

School System Needs Told By Supt. Deller

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holdup in the Fullerton School addition construction because of a labor shortage, he said. A statement of needs has been prepared for the Senior High gymnasium and it is hoped, he said, that architects' plans will be available and approved for calling of bids around the first of January and completion by next fall.

Dr. Marvin Smith, assistant superintendent, in charge of faculty administration complimented the district on its fine teaching staff. He said he was very much pleased with the 40 new teachers added to the system, but one or two more are needed.

The problem of finding eight or nine more teachers for next year is now being studied. The state teacher-training program is not turning out enough instructors to fill the needs, said Smith. He commented on the shifting of students from one building to another. He said this is done only where necessary to equalize the teaching load, and even though it may cause some confusion and dissatisfaction with the parents, it is necessary under the present crowded school condition. A study of future enrollment problems is underway.

Financial Information

Victor Micelli, school clerk, rounded out the panel of speakers. While there are 176 certified teachers, there are 247 employees on the school's payroll, he said. Thirty-nine are janitors and maintenance men, 23 are cooks and 10 are clerical assistants.

The school system is one of the biggest businesses in the county, with a valuation of \$6,665,000, he pointed out. Land is valued at \$100,000, which is extremely low; buildings \$2,250,000 and equipment \$300,000, in addition to \$2,286,000 borrowed in bond issues for new construction.

The monthly payroll is \$70,000. The hot lunch program costs \$87,000 a year of which \$86,000 at least is expected back from the participating students.

Adult Education Teachers Needed

Jack Brookings, director of vocational and adult education for the Roseburg Public Schools, has announced that there is still a need for instructors for the adult education program.

Instructors do not need previous teaching experience or training although it is a definite asset. Teachers are needed in commercial subjects such as bookkeeping, typing and shorthand. Homemaking teachers are needed as well as shop, crafts, and art class instructors.

Tradesmen who can teach apprentice or journeyman classes in their occupation, or any specific specialty in an occupation are also in demand.

Many classes have been requested by persons in the Roseburg area which cannot be offered because of a lack of qualified instructors.

Persons with teaching or practical experience which they feel might qualify them to teach any adult education class are urged to contact Brookings by calling the Senior High School, telephone 3-4438, during the day or evening. The first term of adult classes is planned to begin the week of Sept. 29.

Worst Year Of Polio In U. S. Is Expected

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391 cases of polio, as against 28,060 at the same time in the worst year of 1949.

The big worry is yet unanswered: Has polio reached its peak yet this year? Each week, the total of new cases has risen to new highs for four straight weeks, with 4,032 cases in the week ended Sept. 13. In 1949, polio reached a peak in mid-August, with a decline in new cases each week thereafter.

Usually, there are just as many new cases after the peak as there were before. Unless something happens to dampen down the spread, the nation could even have 50,000 cases this year.

It looks as though we must anticipate over 50,000 cases for 1952, says Dr. Hart E. Van Riper, foundation medical director.

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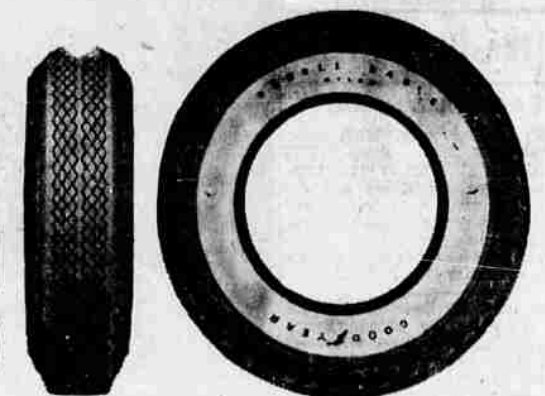
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
