

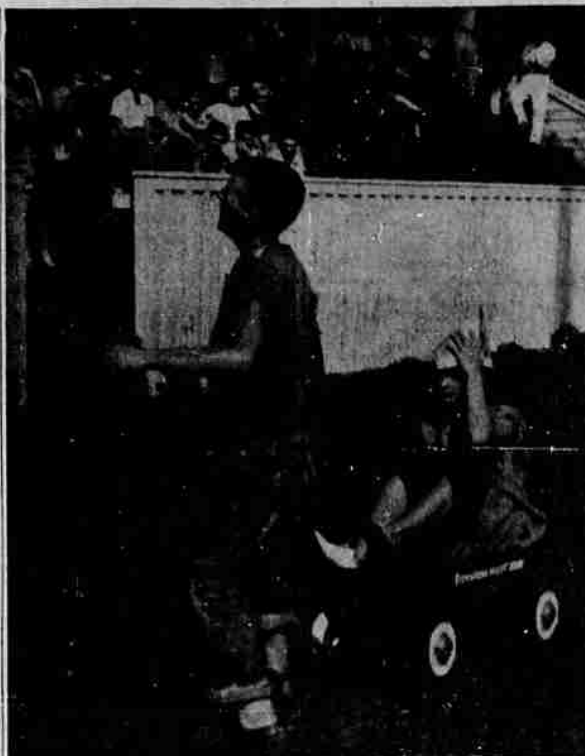
Oregon Voters Copies Enter Mails Wednesday

SALEM (AP) — The first of \$50,000 copies of Oregon's Voters' Pamphlet will go into the mail Wednesday, David O'Hara, head of the State Elections Division, said Monday.

The mailing job will take three or four weeks.

The pamphlets will run from 112 to 152 pages, Multnomah County getting the largest ones.

A new feature of the pamphlet will be explanations of each of the 18 ballot measures. These explanations, made by impartial committee appointed by the Governor, were required by the 1951 Legislature.

Airplane Strikes Auto; Kills Four Passengers

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Death from the sky struck an automobile Sunday.

An Air Force C-47 transport plane, settling for a landing, struck the car on a highway bordering Truax Field killing the four occupants of the vehicle.

The plane sliced off the top of the auto and jammed its own landing gear. The pilot, Lt. Col. S. J. Wicker of Norton Air Force Base, San Bernardino, Calif., circled Truax for 30 minutes but finally pancaked to earth without injuring any of the plane's 12 passengers.

Killed were Clark Dickie, 58; his wife, Elizabeth 52; their daughter, Fay, 30, and Mrs. Dickie's mother, Mrs. Catherine Blank, 70, all of Milwaukee.

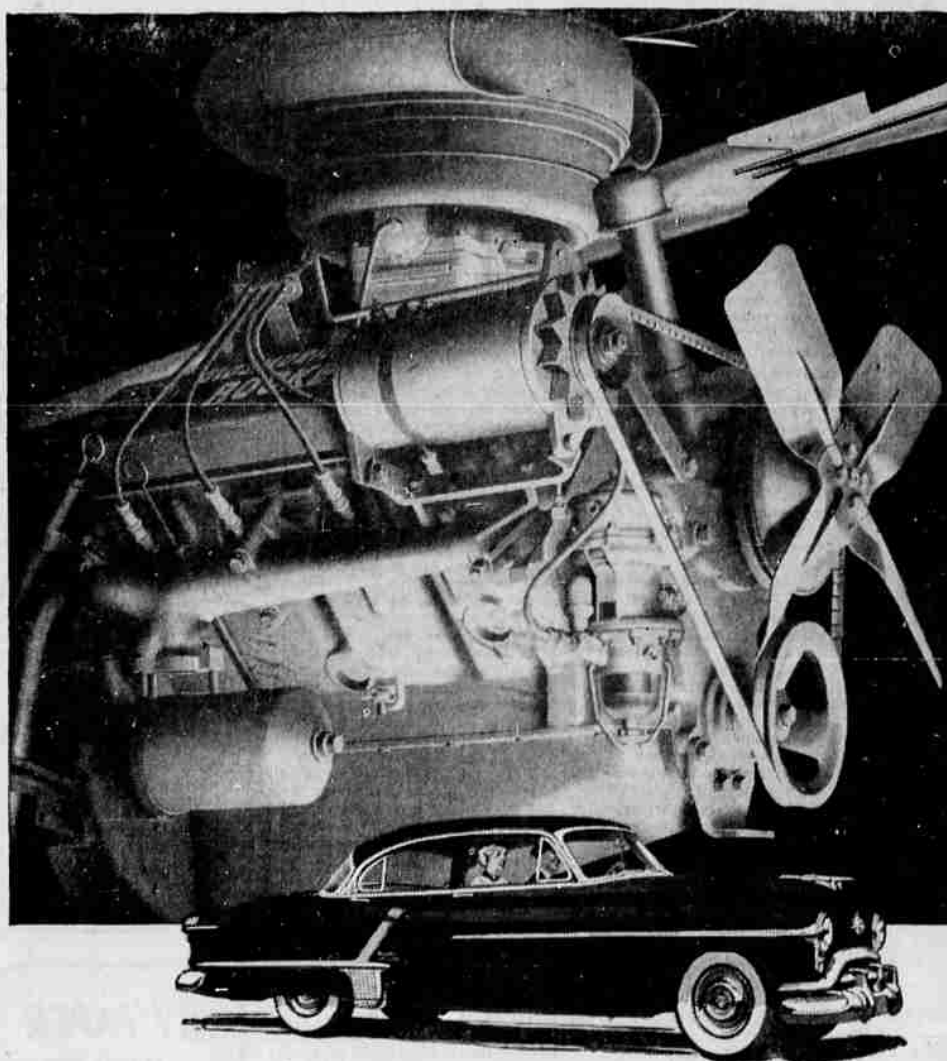
