

Hitter, Elves Help Yanks

NEW YORK (AP)—Two main conclusions may be drawn from the World Series which ended yesterday with Brooklyn again in mourning for the sixth time.

The first is that Mickey Mantle, a 20-year-old from Oklahoma, is destined to become recognized with-in a few more seasons as the greatest baseball player in the history of the game. The kid can't miss. There's no defense against him.

The second, equally inescapable, is that Casey Stengel, the benumbed manager of the New York Yankees, gets advance information from the elves before he makes each move.

It would be difficult to prove that he isn't the smartest pilot the game has seen. His coaches are convinced that he is.

Mantle's contributions to his club's 4-2 Series clincher yesterday at Ebbets Field were more spectacular than Stengel's. Every one in the arena saw the "Phenom" clout the home run and the single in successive innings—the first left-handed, the second right-handed—to put victory beyond reach of the Dodgers.

Mantle Killed Us, Brooklyn Men Moan

BROOKLYN (AP)—Moon-faced Johnny Mize grinned: "It's on ice."

The good-natured 39-year-old slugger of the perennial World Champion New York Yankees was massaging his aging feet in the dressing room when Gene Woodling hauled in Peeewe Reese's fly for the final out of the thrilling 1952 World Series.

While the Yanks boisterously celebrated the winning of their fourth straight championship, the vanquished Brooklyn Dodgers were bemoaning the loss of their club's sixth fall classic in as many attempts.

A damp-eyed Jackie Robinson expressed the general opinion of the crestfallen National League standard bearer.

"It was that Mantle, that Mickey Mantle killed us. If it hadn't been for him I think this would have been a very different series."

"We came so close, we had so many opportunities. But Mantle was the difference."

Joe Black, Brooklyn's brilliant rookie right-hander who started three of the games, winning the first and losing two including yesterday's 4-2 clincher, gloomily observed:

"It gnaws at you. It tears you inside. We got so many men on base. We kept saying to ourselves 'this is it,' and then there was that let down."

"It would have been better if we'd had our brains knocked out, lost 10-0."

"We would have felt better about it."

Series Players Cut 16 Records

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Yankees and the Brooklyn Dodgers broke 16 records and tied 17 others in the 1952 World Series. Four of the new marks were set by individuals, while 12 were team records.

Duke Snider of the Dodgers was the outstanding individual batting performer of the series, establishing new records in total bases and extra bases on long hits and equaling four others in runs batted in, home runs, two home runs in a game and long hits.

The Yankees, who won their fourth straight championship, were responsible for nine new team marks and two joint records with Brooklyn.

Holding Crabtree Job For Indians

Stopping sensational Tom Crabtree is one of the man-killing jobs out for the Roseburg Indians when they host the Marshfield Pirates in a District 5-A-1 football game on Finlay Field Friday night.

Marshfield's greatest athlete has been budding since his sophomore year and now has reached full flower. Putting a stopper on him would be a major step in slowing down the vaunted Pirate ground attack. But a job of that proportion is like capping a volcano.

The free-wheeling 185-pound halfback has racked up over a fourth of Marshfield's ground yards in at least three of its four games this year. He heralded the coming season against Myrtle Point when he rambled 108 yards in four tries. That adds up to a 27-yard-per-carry average. Then, against Cottage Grove, he rambled 127 yards in 15 carries for a 9.1-yard average. Last week he bulled to almost two-thirds of the Marshfield ground gains with 204 yards in 28 carries.

The Percheron of the Pirates will definitely get plenty of attention from the Reder-guided Indians, but only limited concentration can be drawn by him. The fire can break out from any angle. Crabtree's wingmate, Stan Lewis, has averaged as high as 10 yards per carry a game. Full-back Spike Hillstrom has chalked off over seven yards per carry. And Quarterback Quincy Powers is a better than average passer and field general.

Of course, with a fast, hard-charging line averaging over 170 pounds, the combination is tough to stop.

According to Freshman Coaches Bob Shrubert and Bob Oliver who scouted the Marshfield-Springfield game, the Pirates "have no apparent weaknesses except, perhaps, pass defense."

Coach Reder has been running his charges through defenses to "slow down" the Marshfield power and running plays. But emphasis the rest of the week will be on pass offense. Scrimmages today will be devoted to passing defense and offense. Springfield found its greatest success in holding the Pirates to a 20-14 victory by striking for 123 yards through the air. Except for Halfback Larry Fitz-

gerald, the Indians should be at full strength this weekend. Line-man LeRoy Wehde, Don Clark and John Michaels reported back for practices this week after nursing injuries. But Fitzgerald still has blood poisoning in his hand from an injury suffered last week.
