window of democracy. The non-voter—whether he be cynical, in-different, indolent or unthinking—has become our most telling diplo-matic liability. He is the Krem-lin's greatest joy."

That Communist attack on our voting record, however, has brought about the nationwide drive to get out the vote in '52, he said, and here's what's being done about it:

First, the appeal to the eye and ear with which it is hoped to reach every man and woman in the United States of voting a.g.e. through newspapers, radio and out-door advertising, school children bringing home "register and vote" messages, ministers preaching the obligation of the ballot.

Then there are the service club organizations "putting forth the greatest effort of all to help Amer-ica have a voting record of which she can be proud in '52."

He added, nothing is to be con-cluded from listing of effort but that it is good. It is one of the most important basically non-par-tisan activities in the history of the United States. But contending this has been mostly group effort, he appealed to the individual to do his part.

He suggested that "you good folks here in the west tell and retell the story of our horrible vot-ing record in 1948. That 51 per-cent!"

"Let's replace the political ap-pel, the appeal of one good citizen to another—and that's where your talking is going to begin. Only you, as an individual, can get to your fellow worker directly."

"In conclusion," he said, "I ask you to ask yourself: 'Is there some-thing I can do to help get out the vote? I hope your answer will be yes—so that when X-marks-the-spot time comes—Nov. 4—you'll look some former "lazy patriot" in the eye and, with a feeling of a job well done, say:

"I'll see you at the polls."

contracts with other federal agen-cies for hospitalization, reduction in pay schedule for consultants, reduced fees for outpatient med-ical and dental examination and treatment.

A reduction of 2,000 patients in VA hospitals is estimated.

As of Aug. 31, 1952, the VA was employing 178,034 persons in the operation of 155 hospitals and 108 clinics. Peak employment was in February 1947 when there was an overall total of 226,131 em-loyees.

Hospital Slash Order Blamed On Squandering Of GI Education Funds

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Veterans Administration, which plans to lay off 2,250 hospital employees in an economy move, was accused by a Republican campaign leader to-day of squandering its GI education funds.

Frank C. Hilton, Veterans Divi-sion chairman of the Republican National Committee, contended in a statement today:

grow worse."

Hilton said both Democrats and Republicans are uncovering in-stances in which the V. A. is "squandering veterans benefits and dollars."

With educational benefits now extended to Korea veterans Hilton said, "there are further op-portunities to repeat the known over-payment of approximately 100 million dollars for training."

From 1944 to 1950, Hilton said, 34 per cent of cases investigated showed "Maladministration, negli-gence, gift-acceptance, or outright criminal activity by V. A. per-sonnel."

"The Veterans Administration allowed the waste of tens of mil-lions of dollars for supplies," he said. "Additional tens of millions were wasted on worthless training courses."

Yesterday's V. A. announcement said none of those being discharged would be doctors, nurses, dentists or dietitians—although some of these may be transferred from one hospital to another. The V. A. said the cuts would have been greater except that it froze employment Aug. 5 and has hired no replace-ments since then.
