

### Elkton Pastor Dies In Eugene

Death came suddenly to Rev. W. J. Hamilton of Elkton last Tuesday as he was preparing to leave the Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene.

Rev. Hamilton was the pastor of the First Methodist Church in Elkton. He had just completed 50 years of service in the ministry in October.

Entering the Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene for a minor skin surgery, Hamilton had prepared his sermon for Sunday and was preparing to leave the hospital when he died of a heart attack. Services were held for Rev. Hamilton Saturday, Oct. 4.

McCarthy, Taft Targets  
He said Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin is a "champion of the inquisition, champion of trial by ordeal and slander."

He said Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio is the political mentor of the general and a man who has "made opposition a matter of principle."

While his audience cut loose with lusty boos, Stevenson said McCarthy, Taft, and other GOP senators would be part of a "murderers' row" in the Senate, in charge of key committees, if the Republicans elect to office all the candidates Eisenhower has endorsed.

Stevenson advised the workman, the farmer—everyone—to beware because "the dominant Old Guard of the Republican party has captured the candidate and will even torpedo your foreign policy."

Then, in one of the broadest swipes he has taken so far at the rival party, the Democratic nominee went on to say:  
"With doing nothing, care-nothing, mindless mumbo-jumbo they will let America and the world slide into depression. And such misery bears the seeds of another world war."

"They are the party of confusion, hesitation, weakness, and that is the support that points to disaster and war."

### Estate Taxes To Be Discussed At Meeting Here

Methods of minimizing estate taxes and establishing economical management of estates will be discussed at a special trust forum to be presented by the United States National Bank Tuesday, Oct. 7, at 7:30 p.m. at the Roseburg Woman's Club according to Harold E. Schmeier, manager of the Roseburg Branch, who will preside.

Tuesday night's forum is the first of the fall series to be presented in key cities throughout Oregon. The purpose of these forums, according to E. C. Sammons, United States National president, is to answer some of the questions concerning estates which face the majority of American families.

A three-man team from the bank's head office in Portland will conduct the program, which is to be a non-technical presentation of facts and methods of estate management applicable to the average family. R. M. Alton, vice president and head of the bank's trust department, will lead the group. Other speakers will include L. B. Staver, trust officer and D. W. McKay, trust counselor. Alton will explain the organization of the bank's trust department and outline its services. McKay will set up a typical estate plan and explain the advantages of modern trusts while Staver will emphasize the need for a properly drawn will and point out pitfalls to be avoided.

The forum will conclude with a question and answer period to be followed by a social hour.

"However, it seems that we are supposed to accept that kind of racket as typifying the purpose or nature of the current Democratic campaign: sound without substance; promise without performance; howls without harmony."

His audience roared with laughter. And Eisenhower appeared to be enjoying himself too in this new kind of assault on his opposition.

And now we are getting an educated accent welded on to the old Democrat demagoguery."

This was the kind of "give-em-hell" talk that Eisenhower had never attempted before. His lieutenants were elated by the reaction from the Fargo audience.

### God's Law Heals Sick, Selover States In Talk

Dominion over evil of every description — over sickness, lack, accidents and fear — is available to all through understanding the divine law of healing, John J. Selover of Long Beach, Calif., told a large audience here Sunday afternoon.

For thousands of years spiritually-minded individuals have healed people by spiritual means, he said, and the divine power they utilized — the law and Truth they knew — today can be understood and applied in a systematic and scientific way.

A Christian Science lecturer, Selover spoke under auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Junior High School, where Mrs. Ruth Wooten introduced him. His subject was "Christian Science: The Power of the Word."

Saying Christ Jesus' mission was "to explain and illustrate the practical value of the Christ, Truth, in everyday activities," Selover pointed out that the healing achievements of Jesus and his followers have many precedents in the Old Testament.

He added that John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, told in his "Journal" how his brother was healed of pleurisy by prayer alone in 1738, and how he himself healed his horse of lameness and himself of a severe headache by prayer.

In modern times, he said, Mary Baker Eddy discovered "the underlying laws which resulted in the marvelous Biblical healings" and the Science by which they can be applied. She named the discovery Christian Science.

He said that the Church of Christ, Scientist, established by Mrs. Eddy, has been preaching and practicing Christian healing for over 70 years, "carrying out with increasing success the Scriptural commands, 'Heal the sick, cleanse the lepers, raise the dead, cast out devils.'"

The solution to mankind's problems, he continued, is "a new view of man, a true, spiritual view." When man is understood as the spiritual image and likeness of the one infinite God, "good, evil thoughts, fear, ignorance, sin, fade and the inharmony disappears."

Dealing further with the frequently asked question, "How does Christian Science heal?" Mr. Selover said: "The power of God, or influence of Truth, which Jesus used and which Christian Scientists employ today is the Christ. The redemptive, regenerative power of the Christ when accepted and applied, wipes out of human consciousness the fear, the ignorance, and the sin which tend to disable the body."
