**PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in my judgment, a menace to life and property on account of the high fire hazard caused by weather conditions and by an excessive amount of debris on the ground left by logging operations, snags and old burns, and

WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester, it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following areas designated as:

All forest lands in the State of Oregon west of the summit of the Cascade mountains within the boundaries of fire protection districts as established pursuant to Section 107-207, O. C. L. A., and within the boundaries of the United States National Forests.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DOUGLAS MCKAY, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-210, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1945, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described areas to be unlawful and that said areas shall be subject to entry only through permit.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 2nd day of October, 1952, until rescinded by my order.

Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 2nd day of October, 1952.

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had a 40-year multimillion-dollar movie career in this country. Chaplin's private life has included four marriages and a 1944 indictment under the Mann Act, which forbids transportation of a woman across a state line for immoral purposes. He was acquitted of the Mann Act charge.

Chaplin, now 63, went to Europe on a visit last month. The Justice Department announced that, when he seeks re-entry, he will be subjected to a detailed Immigration Service examination to determine if he is eligible for re-admission. McGranery, in discussing the Chaplin case, said:

"My own feeling about men so highly publicized and who show so contemptible a regard for the high state of womanhood—"

"Unsavoury Character"  
He did not finish the sentence. However, noting that Chaplin has been "publicly charged," among other things, with being a Communist, McGranery added:

"If what has been said about him is true, he is in my judgment an unsavoury character. No harm can come from a fair hearing, and if he can meet the standards of our laws, he will be re-admitted."

In London, Chaplin told reporters:

"I do not wish to comment on these vague accusations which, strangely enough, McGranery has seen fit to publicize while I am 3,000 miles from the United States. I reiterate that through proper channels I applied for and was given a re-entry permit by the U.S. government."

Glenn Hardy signs a roster (or something) at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon held Wednesday at the Umpqua hotel, before addressing himself to the food and speaking, later, to the Chamber members and their guests. His voice sounds exactly as it does over the air on the Mutual network's Alka-Seltzer Newspaper of the Air, which he has made so famous throughout the years. Of the 30 or 40 thousand (or thereabouts) newscasts heard via the radio, his is my favorite. His presentation of the day's news is streamlined and superbly done, with no fuss and feathers.

"I suppose you know, Glenn," someone remarked to him as he was talking with Al Flegel, Harold Hickerson and some others before lunch, "that one of your script writers, Wilfred Brown, is a native of Camas Valley, near here?" "Heavens, yes!" Glenn exclaimed. "I haven't heard anything else over since this trip I'm taking up here was planned. Wilfred's a regular press-agent for this part of the country!"

Wilfred is a good press agent, a good script writer, a good newspaper man or whatever, for my money. I was with the old Eugene Register many years ago when Wilfred, fresh (and very fresh) from the University's School of Journalism, joined it as a cub reporter. The news staff, headed at the time by Mac Epley, was a hard-boiled one, having very little use for and no mercy on, cub reporters; but Wilfred survived and never turned a hair. Later he went to the United Press and, eventually joined Glenn's crew. I remember Wilfred was in Roseburg at the time we were furiously engaged with Eugene in a battle for the Veterans Hospital (which we won) and Wilfred got awful mad at Eugene. He wrote Tommy Russell, a leading character on the Eugene team, a letter, in which he threatened to change the South Fork of the Willamette river clear away from its usual course towards Eugene, diverting it by means of a canal near Divide, down through

"They are entitled to their nightmares," Stevenson said. "And we are entitled to our dreams."

In what aids described as a reference to John Foster Dulles, Stevenson declared the man who now is Eisenhower's foremost foreign affairs adviser said in 1939: "Only hysteria entertains the idea that Germany, Italy or Japan contemplates war upon us."

The Illinois governor swung hard at Taft. He said the Old Guard calls resistance to Communist aggression in Korea a "useless war"—the words of the Ohio senator.

**Douglas Logging Still Limited**

Only logging operations going on in Douglas County today are in zone 16, as the state forester closes all forests west of the Cascades, with the exception of zones 16 and 7, to logging at midnight last night.

Dropping humidities forced most loggers out of County forests Thursday, anyway, as state law forces logging operations to cease when the humidity falls below 30 per cent. Forecast for today was 20 to 30 per cent.

Boundaries of zone 16—roughly—run along the divide between the South and North Umpqua and Myrtle Creek and Deer Creek to the west, cross the South Umpqua and run westerly along the west divide of Cow Creek and the divide between the Rogue and Coquille River and south from there to the California line.

Zone 7 is a narrow strip running mainly in the Willamette Valley from just south of Eugene north to the Columbia River.
