

Administration Secrecy Rapped By Republicans

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Republican report says Democrats during the past 20 years have "stolen" from the people their right to know what their government is doing.

It said the scope and methods of governmental secrecy have grown to such proportions under the Truman administration that even Congress "has to fight for information before it can legislate."

Newspapers, it added, often can get facts only if reporters "turn themselves into detectives and gum shoe artists."

The accusations were made in a 12,000-word report prepared by the staff of the Republican Policy Committee in the Senate.

It was distributed from the office of Sen. Homer Ferguson of Michigan.

The committee is headed by Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, and decides party policy on major issues in the Senate.

The report said secrecy in government had increased slowly since 1933 and "reached its climax under Truman" whose administration, it said, used censorship, concealment and deception to keep the public in the dark about federal affairs.

In one way or another the whole of government has been poisoned by this injection of secrecy," the report said.

Gov. Orders Listed

"Truman is the author of three famous executive orders having as their aim first, the concealment of executive action from Congress; second, the slow strangling of every means of communication—press, radio, television and moving pictures; and third, the deliberate use of supposedly confidential information in an attempt to destroy political opponents."

The three orders were identified as the loyalty order of March, 1947; a supplementary order on loyalty investigation procedures in September, 1951; and an order last January opening income tax returns to the inspection of the Senate Rules Committee.

The Republican report said the real reason for the third order was the "administration's passionate desire" to ruin Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis.) at the time under attack in the Senate by Senator Benton (D-Conn.).

Merrifield, who recently attended a national Church meeting in the East, also gave the laymen a picture of the Church's nationwide financial condition.

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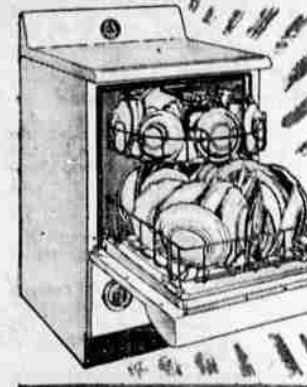
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Plane Bombing Plot For Insurance Charged

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Mexican officials said today they are preparing charges against five persons in connection with the time bombing of a passenger plane to collect life insurance.

The bomb, hidden in a suitcase, was placed aboard the Oaxaca-bound plane of Compania Mexicana de Aviacion, a Pan American World Airways affiliate, last Wednesday.

The explosion shortly after the takeoff blew a hole in the fuselage, injured two American tourists of the 20 persons aboard, and wrecked navigation instruments. The pilot made an emergency landing at a military airport.

Police said their investigation revealed that seven of the passengers had been hired for fictitious jobs in Oaxaca. Their tickets were bought for them and life insurance policies totaling two million pesos (\$230,000) were taken out on them.

Carl John Lilja Passes At Home

Carl John Lilja, 75, died at his home near Canyonville this morning.

He was born in Wermland, Sweden, Aug. 16, 1877. He was married to Beeda Salmi Ranquist June 17, 1911 at Goldfield, Nev. He had been a resident of Canyonville since 1918 and had farmed there continually.

Surviving besides the widow, are three daughters, Mrs. Thelma Vautrot, San Francisco; Mrs. A. C. Fauther, Merrill, Ore.; and Helen Lilja, Medford; two sons in the Navy, Carl John Lilja Adl, North Africa, and Donald W. Lilja, ENC, San Francisco.

Gravestone funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday at the Masonic Cemetery, Canyonville, with the Rev. O. L. Kendall of the Methodist Church officiating. Ganz Mortuary of Myrtle Creek has charge of arrangements.

Reds Seize Third Hill From Allies

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Chinese Reds seized another hill on Korea's Central Front today as the Communists maintained heavy pressure on the sector for the third straight day.

The hill, due east of Kumsong, was the third captured by the Reds since they launched a series of heavy attacks on the East-Central Front Sunday.

Yesterday the Communists powered their assaults with the heaviest Red artillery barrage of the war—47,312 rounds.

Savage fighting also flared on the Western Front, U. N. infantrymen slugged their way to the top of Big Nori but lost the high ground to counter-attacking Chinese in pre-dawn darkness.

In Tokyo the Navy announced eight men were injured when Communist shore guns hit the American destroyer Cunningham off Korea's Northeast Coast Sept. 19. The Navy said three men were hospitalized.

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—A highly placed U. S. Eighth Army officer said Tuesday there are several thousand Russian troops in rear areas of North Korea serving in a "support capacity."

This officer said in an interview that the Russians were technicians and advisors and probably manned modern radar-controlled anti-aircraft guns manufactured in the Soviet Union.

Bennett Appeals Ruling On Candidacy Barrier

SALEM (AP)—Former Portland City Commissioner J. K. Bennett appealed to the State Supreme Court Monday for the right to be a candidate for his old job.

Bennett was recalled last spring. A three-judge court in Portland ruled last week that Bennett couldn't be a candidate for the two-year balance of his term.

Raising Temperatures Boost Fire Hazard

Banner Month Posted By Air Force In Korea

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Allied fighter pilots Tuesday closed their books on the most successful month of the Korean war, U. S. Fifth Air Force records showed at Communist MIG-15s destroyed, seven probably destroyed and 39 damaged.

Air Force officers have confirmed that a new gimmick has been added to the swift F-86s, possibly an improved gunsight.

Another reason for the record bag is that the Reds are throwing more and more MIGs into the air in attempts to break up the fighter-bomber attacks.

Almost all glaciers in the northern hemisphere and some in the southern hemisphere are receding.

Browder and his wife were taken before Judge John W. Clancy. A sealed indictment was opened and he read it to them. She was indicted on four counts and Browder on one.

Then they were taken back to the marshal's office, where they were photographed and fingerprinted.

Heavy Penalties Provided

U. S. Atty. Myles F. Lane said Mrs. Browder entered the United States illegally from Canada in 1933. He said she was ordered deported in 1940 and that four years later the order was lifted.

Subsequently, he said, she went to Canada, made a legal entry here on a Russian passport, and in 1946 filed her petition for naturalization.

The maximum penalties, in the event of convictions, would involve 20 years imprisonment and \$20,000 in fines for Mrs. Browder, and five years imprisonment and a \$5,000 fine for the former secretary general of the Communist party in the United States. Maximum penalties, however, are seldom imposed.

PMA Committee Elects Officers; New Plan Told

Announcement of the elections of the County Committee of the Douglas County Production and Marketing Administration followed today as a result of the county convention Friday, Sept. 26.

Election of J. F. Bonebrake to the chairmanship, with H. J. Cockram as vice-chairman and Roy Matthews as regular member was reported. Eugene Fisher and R. A. Busenbark were elected as first and second alternates to the committee.

Bonebrake announced that a "new farm plan" system will be initiated in 1953 in Douglas County as in all counties in Oregon.

The major change will be that the committeemen will contact the farmers in his community and work out a farm plan for the 1953 program year. The farmer will decide the most urgently needed conservation practices on his farm for the year. All practices will be signed before the beginning of the 1953 program year.

Time for the 1953 sign-up will be announced later, Bonebrake added.

Debt Carrying Capacity Of U.S. Told By Snyder

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Snyder told a bankers meeting, Tuesday that experience had demonstrated that the country can carry a quarter-trillion-dollar debt without staggering.

The secretary, in a speech prepared for the annual convention of the American Bankers Association, said:

"We have been able to achieve an economic climate favorable not only to a high level of current activity, but also to a very large volume of long-term investment."

He added that "it is extremely significant that private industry has invested over 160 billion dollars in new plant and equipment since 1946."

"There seems no doubt," he said, "that the long-term factors underlying our present prosperity could provide the basis for a strong forward movement when defense production eases off."

Snyder said individuals increased their liquid assets six billion dollars in 1951 to a total of about 210 billions.

The Federal Reserve Board reported Sept. 26 that consumer indebtedness totaled approximately 69 billion dollars in mid-1951 and nearly 77 billions at mid-1952.

Judy enjoyed a recent visit from J. H. Emerson, the inventor of the iron lung, who is making a tour of the United States, visiting patients in iron lungs to see how the invention can be improved upon. Mrs. Bellows has been making plastic collars after a pattern that seemed to fit and Mr. Emerson had her put on to see just how it fitted and then took one with him.

Judy's doctor, John Pierson, will start using "shots" soon to assist the damaged muscles of her body. Judy's parents are residing at 507 N. E. Holladay, Portland, while she is in Portland.

Judy has expressed her appreciation to the many Roseburg friends for sending her cards and records and to the Judy Bellows Fan Club members for their many kindnesses.

Truman Declares Ike Blundered In Europe

Truman added, "but he ought to be honest enough to admit his blunder means for living with the Russians on a peaceful basis."

"I don't blame the Republican candidate for his part in that," he said about the Russians.

"I get tired of all the Republican speeches and all their propaganda saying that the Republican party has been out in front against the danger of Communism. It simply isn't so."

Derring-Do Pictured

Truman said that Mansfield, as a member of the United States delegation to the United Nations, "stood right up to the Russian Vishinsky (foreign minister) and slugged it out with him and beat down a Russian attack on the foreign policy of the United States" in a debate that "won respect for Mike" Mansfield throughout the world.

Back in 1945 and 1946, Truman said, Gov. Stevenson, on important missions to Europe, "saw what the Communists were up to, worked mightily for international cooperation" and was "one of the first to warn that the Russians were becoming a threat to Europe."

The Republicans, the President asserted, "haven't had a single constructive idea about foreign policy since Sen. Vandenberg died." He referred to the late Michigan Senator, who is regarded as the architect of the bi-partisan foreign policy.

The President carried his anti-Eisenhower barrage into Montana after telling North Dakota voters the general should be sent "back to the Army where he belongs."

But Truman's assault on the Republicans at Havre overshadowed other attacks made to campaign enthusiasm to those he spoke to in his 1948 campaign for a White House term in his own right.

He accused the Republicans of trying to make political capital out of the fighting in Korea.

He said this country moved into Korea in 1950 to stop the Red invasion "for the sake of our own security and to preserve freedom in the world."

"We know we could not wait while the attack spread and dragged the whole world into a war—a war which would be atomic this time, with the bombs falling on America."

Praise, Swats Divided In Mail To Sen. Morse

WASHINGTON (AP)—Oregon letter writers are divided about equally between praise and condemnation of the decision by Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) not to campaign actively for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

An aide to the senator said about 250 letters have been received from Oregon since Morse took his stand. Another 500 have come in from non-Oregon residents.

Among the senator's constituents, the reaction has been equally divided. But Morse himself told a newsman he expects his home state reaction to be against him before the final letter on the subject is received.

"Your friends stop writing but your enemies keep right on," he explained.

Outside of Oregon, the response has been favorable by a 3-1 majority, Morse estimated. The senator said he was particularly struck by the large number of favorable letters received from ministers "who saw the moral issue involved."

On the other hand, some of the "anti" letters charged the senator with being "a chronic agitator" and "acting like a small boy whose lolly-pop has been stolen."

Morse disclosed several weeks ago that he had reversed his earlier decision to campaign for the Republican nominee. After Eisenhower's meeting with Sen. Taft (R-Ohio), Morse charged the Republican nominee and his campaign leaders with having compromised principles for political expediency. He said he would vote for Eisenhower, however.

PRESIDENTS' AIDE DIES

BOSTON (AP)—David K. Niles, 62, son of a Russian immigrant tailor who became an advisor on minority problems to Presidents Roosevelt and Truman, died Sunday at Beth Israel hospital.
