Bill Schindler, Auto Racing Veteran, Killed

ALLENTOWN, Pa. (AP)—Wild Bill Schindler, 43-year-old veteran of Indianapolis Speedway and other auto racing classics, was killed Saturday in a big car event at the Allentown Fair.

Authorities reported that Schindler, a resident of Freeport, N.Y., driving a black Offenhauser, was killed on the third lap of the second big car race.

Schindler had been an auto racer for more than 20 years. He was seriously injured in a race at Mineola, Long Island, several years before World War Two, and a leg was amputated.

The city of Myrtle Creek put its new nine-inmate jail into operation over the weekend.

The first inmate was an accused drunk driver.

Myrtle Creek Police Chief Orville Cornett said work on a building which will house the jail, police department and city library is nearing completion. An open house is planned in about two weeks.

Police officers are still operating from the old police office and will transfer their operations to the new 50-by-60 foot building as soon as painting, and other finishing touches can be applied.

The new jail has a tank capable of holding four persons and another five individual cells. It is the largest city jail in the county.

The building project is expected to cost \$19,000 when completed, Cornett said. The city library will move into its new quarters sometime after the first of October.

Construction of the building was started last summer.
