During his long tenure as editor of the News-Review, with which he still is financially connected, Harris was one of the first here to realize that big Northwest mills were in need of new timber territory if they wished to continue operations indefinitely; and to try and interest them in the vast reservoir of fir timber to be found in Douglas county. The hundreds of mills now operating here amply testify that his efforts bore fruit. As congressman, Harris' interest in the lumbering business never has lagged and he has bent every effort towards making his office helpful in furthering the industry's needs.

Since the national presidential convention and recess of Congress, Harris has been at home, visiting the many cities and localities which form his district, re-familiarizing himself with their many problems and needs, the nature of which may require for them congressional attention or that of other government agencies in Washington.

A son, Ernest Ray, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Joel Fenn on Thursday at a Roseburg hospital.

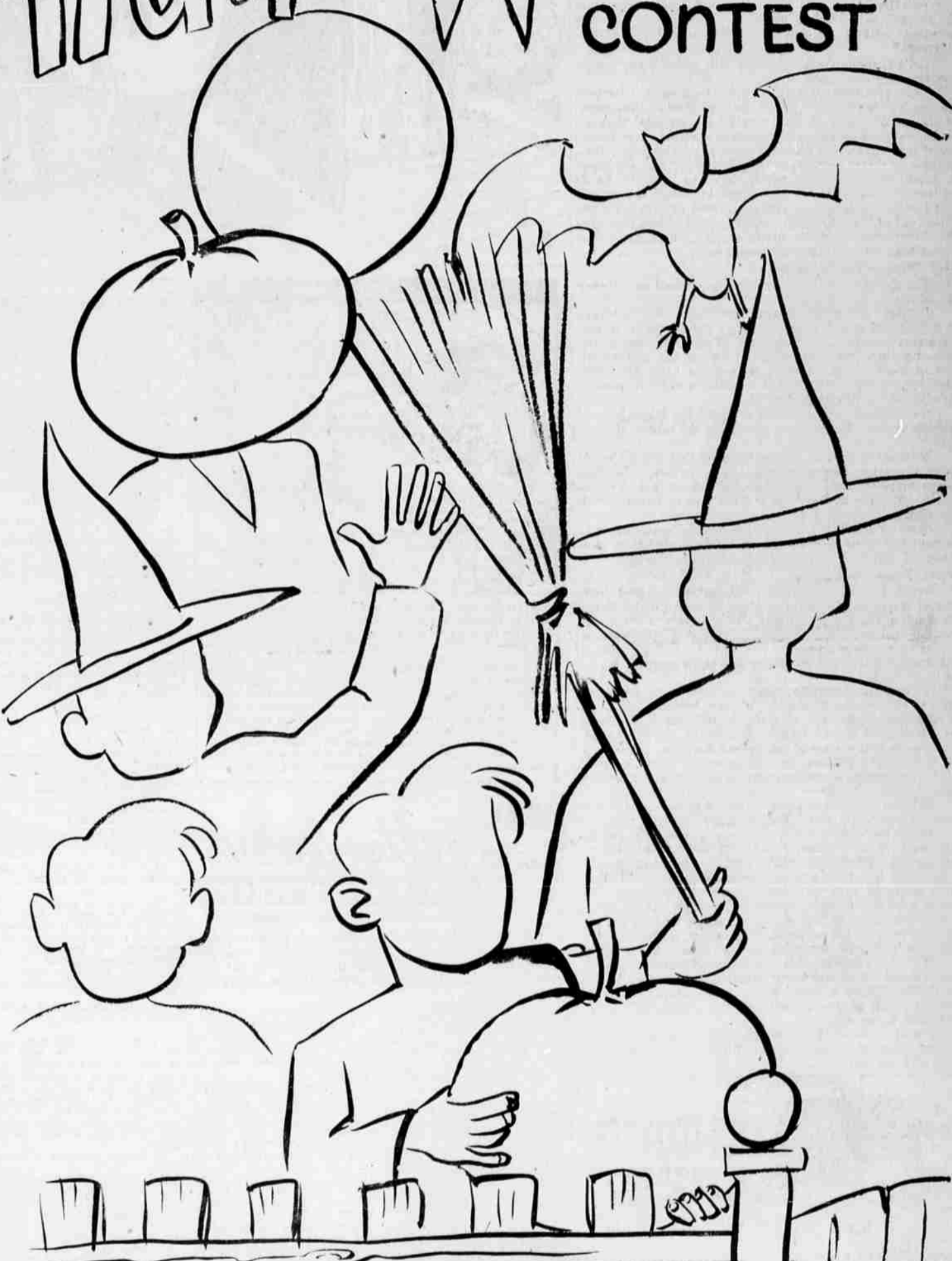
Otto Matthews was retired this week as road patrolman after 28 years' service in this area. William Cooper will be the new patrolman.
