

Wisconsin Takes AP Poll 1st Spot

NEW YORK (AP) — The powerful Badgers of the University of Wisconsin took over first place in the weekly Associated Press football poll today by the simple expedient of beating the favorite in the Big Ten Conference.

The favorite in this case was the University of Illinois, which won the Big Ten championship last year and whipped Stanford in the Rose Bowl. The Illini were rated the choice to go on to another title this time around. But the Badgers' 20-6 triumph over the Illini last Saturday made the 138 sports writers and sports casters, who voted in the second poll, sit up and take notice.

They gave Wisconsin 27 first-place ballots and 1,128 points. The Badgers now are big favorites to win the Big Ten championship and make the trip to the Rose Bowl this year.

The first-week leader, Michigan State, was ranked second with 990 points and 24 firsts. California was third with 961 points and 23 firsts.

'Just Got Lucky' Says Yogi Berra

BROOKLYN (AP) — "I just got lucky. I was anything but lucky the other day."

This was Yogi Berra's explanation of his ups and downs in the World Series, considered by some to be the most exciting championship struggle of all.

Yogi, of course, was referring to his two personal highlights of the series.

He was "lucky" to hit the home run Monday that tied the score at 1-1 and led to the Yankees' 3-2 triumph over Brooklyn. He was "unlucky" last Friday when he was charged with a passed ball that led to two Dodgers runs and cost the Yankees a 5-3 defeat.

"Shucks," he said, "it's just the breaks of the game. It didn't bother me much when you fellows described me as the goat of the series. What for? I missed the ball, that's all. What should I have done? Commit suicide?"

"So today I hit a home run. Does that make me a hero? Heck, no! That's what I'm paid to do, ain't it? Besides, it looks like everybody is hitting home runs."

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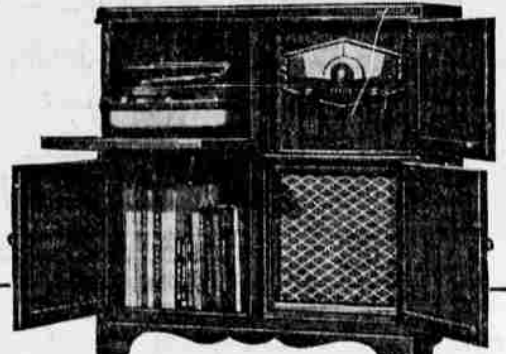
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2 Fire Perfects In Practice Shoot

Boxing Fatality 2nd In Two Days

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Referee Ashton Donze collapsed and died during a feature fight Monday night to become the second New Orleans boxing fatality in less than two days.

The 50-year-old referee fell to the canvas seconds before the end of the sixth round between welterweights Ross Virgo of Rochester, N. Y., and Jack O'Brien of Hartford, Conn.

Jimmy (Bud) Taylor, a promising Negro middleweight from Miami, Fla., died Sunday of brain injuries received in his fight Friday against Charley Joseph in the same ring.

Dr. N. K. Edrington, Louisiana State boxing commission physician, went to Donze's aid after he collapsed.

Announcer Duke Durel told the spectators the boxing commission had called the fight a draw. He asked them to leave the coliseum.

Harry Matthews May Set Bout For London

SEATTLE (AP) — Harry "Kid" Matthews, whom Rocky Marciano hurled into a title fight with Joe Walcott, may trek to London next month for a bout with one of three possible opponents.

Matthews' manager, Jack Hurley, said today his veteran heavyweight had been offered a November 18 headline bout in the British capital and "will accept if the terms are right."

Hurley said Jack Solomons, London promoter, offered Johnny Williams, Don Cockell or Yolande Pompee as a list of possible opponents.

Matthews probably would have one fight in the States as a tune-up before sailing, Hurley said. The manager said he was now dickering with Solomons' representatives in New York on terms for the fight.

Calif. Teams Invade OSC, UO Saturday

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — California's power-packed Bears and dark horse Indians from Stanford, both undefeated in three starts, take on Pacific Coast Conference football foes Saturday.

Stanford, which squeaked past Michigan, 14-7, meets the surprising Oregon State Beavers at Palo Alto. The Bears, flush from a 49-13 rout of Minnesota, play Oregon's Ducks at Portland.

California, which moved up from fourth to third in the Associated Press weekly poll of the nation's top teams, rules a heavy favorite. Although his Bears also hold lopsided wins over Missouri and College of Pacific, Coach Lynn Waldorf still isn't certain he's got the makings of a Rose Bowl squad.

"I don't know yet whether we have a strong team," the portly Waldorf told the football writers' weekly luncheon Monday.

"We have a good offensive club. But unless my standards are too high, I honestly can't call California a good team right now."

Waldorf, who never underestimates his opponents, commented he expects a tough game with Oregon, which barely upended Idaho 20-14.

"We might find more of a problem than many are inclined to think," the Bear coach declared. "Oregon gave a fine defensive exhibition against UCLA and led that team 6-0 at the half."

Stanford Coach Chuck Taylor said Oregon State "doesn't have much depth or many veterans, but they're of a frame of mind to up-set some people before this season is finished."

"We will have to arise to the occasion. We will have to stop trying to give the game away—or one of these days someone is going to take it."

Taylor obviously was referring to his team's seven fumbles in the Michigan game and 21 in three games.

Oregon State almost pulled the upset of the season, losing in the final seconds 17-14 to Michigan Saturday, which dropped from No. 1 to second in the Associated Press poll.

John Eggers, advance man for Oregon State, said the Beavers, if they play the way they did against the Spartans, will trip Stanford.

Eggers singled out quarterback Jim Winthorpe and fullback Sam Baker as outstanding.

Oregon Ready to Pass Attack

Coach Len Casanova and his Oregon Webfoots have their work cut out for them this weekend when they tangle with the powerful University of California Bears at Portland's Multnomah Stadium.

Led by All-American fullback candidate, Johnny Olszewski, the Golden Bears can field a big, fast club loaded with offensive punch. Olszewski, a hard-driving back who can run through, over and around enemy defenders like they weren't even there, is the lad that makes the Cal's explosive T-attack click.

Olszewski has plenty of capable assistance from Bill Powell, a fast-stepping halfback, and Billy Mals, clever Bear quarterback. Mals is primarily known as a top ball handler but can also throw the ball when the need arises.

California is ranked seventh in the nation in rushing offense, at this writing, with a nifty 337 yards-per-game average. In individual rushing Olszewski is 5th with 215 yards per game.

Oregon is faced with the task of getting its passing attack working against the big California line. Ralph Krueger and Bob Karpe, a pair of 225-pound tackles, are both fast for their size and rated among the best charging tackles in the country.

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UO's Tom Elliott Will Sit On Sidelines

Plenty League Action Set For Weekend In County

Mid-season finds Douglas County football engrossed in plenty of league and district action this weekend.

Probably the biggest uphill battle of the week, and the year, is the District 5-A-1 contest scheduled for Roseburg Friday night at 8. This one pits the Indians against the state's top-ranking prep squad, the Marshfield Pirates.

On a comparative basis, the Indians won't have much to offer. While the Pirates have romped over four opponents, the Indians have split their first four games. The locals lost their first two without much effort to Eugene and Klamath Falls, and came back to conquer two A-2 opponents, Myrtle Point and Coquille.

Both Slaughtered Myrtle Point. The only common opponent was Myrtle Point, which Marshfield slaughtered 76-0, and Roseburg massacred, 40-0. It's a habit against the hopelessly weak Bobcats, however, North Bend racked up a 55-0 victory over the same squad last weekend.

In the County A-2 circles, both Myrtle Creek and Sutherlin are still searching for their first victories. The Bulldogs stand the best chance of breaking into the win column this weekend. Although the game site is still unsettled, it is tentatively a home tilt against neighboring Oakland. Coach Ralph Dyson's Bulldogs have lost four decisive games this year. If scores against common opponents mean anything, it should be a close tilt. Both teams lost decisively to Bandon.

Meanwhile, Myrtle Creek's Vikings meet Defending JDL League Champion Crater High Saturday. The Central Pointers are again on top this year in League play and will reign as heavy favorites when they trot out the Myrtle Creek field to tangle with the three-beat Vikings.

Glendale Looks For Win Thursday. Glendale's newly-inaugurated eleven-man squad moves to Sutherlin to take on the Bulldog Junior Varsity. The Pirates are also still working for a win this season, but they are in the formative stages since this is the first year of eleven-man ball for them.

Douglas County's most successful, and only undefeated eleven-man team, gets its stiffest test of the year Friday night. The Drain Warriors, with four wins under their belts, host an undefeated squad from Bandon in a District

5-A-1 tilt. This is definitely the game of the week, since the winner of this one is almost certain to move on to the District championship.

Six-man football goes into its third round with two evenly matched battles at Canyonville and Riddle. Glide's giant-killing wildcats move to Canyonville, and Yoncalla invades Riddle. The third game unveils the strength of Elkton's Elks at Days Creek.

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Today Tells Story In World Series

BROOKLYN (AP) — Two beautifully matched, equally gifted ball clubs come down to the wire in the seventh game of the World Series at Ebbets Field today, and it is a real chore to try to choose between them.

For six games the Brooklyn Dodgers and the New York Yankees have fought on even terms. The Yankees, who were almost prohibitive favorites to win their fourth straight world championship with five or six games, finally found this match in Manager Charlie Dressen's comeback kids.

If there was any clue as to today's probable winner, it possibly lay in the fact that the Dodgers had won the odd game all the way. They had led 1-0, 2-1 and 3-2 before succumbing for the second time to smokesheller Vic Raschi by 3 to 2 in yesterday's thriller. Today the odd game came up again.

Black Anxious. Also, there was the pleasant circumstance for the embattled National Leaguers that their great Negro rookie, Joe Black, was ready and anxious to get at the Yankees again after two days of rest. The Bombers could not say quite the same for their ace, Allie Reynolds, who came in to fire 22 pitches and save yesterday's tussle for Vic Raschi.

Except for a brief warmup late in Sunday's fifth game, when it looked as though his stablemate, Carl Erskine, might require some help, Black had not thrown a ball since his losing duel with Reynolds on Saturday, when the Chief hit the Dodgers with a four-hit

Yesterday, Black sat in the dug-out while Duke Snider took on the Yankees single-handed, blasting two homers. The first came in the top of the sixth in the tense turkey shoot between Billy Loes and Raschi.

That put the Brooks ahead 1-0. Going into the seventh, they needed to retire only nine more Yankee batters to win the first world title in their noble history.

Expected Replacement. This observer, for one, expected to see Black vault from the dug-out. During the regular season, the ace reliever had virtually proved that no ball club could score on him in three innings.
