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Eisenhower Strikes Back Heavily At Charges Made By Truman And Stevenson

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower

rippld into President Truman's regime Tuesday as a "scandal-a-day administration"

that was too heavy a millstone for the Democratic presidential candidate, Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson.

Eisenhower, the GOP nominee, said Stevenson knew this and that the Illinois governor was attempting

to shift the blame for the "Washington mess" to the people.

The general, making his third campaign tour to the South, was introduced on the state house steps

by Democratic Gov. James F. Byrnes of South Carolina, Byrnes placed loyalty to country above party loyalty.

Eisenhower predicted a Republican victory on Nov. 4.

He said that "when we have won this election for America—as we will win it—Washington will have a new moral climate, America will have a new sense of direction ..."

In a round-up of his position on numerous issues, Eisenhower commented on civil rights, farm policy, the Korean war, loss of China to the communists and corruption.

Equality Promised On civil rights, he told his Southern audience: "We will move forward more rapidly to make equality of opportunity a living fact for every American."

"Wherever I have gone in this campaign, I have pledged the people of our country that, if elected, I will support the constitution of the United States—the whole of it."

Concerning the administration's "total record," Eisenhower turned his fire directly at Stevenson and glibly at the governor's intellectual language.

The general said Stevenson discovered on his campaign tours "that the failures of this administration are too large to be concealed, that the public morals of this administration are too unsavory to be sweetened up."

He said that the "total record of this administration is too heavy a millstone for any candidate to bear."

Hot Reply To Adlai Eisenhow said he was taking as his "text" two sentences from Stevenson's recent Los Angeles speech.

"Here they are," he said, "and I quote them: 'Whose fault is it then that we get what we deserve in government and nobility in government, honor and nobility in government, honor and nobility in government—'

for that, the fault belongs to 'you, the people.'"

"How does that strike you here in South Carolina: As true or false? Is this Washington mess, the fault of you, the people? Will you accept the blame while the administration and its candidate get out from under?"

Blame Is Shifted The general asked: "Are you to blame for allowing nation after nation to fall to the Communists to increase their manpower and swell the resources of their slave empire?"

"Are you to blame that today, as a result of these surrenders, the

enemies of freedom have built and heavily manned a threatening line across the middle of once-free Europe?"

"Are you to blame for the loss of China?"

"Are you to blame for the fact that seven years after winning the Second World War, our country still has no clear, positive practical program for peace?"

Eisenhower declared "this long record of failure in the cause of peace is not your failure; it is the failure of an administration too long in power."

R. Barkhurst, county OEA president and Isabelle Denman, Myrtle Creek, of the Douglas County PTA council.

Barneburg led the discussion urging that factual information be given the voters to counteract the misconceptions about the proposed re-organization measure. He urged that the bill be regarded as an enabling act, or permissive legislation, and not as a mandatory re-organization measure.

A meeting sponsored by the Lower Umpqua Toastmaster's Club is slated for Thursday, Oct. 2 at 8 p.m. in the Community Building to enlist and organize speakers in behalf of the measure, Rev. Loree stated.
