Gen. Krueger's Daughter Faces Murder Charge
TOKYO (AP)—Mrs. Dorothy Smith, daughter of Gen. Walter Krueger, has been charged with murder in the fatal stabbing Saturday of her husband, Col. Aubrey D. Smith, Gen. Mark Clark's headquarters announced tonight.
The attractive woman, mother of two children, is held under observation in a Tokyo Army hospital.

Colonel's Death Is Laid To Wife

TOKYO, Sunday, Oct. 5 (AP)—Col. Aubrey D. Smith, 45, chief of the Far East Command's plans and operations supply section, died Saturday of a knife wound which Gen. Mark Clark's headquarters said was "allegedly inflicted by his wife, Mrs. Dorothy Smith."
Mrs. Smith is identified by Who's Who in America as the daughter of Gen. Walter Krueger, retired, famous World War II commander of the U. S. Sixth Army.

Smith was a resident of San Antonio, Tex. Rated as an officer with a brilliant future ahead of him, his death rocked army circles here.
The Army announcement said the colonel's wife, is being held for observation at the 816th Station hospital in Tokyo.

5 Accused Communists To Be Arraigned Monday

SEATTLE (AP)—Five of seven persons described by the FBI as leaders in Communist activities in the Pacific Northwest, are scheduled for arraignment here Monday.

However, their attorneys served notice in Federal Court Friday they would seek continuance of the arraignment so that two defendants arrested in the East could be consulted. Attorneys said they also wish to investigate the manner in which the grand jury which brought the indictments was selected.

The seven are charged with conspiring to advocate the overthrow of the U. S. government. They are John Shields Daschbach, William J. Pennock, Barbara Hartle, Henry P. Huff and Katy Larsen. Terry Pettus and Paul M. Bowen, are being held in Minneapolis and Chicago, respectively.

RUSSIA GETS CHINESE SILK
TOKYO (AP)—Peiping radio says 80 per cent of Eastern China's raw and processed silk is being exported to Soviet Russia and her satellites.
The broadcast said 70 per cent of the tea is going the same way as the silk.

Two Presidential Candidates Said In Good Health

CHICAGO (AP)—Gen Dwight D. Eisenhower and Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, their physicians said today, are in good health.
The physical condition of the Republican and Democratic presidential nominees was described by the physicians in reply to a series of questions about their medical records. The questions were submitted by a national magazine and NEA service.

Dr. Emmet F. Pearson of Springfield, Ill., Stevenson's physician, said the governor is in sound health and enjoys "excellent nervous and emotional stability." He said regular checkups have revealed no chronic ailments.

Eisenhower's physician, who was not identified, reported the 61-year-old general was in "good health."
The replies by the physicians disclosed both presidential candidates have to watch their diet because of a tendency of overweight.

Dr. Pearson said that Stevenson, who is 52 and weighs 185 pounds, keeps from becoming overweight by voluntarily restricting fattening foods in his diet. Since he was 25, Stevenson has gained about 15 pounds.

Eisenhower's physician reported that the general has an excellent appetite but watches his diet.
Eisenhower's favorite outdoor recreation is golf.
Stevenson plays tennis. Dr. Pearson says the governor is "physically fit to play several sets of tennis without strain."

In some specific answers given about Eisenhower, his physician said: "No abnormalities are noted in his heart or chest. He has no allergies and no serious deviations from normal in blood chemistry and urinalysis."
"He wears glasses to correct far sightedness. His hearing and teeth are good. He had the usual childhood diseases but no serious ailments in recent years."

Dr. Pearson said Stevenson underwent an operation last June for a kidney stone extraction but there have been no recurring symptoms.
Stevenson, Dr. Pearson says, is "very fond" of salads, vegetables, fruits and milk. He eats meats "about once daily, limits butter, fried foods, pastries. Usual caloric consumption estimated at 1,700 calories."

State Treasurer's Wife Withdraws Divorce Suit
PORTLAND (AP)—Mrs. Walter J. Pearson has dropped her divorce action, her attorney said Tuesday.
Mrs. Pearson, wife of Oregon's state treasurer, filed suit in August alleging cruel and inhuman treatment.

Earl Bernard, her attorney, in reporting withdrawal of the suit said he did not know whether a reconciliation had been effected.

Progressive Candidate Challenges Ike, Adlai

NEW YORK (AP)—Vincent Hallinan, Progressive party candidate for president, has invited GOP presidential nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower and Democratic standard-bearer Adlai Stevenson to a public television debate on Korea.
Hallinan, speaking last night at a Brooklyn rally, said neither Eisenhower nor Stevenson had any definite plan for ending the conflict in Korea, whereas he himself is "the only candidate... who is calling for an immediate cease fire."

A California attorney, Hallinan was nominated by his party while serving a jail term for contempt growing out of his defense of West Coast labor leader Harry Bridges.

Alaska Governor, 2 Other Officials File Libel Suit

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP)—Three lawsuits totaling \$300,000 were filed against the Empire Printing Company, publishers of the daily Alaska Empire, of Juneau, Wednesday by Governor Ernest Gruening and the other two members of the territorial board of Road Commissioners.

Joining with Gruening in the demand for \$100,000 damages each were territorial Treasurer Henry Roden and Highway Engineer Frank Metcalf.

They allege they were "brought into great public disgrace and greatly injured" in their name and credit by a news story in the Sept. 25 edition of the Empire.

The story said the territorial auditor had disclosed that receipts from operation of the territory-owned ferry Chilkoot had been placed in a special bank account by the board instead of the general fund of Alaska.

Headlines over the story were libelous, the trio charged, and were "false, malicious and defamatory" and conveyed the meaning that the "plaintiffs had corruptly converted moneys belonging to the territory to their own use and benefit."

The Empire published a later page item stating specifically that its story did not imply any misuse of territorial money by the individuals.

One of the headlines cited in the complaints was: "Gruening, Metcalf, Roden Divert Chilkoot Cash to Private Bank Account."
The other headline involved charges leveled by Bob Reeve, Republican candidate for delegate to Congress.

S. Koreans, Not U.S., Should Do Fighting -- Ike

BOARD EISENHOWER SPEAKING (AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower declared Thursday there is "no sense" in the United States bearing the brunt of the Korean war when the South Koreans could be trained to defend themselves.

Bringing his presidential campaign into Illinois, the GOP candidate told a cheering throng at Champaign the first thing that should be done in Korea is to train the South Koreans.

Then he said: "There is no sense in the United Nations, with America bearing the brunt of the thing, being constantly compelled to man those front lines. That is a job for the Koreans."

"We do not want Asia to feel that the white man of the west is his enemy. If there must be a war there, let it be Asians against Asians, with our support on the side of freedom."

The general said the first two world wars and the Korean war might "easily have been avoided," had there been greater precautions taken to strengthen the United States militarily.

The Eisenhower drive into the backyard of his Democratic opponent—Gov. Adlai Stevenson—got off to the same crowd-pulling start that marked his moves through Michigan Wednesday.

At Decatur, Ill., a densely packed crowd jammed the streets.
A crowd estimated by police at 20,000 turned out at Champaign to greet Eisenhower.

Maine Banker Admits Taking \$158,000 Funds

FREEMONT, Me. (AP)—An \$85 a week Freemont bank manager described by fellow townsmen as one of the most respected members of his community, has admitted embezzling "at least \$158,000" in bank funds, a U. S. attorney said Saturday.

Sewall Parker Foss, 67, a veteran of both world wars and a former army colonel, was arrested on a charge of making false entries and embezzlement.

U. S. Atty. Alton A. Lessard said Foss acknowledged that he took the money from the Freemont branch of the Lewiston Trust Company, which he has managed since it opened in 1932.

Arraigned before a U. S. commissioner at Portland Saturday, the white haired banker pleaded innocent, paused, and added "at this time."
Foss was jailed in Portland after failing to provide \$25,000 bail. Lessard said Foss told investigators he took the money by juggling accounts over a period of many years.

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP)—Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.) told a Democratic rally Friday night that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's "surrender to Sen. Taft has been complete and becomes more pronounced with every day."

The Illinois senator said "Eisenhower meekly signed on the dotted line and agreed that he thought just like Sen. Taft on domestic issues and that there were only differences of degree between them on matters of foreign policy."

Douglas said he had a "personal affection" for the Republican presidential candidate even though the general "got into bad company."

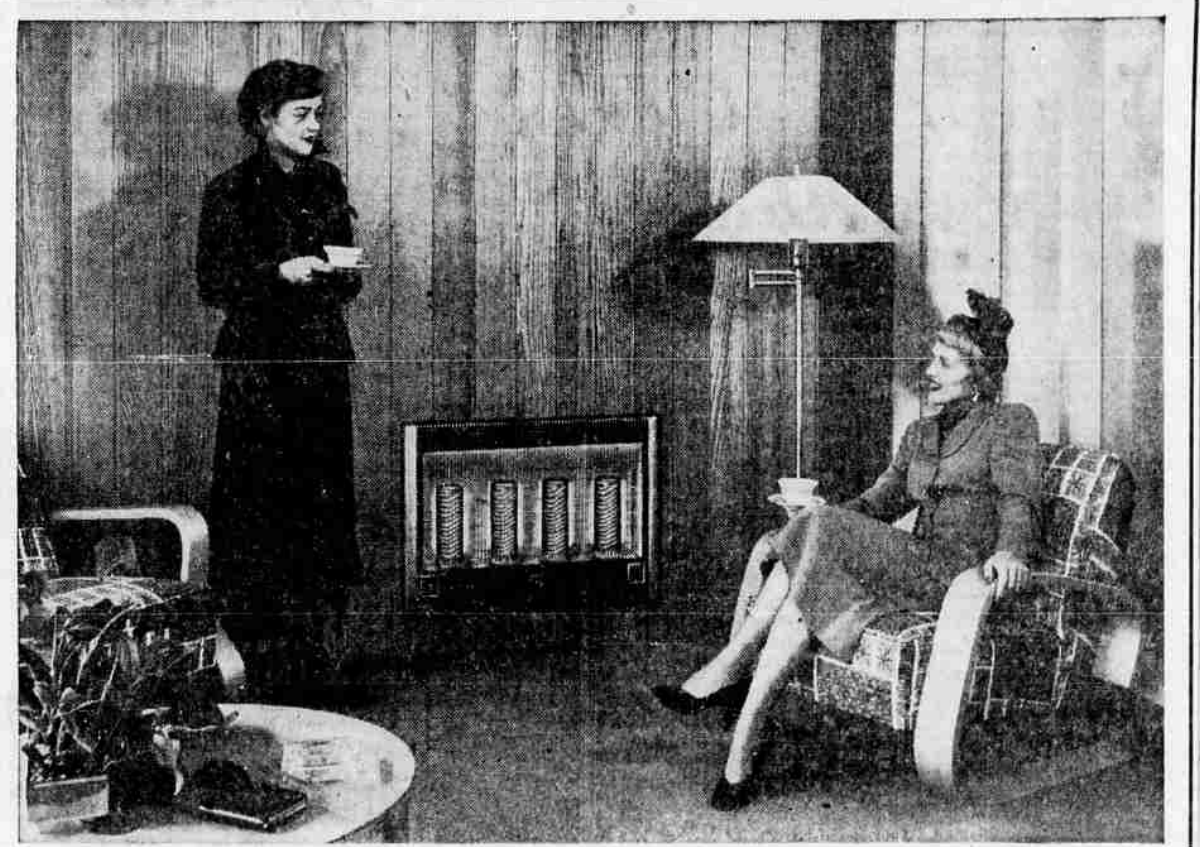
