ents and engine lathes, the announcement states.

Axelsson Company has had a steady growth during the last few years, reporting an all-time-high sales volume of \$17,065,548 in 1951, with gross earnings of \$773,480. Backlog of orders at the end of 1951 was \$13,277,000, compared with approximately \$10,000,000 at the end of 1950. Axelsson sales in the first half of 1952 were \$11,669,000 and it had net profit of \$1,275,652 before taxes, said the announcement.

Axelsson stockholders were advised of the proposed plan on which they will be asked to vote at a meeting in Los Angeles, Oct. 8. They were informed that acquisition is to be accomplished through issuance of 537,930 shares of Pressed Steel Car Company common for assets of Axelsson. Upon liquidation of Axelsson, shareholders will receive 1.18 shares of Pressed Steel Car common for each share of Axelsson presently held.

Commenting on acquisition plans, John L. Snyder Jr., president of Pressed Steel Car, declared that "both stockholders and employees of all three companies would stand to benefit greatly by integrating Axelsson's and Umpqua's valuable resources and experience into one strong operation."

Fluctuations Minimized
Pressed Steel Car, manufacturing freight cars of all types since founded in 1897, began its product diversification program late in 1949. Program designed to level off extreme fluctuations of car building industry and to stabilize earnings, has since that time resulted in PSC's acquiring five companies, all in the steel fabricating field, Snyder said that sales from freight cars will be reduced to less than 50 per cent of Pressed Steel Car's total volume.

The company reported sales of \$50,435,965 and net income of \$1,221,004 after taxes for 1951. For the first six months of 1952, the company's sales were \$24,158,000, with gross earnings of \$952,165.

Pressed Steel Car Company with plants in Chicago and Mt. Vernon, Ill., and Buffalo, N. Y., employs over 3,000 people. In addition, it does world-wide export business.

It is probable that Axelsson and Umpqua will be operated as separate divisions of Pressed Steel Car with no changes in present management or personnel contemplated, the announcement said.

Charge Machine At Senior High Now Being Used

Roseburg Senior High School Library is the first high school in the Pacific Northwest to use an electric charging machine. The Gaylord Charging machine is rented by the student body for use in the library.

This machine is compact and does all the work of charging out a book with an accurate, easy-to-read, legible record, says Mrs. Gladys Monger, librarian.

Each student has a borrower's card with a number plate, which is inserted into one chute of the machine while the book card is placed in another and presto - automatically the date and the borrower's number are printed on the book card. It is easy to operate, speeds up the charging process and yet is always accurate, since there is no possibility of transposing figures.

Since the building of the present modern library space, the staff has been on the alert to provide the best service possible to faculty and student body. Mrs. Monger said. Many new and modern methods of library procedure have been adopted. The ribbon arrangement of books has proven most satisfactory for the growing high school.

Student assistants enroll for library training as a full credit course. They are required to learn and practice the processes of the library, with its vast sources of material. Their routine duties are assigned daily, with special tasks performed as needed. The atmosphere is cordial and those qualified for the course enjoy the work and association with other Library Club members, she said.

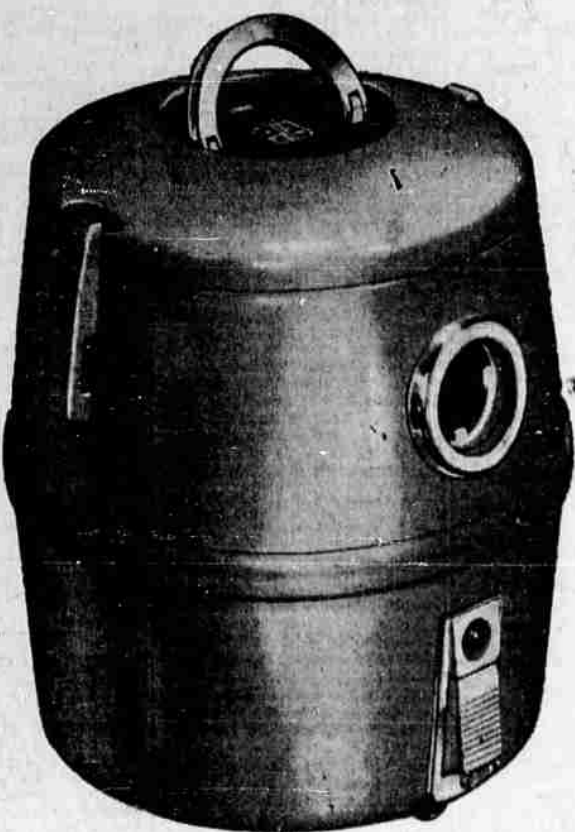
