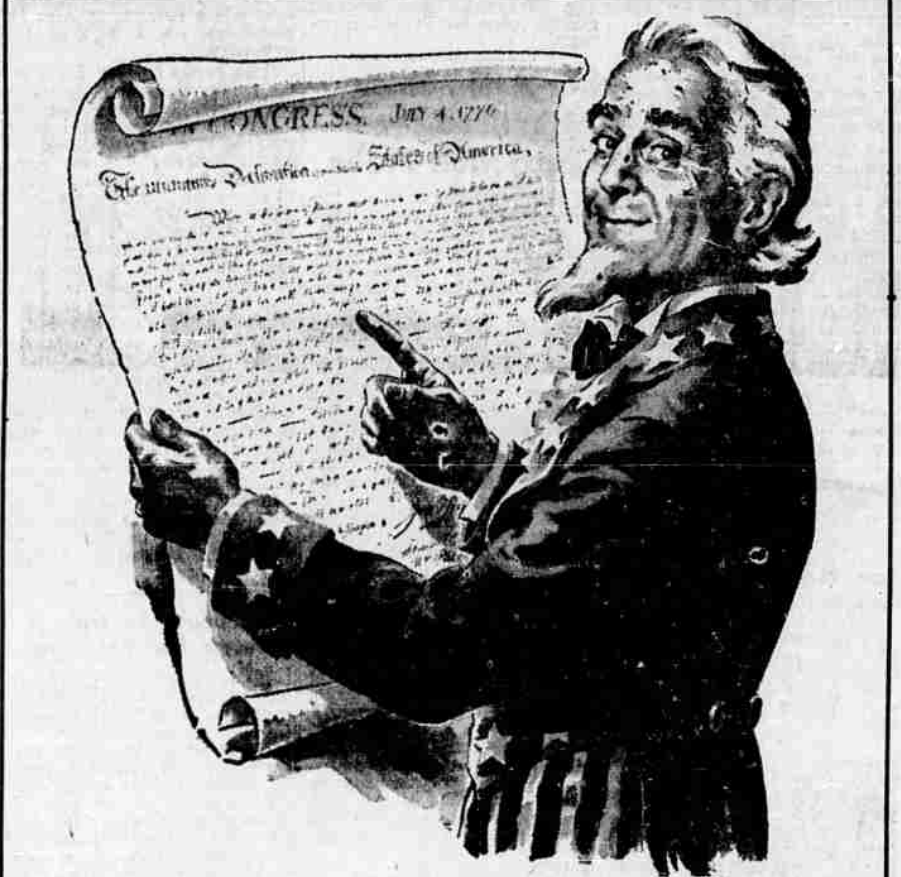
