Adlai "Clamming Up"

For the time being, at least, Stevenson was saying nothing about the Nixon incident or Nixon's accusation that he was "clamming up" about a fund raised for the Illinois governor.

The Democratic candidate was standing pat on what he said yesterday — it would be a "breach of faith" to name key state officials whose salaries he said he had supplemented with donations from a special fund.

These gifts, he said, made it possible for him to get competent men who otherwise could not afford to take state jobs.

The money, Stevenson said, came from funds left over from his own 1948 campaign for governor, plus some later contributions. He said contributors didn't know where the money went, and recipients didn't know where it came from.

Left unanswered were such questions as:

How much was in the fund originally, how much added, how much left? How many made donations, how many got them? Reporters who wanted answers signed a petition, asking Stevenson to clear them up at a news conference, but he said he was too busy with preparations for his political trips.

Aboard Eisenhower Special — Gen. Eisenhower told a trainees crowd of 1,800 at Keyser, W. Va., Thursday America "is in fine shape—except politically."

The Republican presidential nominee, making the whistle stops toward a major speech Thursday night in Baltimore on economic issues, called for a change in administration in Washington. "We have got a national leadership that has not performed well in the last seven years," he said. He promised if elected "we will get a dollar back again that will be worth more than 50 cents."

He added: "We cannot run the risk of further inflation."

Oregon Labor, Wages Set August Records

SALEM (AP)—More people worked in Oregon during August than ever before, and they earned a record amount of money, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission said Wednesday.

There were 480,600 persons employed in non-farm jobs, which was 1,500 more than the previous record of two years ago.

The average weekly wage during the month soared to a new high of \$82.29, compared with \$77.21 a year ago.

Weekly wages in the construction industry climbed to \$97.07, and to \$91.53 in the lumber industry.

Mosquito War Task Discussed

The Roseburg area, with its many log ponds is "unique" in mosquito control measures, a mosquito control expert says.

He is Robert H. McCauley, Portland, entomologist for the Public Health Service River Basin Office. McCauley was in Douglas County Tuesday and Wednesday.

He said that any area with log ponds is "unique" because the ponds can't be drained or filled. The only method of control is through spraying.

McCauley is expected to submit a written report on findings in Douglas County. County Sanitarians T. Claude Baker and LaVerne Miller said they did not know what recommendations McCauley would make.

The expert left for Medford Wednesday afternoon. Also inspecting the Douglas County mosquito control project were two Coos County officials, C. Eugene Fields, sanitarian, and Mike McGourty, rodent control man.

Several weeks ago Jackson County Sanitarians Walt Sutherland and Orle Moore inspected the local mosquito warfare operations.

Four of the 13 surgeons, mostly members of the college's Board of Regents and Governors, agreed that "in certain areas, fee-splitting is widely practiced by a large percentage of physicians and surgeons."

They would not specify these areas, beyond the comments of two of the surgeons:

Dr. Loyd Davis of Chicago, a college regent, said, "There is no question but that fee-splitting is on the increase in Chicago and the surrounding area."

Dr. Newell W. Philpott of Montreal, a regent, said he did not know of it in Montreal but that he knew it was done in some localities nearby. He told of one young surgeon, starting in practice, who refused to make kick-backs and had to leave an unnamed town within six months.

Ochsner said, "If a young man starts practice in a neighborhood where splitting is rampant and refuses to do so because he is honest, he would starve."

Canyonville Will Vote On \$30,000 Bonds For School

Canyonville School District No. 8 will hold a bond election at the High School building Thursday, Oct. 9, from 2 to 8 p.m. for submitting to the legal voters the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness of \$30,000.

The money would be used to construct and equip two additional elementary classrooms, to construct library and health rooms and to make other needed improvements about the school campus.

The State Department of Education has advised that the additional classrooms must be built in the very near future, if the school is to retain its standardization rating, according to Supt. Omer J. Monger.

The new classrooms would replace two of the high school rooms now used for elementary grades. From the standpoint of the pupils' comfort, as well, the rooms are badly needed, said Monger.

As of Monday of this week, the enrollment was 334 pupils, or 40 more than the 294 highest total enrollment of last year.

School District 8 has one of the highest remaining percentages of bonding capacity in the county. Since the district has both an elementary and high school, it can be bonded up to 13 per cent of total valuation. There is \$92,000 unused bonding capacity and passage of the measure by the electors would leave \$62,000, according to Monger.

Should the measure not be passed, the school stands to lose its basic support from the state. This amounts annually to more than the proposed \$30,000 sought in this election, he pointed out.

Canyonville citizens are taxed for the basic school support fund, whether or not the local school meets the standardization pattern and is eligible for the basic support, said Monger.

Indians Sue Lumber Co. On Charge Of Trespass

PORTLAND (AP)—Ten Indians have sued the C. D. Johnson Lumber Company of Toledo for \$53,500, alleging the company is trespassing on their timber in Lincoln County.

The company is operating under a permit from the Department of the Interior. The Indians contend they inherited the land from an ancestor, who got it by allotment.
