

National, Local Phases Of Chest Drives Scheduled

A nationwide Community Chest kick-off program, featuring outstanding music, radio and motion picture stars, will officially open the 1952 chest drive Saturday at 8 p.m.

The one-hour radio show, over national hookups, will include a short talk by President Truman. Plans for the local campaign were discussed at a meeting Tuesday night of Community Chest leaders. The local drive will begin early in October.

It was announced that a 16-mm color motion picture will be made available for community, farm, church and civic groups. O. J. Feldkamp, president of the chest board, said. The picture, dealing with Community Chest projects, may be obtained by calling Chest drive headquarters at 3-3049, he added.

Robert G. Davis, drive chairman for the Roseburg area, clarified the position of organized labor in the coming campaign. He said he did not wish to imply that organized labor had not taken part previously, but that its part is to be expanded in the coming campaign.

Frank Ashley, as president of the Central Labor Council, AFL, called attention to the fact that he had served a three-year term on the chest board, and that he had set up groups for solicitation of funds. He said also that the CIO also had been represented on the chest.

Davis said the board wishes to expand the part labor can play in contacting employees of local industries. He said three labor leaders have been asked to serve on the board of directors, and that they have agreed to support the campaign.

Adult Education Classes To Begin Week Of Sept. 29

The adult education department of the Roseburg Public Schools announces the opening of the first term of evening classes to be held at the Senior High School, starting the week of Sept. 29. Registration for these classes will be held in the Senior High School, from 6 to 9 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 25, and Friday, Sept. 26.

There will be a wide variety of classes offered this term including: beginners typing, beginners bookkeeping, beginners shorthand, sketching, ceramics, art metal, interior decoration, public speaking, international folk dancing, and food service selling, all of which will meet at the Senior High from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

In addition there will be offered fly tying, woodworking, beginning dressmaking, advanced dressmaking, an poetry writing and marketing, all of which will meet at the Senior High School from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

The typing class will meet on Monday and Wednesday nights. Bookkeeping will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays, as will shorthand. All three are beginners' classes only. Typing will be taught by Esther Dyar, bookkeeping by John Searles, and shorthand by Dean Ross.

The sketching class, taught by Jack Pruitt, will meet on Tuesdays. Ceramics will be taught by Don Starr on Wednesdays. Hugh Schleuter will teach fly tying class on Tuesdays. Art metal will meet on Mondays and will be taught by Chuck Allen.

The interior decoration class will be taught by Marion Ross and meet Thursdays. Inez Simpson will teach beginning dressmaking on Tuesdays and advanced dressmaking on Thursdays. Poetry writing and marketing will meet on Thursdays and will be taught by Hilda Peterson. Warren Ewing's public speaking class will meet on Tuesdays. Paula Raff will teach international folk dancing on Wednesdays.

The food service selling class is offered through trade extension and is limited to persons actually working as waitresses. It will be taught by Rhoda Coxey on Tuesdays.

Tuition charges will be made for all classes. Rates will vary according to the type of class. Charges will run from five to 12 dollars for the ten-week term. Minimum and maximum enrollments are set for each class, and persons are asked to register early to assure themselves of a place in the class.

prices are nothing but weak stop-gaps."

'Prosperity' Cry Derided
The Republican standard-bearer's answer to inflation was to cut taxes and expenditures and stop government agencies, such as the Treasury and Federal Reserve Board, from working at what he described as cross-purposes on credit controls.

Accusing the Truman administration of deliberately encouraging inflation "to fool the people with deceptive prosperity," Eisenhower said money had been so cheapened that while the average family has gained in income since 1945, it actually can buy less goods.

"This is a measure of the achievement of an administration which loudly claims: Millions will vote for us—because 'they never had it so good,'" he said scornfully.

Seaman Raymond Guthrie Returns From Korea

Raymond E. Guthrie, seaman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Guthrie of Route 1, Box 1624, Roseburg, was recently returned to the U.S. Naval Base at Long Beach, Calif., aboard the minesweeper USS Symbol from six months in Korean waters.

In operations that covered 3,200 miles, the Symbol moved to within 1,000 yards of hostile beaches. Four different times the ship was under intensive enemy fire. The minesweeper captured 17 prisoners; rescued a Navy pilot from the sea after his plane was forced down, and fired 13,000 rounds of ammunition on enemy "sampan" and shore installations.

Airman Third Class Raymond L. Potter, USAF, 2049 Williams St., Roseburg, was recently graduated from the Air Force Technical School at Chanute Air Force Base, Ill. Potter, who entered the Air Force Nov. 30, 1951, was transferred to Chanute from Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas.

Nixon Explains Fund To Defray Expenses

bills for Mr. and Mrs. Nixon totaled \$2,306.54.

The legality of the fund—which also included recording, postage, stationery and advertising expenses aggregating \$5,000—was upheld by a Los Angeles legal firm engaged by Dana C. Smith, Pasadena attorney and fund trustee.

No Law Violated
Elmo H. Conley, a partner in the firm, gave this opinion to Gov. Sherman Adams (N. H.), Eisenhower's campaign chairman:

"It is our conclusion that Sen. Nixon did not obtain any financial gain from the collection or disbursement of the fund by Dana C. Smith and that he did not violate any federal or state law by reason of the operation of the fund."

In revealing his personal finances, Nixon disclosed:

In addition to his salary as congressman and later senator since 1946, he had received a total of \$16,000 from estates in his law firm; \$1,500 a year from lectures; and he and his wife had inherited \$4,500.

For four years they lived in an \$80 a month apartment, then they bought a Washington, D. C., home for \$41,000, which has a \$20,000 mortgage. They also own a \$13,000 home in Whittier, on which the senator first said he owed \$3,000. Later he said the mortgage was \$10,000.

He also said he owed \$4,500 to the Riggs Bank in Washington and \$3,500 to his parents, and was paying interest on both loans.

Welcoming new members of Reedsport schools and discussing education were Willis Eshlad, Reedsport City Council member; Lloyd L. Richardson, president of the Lower Umpqua Chamber of Commerce; Stillman Wessela, chairman Reedsport High School board; Mel Jensen, member of Reedsport grade school board; Dale T. Waddill, grade school principal; Rule Ruppee, Reedsport High School PE director; and Jack C. Flug, principal Reedsport High School.

Need For Expansion

Remarks underscored the problem of congestion and need for expanded facilities in the schools. The desirability of a unified school system in the area was voiced. The area now being served includes three school districts.

The significance of the referendum on Oregon school re-organization and unification was stressed in consideration of future plans. The next monthly meeting of the Reedsport PTA will be devoted to panel discussion of the measure. The meeting is slated for Oct. 27.

Public school policy was discussed by the speakers, including the emphasis on competitive athletics as part of the physical education program.

Sports Policy Explained

Waddill outlined the objectives of the current physical education policy as applied in the grade school, pointing out that the present program increases benefits of physical education in contrast with the limitations created by selective team activity.

Waddill stated that some inter-scholastic sports will be encouraged.
