Milk Law Backed
At Myrtle Creek

The Myrtle Creek Farm bureau has gone on record as opposing initiative measure 333 on the Nov. 4 ballot, announces W. L. Littlepage, president.

In a resolution passed by the bureau, members listed reasons for their opposition of the measure, which authorizes the governor to appoint a milk control administrator, permits him to designate marketing areas and require uniform records and accounts, and requires butterfat labeling of and licensing of dealers.

In brief, the resolution says: 1. The 1933 Oregon Milk Marketing Act is being "viciously attacked by commercial enterprises which have little or no interest in the welfare of the milk industry or Oregon citizens."

2. Passage of the measure would be "disastrous" to milk producers and impair the health of the state's economic structure.

3. The 1933 act has promoted public welfare by assuring a steady supply of milk at prices below the national average and has stabilized a previously-chaotic dairy industry.

4. The present Milk Marketing Act should be retained "for the protection of all concerned and the economic well-being of Oregon."

Ike Raps 'Whole Hog' Federal Government

Local Control
Of Projects
Advocated

Sole Columbia Valley
Authority Cited As Case
Of Super-Government

Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's Portland talk tonight will be aired over Radio Station KRNR from 7 to 7:30, announced Leroy Hiatt, station manager.

Hiatt said the local station will be "fed" directly by special wire from KEX in Portland. He said arrangements and financing have been made by the Douglas County Republican Central Committee.

Aboard Eisenhower Train — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, lashing out at what he called the "idea of a whole hog federal government," called Monday night for more local control of western reclamation and power projects.

In a major campaign speech at Seattle after a day of whistle-stopping across Washington state, the Republican presidential candidate renewed his attacks on President Truman.

He ridiculed Democratic claims they are responsible for western development.

He said Republicans instituted the program before the advent of the New Deal.

Eisenhower's campaign carried him south into Oregon Tuesday.

His schedule during the day called for him to make talks at seven cities and towns in Washington and Oregon—with the major speech at Portland, Ore., at 1:45 p.m. PST. The talks were scheduled for Tacoma, Centralia and Vancouver, Wash., and Portland.

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Roseburg Firms Buy
Umpqua Forest Timber

Two Roseburg firms paid a total of \$106,832 for 9,460,000 feet of green timber in two Umpqua National Forest timber sales auctions Monday afternoon.

Umpqua Plywood Corp., Roseburg, was high among four bidders with a bid of \$65,332 on 4,650,000 board feet covering 85 acres in Upper Coe Creek. Rates were \$14.15 per thousand for Douglas fir, \$26.45 for sugar pine and \$2.10 for hemlock.

Other bidders on the sale were the Pacific Lumber Co., Myrtle Creek; Canyon Lumber Co., Riddle, and Robert Theiss, Astoria.

Associated Plywood Corp., Roseburg, paid \$41,600 for 4,810,000 board feet covering 67 acres in the Lower Emile area on Little River. Rates were \$10.50 for Douglas fir, \$2.95 for cedar and \$1 for hemlock.

The Roseburg Lumber Co. also bid on this sale.

Gun Accident Takes
Deer Hunter's Life

MEDFORD — Albert Silveira, 32, of Ceres, Calif., was fatally wounded Sunday evening on the way home from a hunting trip. He and two companions, Rex Woodward, Eagle Point, Ore., and his 15-year-old son, Rex Woodward Jr., were walking along a trail.

The boy raised his gun to place it on his shoulder, and it discharged. Silveira was hit in the back and died in about ten minutes. It was the first hunting fatality in the Medford area this year.

The widow and a son survive.

Advisory Vote Set
On Proposed Levy
For County Library

The County Court Monday passed a resolution submitting to the voters at the Nov. 4 election a measure to determine whether the voters want a levy of 34 mill or less to "equip and maintain" a county library.

The results of the vote, however, will not be official. It will be an "expression" vote to determine whether the proposal is acceptable to the electorate.

Ballots for the straw vote will accompany the Nov. 4 general election ballot.

The resolution was not passed by the court in time to have the results of the vote official, as in such cases measures must be filed in the county clerk's office 35 days before the election.

However the court has authority to make the levy without a vote of the people so long as the total county levy stays within the six percent constitutional limitation.

The resolution was passed by the court on petition of the County Library Committee, headed by Mrs. Hal Schiltz of Myrtle Creek.

The levy, not to exceed 34 mill, would provide some \$60,000 annually, according to present county valuation, the court said.

The actual amount of the levy would be up to the discretion of the court.

No plans as yet have been announced regarding a library building or any details of how the library would function. The court said a building was discussed but no definite projects were formulated.

Mrs. Schiltz said a meeting of her committee would be called in the near future. Business and Professional Women and PTA organizations were expected to carry on a campaign in favor of the project, she said.

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Prosperity
Not 'False,'
Adlai Argues

Ike's Assertion Gives
Comfort To Russians,
Demo Candidate Claims

SAGINAW, Mich. — Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois today accused Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower of giving "comfort" to Soviet Russia by labeling American prosperity as war-born.

Stevenson said in an address prepared for the opening of a five-day campaign tour here that "there is no greater disservice the Republican candidate could do America in its world role than to suggest that our economic strength at home is a war prosperity."

"When the general speaks of our prosperity as being war-born, who can gain comfort except the Soviets, who shout to the world that we have undertaken our defense program, not to insure peace, but to prevent a depression at home by waging war abroad?" the Illinois governor demanded. He added:

"We expect this kind of talk from irresponsibles and isolationists, but not from a man who was formerly looked upon as an understanding leader in world affairs."

Stevenson contended that "our high standard of living has been maintained since the Korean outbreak, not because of the defense program but in spite of it."

"It has been maintained for the simple reason that our great productive power has increased total national output by more than the defense burden has increased," the Democratic nominee said.

Stevenson's prepared Saginaw speech was only a preliminary to a major address he has scheduled tonight in Detroit on all phases of the Communist threat—internal and external. The speech will be televised and radio-cast 10:30 p.m., EST, CBS.

Stevenson said the American economic future is bright, contending that annual outlays for farm and

Oregon Mishaps
Kill Four Hunters

Hunting accidents reported since hunters went out for last Saturday's deer season opening, have claimed the lives of four in Oregon.

Three died while hunting deer and the fourth, a 14-year-old boy, was fatally wounded while hunting squirrels.

He was Richard Sturdevant, 14, who Deputy Sheriff Milo Askay said was accidentally shot by his brother Donald, 15. Askay said Donald had fired his gun at a squirrel and the bullet apparently glanced off a tree and hit Richard in the stomach.

The mishap occurred Sunday on the Philomath farm of the boys' parents, Mr. and Mrs. Archie Sturdevant.

Everett R. Findley, 43, Portland was killed in a fall near Innah in Northeastern Oregon. His hunting companions said he fell from a trail, landing on a ledge 12 feet below. He apparently suffered a broken neck. The mishap occurred Friday.

Sunday, Albert Silveira, 32, of Ceres, Calif., was killed near Medford by a rifle bullet which accidentally was discharged from a 15-year-old boy's gun.

Charles H. Day, 65, Portland, died Sunday of a heart attack suffered while hunting deer in the Klamath Falls area.
