

Joseph Short, Truman's Press Secretary, Dies

WASHINGTON (AP)—White House press secretary Joseph K. Short, 48, died suddenly Thursday night at his home in nearby Alexandria, Va.

No immediate cause of death was given. Mrs. Short, the former Beth Campbell, said she heard him fall upstairs, ran up and found his heart had stopped.

Short, a native of Vicksburg, Miss., had been President Truman's press secretary since Dec. 8, 1950. A newsman since 1925, he succeeded Charles G. Ross, who had collapsed and died at his desk.

U.S. Polio Cases May Total 50,000

PORTLAND (AP)—Infantile paralysis cases may reach 50,000 in the United States this year, and that means a goal of 50 million dollars for the next March of Dimes.

A regional conference was told that Thursday by Warren D. Coss, fund raising chairman for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Coss, here from New York, spoke to about 100 persons from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Hawaii at the opening of a two-day session. He said that 4,032 cases were reported in the United States last week, an all-time high and past experience indicates that at the rate cases are being reported the year's total will be about 50,000. The meeting here is to map plans for fund raising.

Dairy, Poultry Products In 1953 Likely To Decline

WASHINGTON (AP)—Current production trends point to a slimmer diet of dairy products, eggs, poultry and pork next year.

Beef may be the only livestock food that will hold its own with this year's supply.

This general outlook is drawn from several recent Agriculture Department reports showing that the production of milk, chickens, and hogs is declining.

These downturns were said to reflect the fact that rising costs are discouraging many producers. The fall pig crop—which will become the pork supply next spring and summer—is expected to be 9 per cent smaller than last year's. Milk production, down 1,300,000,000 pounds from the 82 1/2 billion pounds produced in eight months last year, averaged the smallest

for each consumer for the month in nearly a quarter of a century. Hatchery Output Slumps

Commercial hatchery production of baby chicks during August was 15 per cent smaller than in the same month last year.

Potential egg layers on farms on Sept. 1 were the fewest since 1941, down 5 per cent from a year ago. Likewise, the number of chicks on farms on the same date was the smallest in 12 years, 23 per cent down from a year ago.

These poultry figures indicated a smaller supply of eggs and of poultry meat during the first half of 1953.

On the other hand, supplies of most food crops—such as bread-grains, rice, dry beans, sugar, peanuts, and most fruits and vegetables—are likely to be as plentiful as this year. There is a possibility

of a brief period of potato shortage next spring, before the 1953 crop moves to market. This year's potato crop is not much larger than last year's—the one that was followed by a shortage last spring.

AFL Heads Join Group To Back Stevenson

NEW YORK (AP)—Most top American Federation of Labor officials have joined a newly-formed national committee to back Democratic Presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson.

George Harrison, an AFL vice president, told a news conference that a majority of the AFL's executive committee has joined the new group, known as "Labor's National Committee for Stevenson and Sparkman."

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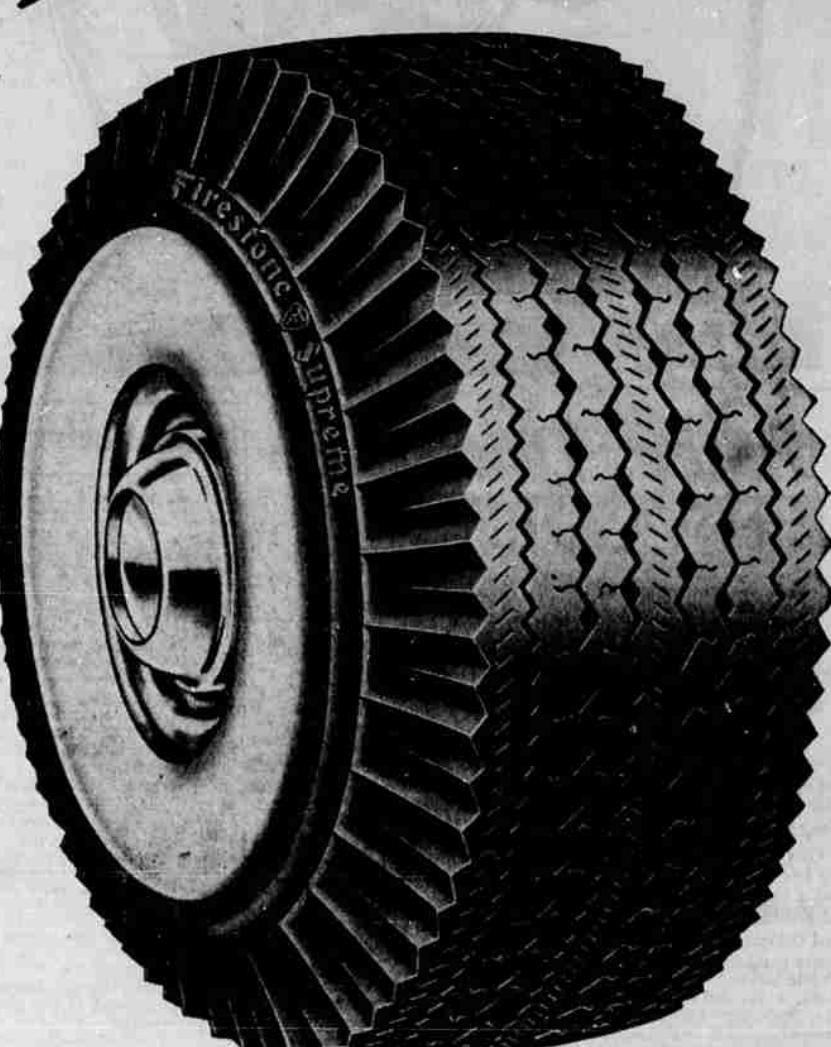
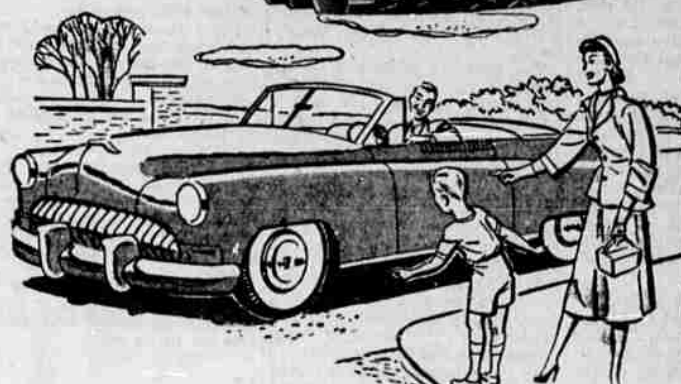
