

Santayana, Poet Philosopher, Dies

ROME (AP)—George Santayana, philosopher and poet who ranked as one of the 20th Century's greatest thinkers, died Friday night in a Catholic convent. He was 88.

The brilliant Spanish writer, who spent many years in America, died in the sheltered solitude in which he had lived during the final quarter century of his life.

During the past few years, age had enfeebled and shriveled him. But his philosopher's mind stayed sharp and alert to the end. His final book and one of the most important, "Dominations and Powers," was completed and published only last year.

The famed philosopher was born in Madrid Dec. 16, 1863. Although a Spanish subject to the end, he was thought by many to be an American since he lived in the United States from the time he was nine years old until 1911. Practically his whole life was spent outside Spain.

Perley received a letter recently from a merchant seaman in Japan that read the following item which appeared in the Roseburg News-Review Dillard News, Jan. 18.

It read "Severe burns on her body and legs resulted when Perley Jane Collins stood so close to a fireplace that her clothing became ignited, at the family home in Dillard."

The flames were smothered by her brother, Frankie, 14, a Boy Scout, who wrapped her in a rug.

Accompanying the letter from Hank Berner, S. S. Java Mail, Seattle, Wash., was a nice Japanese handkerchief for Perley and a piece of money for Frankie. Just eight months after the above clipping appeared in the local paper Hank wrote from Japan: "Dear Little Lady: Sorry to read of your unfortunate accident, but so glad that your Boy Scout brother saved you just in the nick of time."

"When we reach Yokohama I'll get you a Japanese handkerchief and a Yen for your brave brother, Cordially, Hank."

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if the American people want security the best place to find it is in jail.

"Above all, let me ask you: Do you want to avoid a third world war? Then you'd better look out. The Republican party seems to be listening to some strange advice so far as foreign policy is concerned."

Truman said that Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic nominee, has everything required for the presidency, "great ability, experience in civil government, humility and deep feeling for the common people."

As for his own administration, Truman declared "the record is good."

"We've crushed the Communist conspiracy in this country," he said. "And we've stopped the advance of communism all over the globe."

He said the Communists "have been stopped cold in Korea" and that they "haven't crossed another frontier since, anywhere in the world."

Lobbies Backing Ike
He said the special groups "pulling the strings behind Eisenhower include:

1. The "power lobby" which "wants to do away with lost cost public power."

2. The "grain speculation lobby" that doesn't want the farmer to get the price of the crops he raises."

3. The railroad "lobby" that's been "jacking up your freight rates in North Dakota—and fighting tooth and nail against the St. Lawrence Seaway so you can't get freight rates down."

4. The real estate lobby "that wants to gouge everyone who needs a home to live in."

5. The "rich man's lobby" that's always trying "to open tax loopholes for the wealthy."

6. The tariff lobby which wants rates so high they can pick up extra profits while the country loses the world market for grains.

"In short," he said, "it's all the special privilege groups from the oil lobby to the China lobby, and they've all joined together behind the Republican party."

"I've cleaned up corruption in government wherever I've found it," he said.

He added the Republicans opposed his efforts to improve machinery for preventing corruption by fighting his reorganization plans.

"They don't want to get rid of corruption," he said. "They just want to kick it around as a political football."

Attorney General Candidate Dates Roseburg Visit

State Representative Robert Y. Thornton, Democratic nominee for State Attorney General, and Mrs. Thornton will visit Douglas County on October 4, it was announced here by Christina Micelli, Douglas County Democratic chairman.

A comparative newcomer to politics, Thornton, when a candidate for representative in 1950, was elected by the largest majority in his county of any candidate running for a state or local office, and defeated the Republican incumbent better than two to one.

He was twice appointed city attorney of Tillamook, and held the same post for the cities of Garibaldi and Nehalem.

The 42-year old Tillamook lawyer was a World War II veteran is a graduate of Stanford and attended Oregon and George Washington law schools, earning his own way entirely.

After graduation, he did legal work for Congress, which included co-authoring "Constitution of the U. S.," a widely circulated legal reference book. He was assistant solicitor of the U. S. Department of Interior when he resigned in 1938 to return to Oregon and enter private practice.

In Civic work Thornton has served as director of the Tillamook YMCA, Veterans Housing Authority and Chamber of Commerce; president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and Kiwanis Club; commander, American Legion; and as county chairman of fund drives for the Red Cross and Crusade for Freedom.

A partner in the law firm of Thornton & Johnson, he is married and has one son. Mrs. Thornton is the former Dorothy Haberlach of Tillamook.
