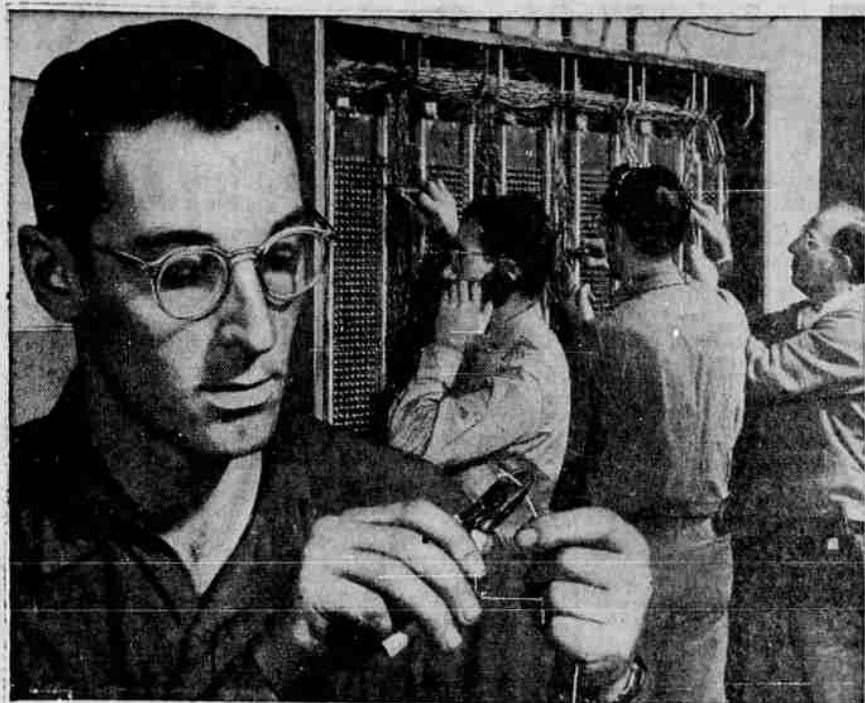

Myrtle Creek Is Considering New Reservoir

Next major improvement in the Myrtle Creek water system will be a new reservoir, the Myrtle Creek city council agreed in a special meeting Thursday night.

Jim Howland, engineer for Cornell Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, who was asked to make a study of the water situation, strongly recommended a new storage tank.

He said that the only ample water supply comes from the South Umpqua River and doesn't recommend further expenditures on springs as a supply source. Howland said present pumping capacity is inadequate.

Cost of a metal reservoir would be about \$40,000 Howland said. A concrete structure would be about \$70,000.

During August, Myrtle Creek residents used 516,000 gallons of water per day. Springs only produce 80 gallons of water per minute in the summer, and the town is using 360 gallons per minute, Howland revealed. In winter, the supply from the springs is adequate.

GI Killed, 2 Daughters Die Few Days Apart

ONTARIO, Calif. (AP) — Mrs. Wilma Jean Dugan, 21, plans a triple funeral next month for her husband Ralph, 28, killed in Korea, and their two daughters, whom he never saw.

The daughters died within 36 hours of their premature birth Sept. 26. Several days later Mrs. Dugan was notified that her husband was killed in Korea Sept. 21.

The news followed a doctor's report that another daughter, Lydia, 18 months, may be suffering from leukemia.

Girl Dies At 22, \$35,000 Party Was Object Of Peps Johnny Ray Court Actions

SEATTLE (AP) — Death at 22, after four operations the past two years, has ended the story of Patricia Hudson, whose mother fought through to the state supreme court and won her claim that the girl need not undergo a serious operation.

Eleven years ago the girl developed an abnormal left arm. Doctors testified then that unless an operation be performed, her health and perhaps her life might be endangered. The mother, Mrs. Nora Hudson, bitterly opposed it, saying the child should decide herself when older.

Juvenile Judge William G. Long ordered the amputation in a case brought by the girl's brothers and sisters.

However, Judge Long insisted his decision be reviewed by the state supreme court and that court finally voted, 6 to 3, against overruling the mother.

"It cannot be gainsaid that the mother loves her child devotedly," the majority decision said.

One of the operations during the past two years did remove the grossly malformed arm.

Marion Davies tossed the gayest Hollywood party in years Thursday night—so gay that even crying Johnny Ray, the guest of honor, spent most of the night laughing.

More than 1,000 of Hollywood's elite flexed their social biceps and drank champagne in the famed film queen's spacious Beverly Hills mansion.

The party cost more than \$35,000, according to an estimate made by one of Miss Davies' aides. The party honored Ray's opening Saturday night at Ciro's nightclub.

TO BUSINESS MEN

Business leaders in Portland City Club carefully studied milk control

This nonpartisan group of over 1,000 citizens, after studying the present Milk Control Law, reported as follows:

"Although considerable argument was presented by various witnesses regarding the necessity of continuing price control at the distributor level, the majority of the committee did not find the distribution and sale of

fluid milk sufficiently unlike the marketing of other food products to justify special treatment. We agreed that price regulation in general is contrary to the American free enterprise system and except where required in the public interest would be avoided. We have found insufficient justification for controlling fluid milk prices at the retail level.

"Nor are a majority of us convinced that the removal of controls at the distributor level would result in monopoly detrimental to the consumer, unfair trade practices detrimental to the retail grocer, or a 'chain reaction' downward pressure on prices detrimental to the producer. Fair trade and anti-trust laws are ample protection against the first two feared evils, and adequate administration of producer control will protect his interest from unfair distributor practices."

Food stores say Vote 332 YES
