Three Douglas Cities Planning New Charters

A movement toward adoption of new city charters is sweeping Douglas County communities.

The latest town to set a date for election for a new charter is Oakland. The city has set Oct. 24 for the vote, to replace their ancient charter, first adopted in 1879. Oakland City Attorney Carl Felker said the old document is superseded by state laws.

The charters, patterned after model charters provided by the League of Oregon Cities, are also being considered by Drain and Myrtle Creek.

No action other than planning by a committee has yet been taken by Drain city officials. Myrtle Creek will consider its charter at a meeting next Tuesday.

Sutherland adopted a new charter, which provides for the council-manager government, several months ago.

The proposed Oakland charter provides for mayor-council government.

Atomic Energy Study Has Copco Co-Operation

The California Oregon Power Company is joining in a study to determine feasibility of using atomic energy for the production of electric power.

A. S. Cummins, Copco president, reports that the Atomic Energy Commission has accepted a proposal by Pioneer Service and Engineering Co. of Chicago, and the Foster Wheeler Corporation of New York, to conduct engineering studies to determine design, construction and operation of a reactor, together with economic and technical aspects of the project.

Studies also will be made in an effort to measure the amount of research and development work before a reactor project could be undertaken by private enterprise. Cummins states that Copco is contributing to the cost of the studies through Pioneer Service and Engineering Co., its consulting and design engineers.

Tenth-Year Reappraisal Of Federal Lands Made

A report on reappraisal of federal Coos Bay Wagon Road lands was made Wednesday, according to Al DeVoe, head of the Forest Appraisal Department.

Meeting in Roseburg Wednesday were Coos County Judge James Harrison, T. G. Taylor, both members of the Coos Bay Wagon Road Committee; William Sangela, of the Bureau of Land Management; Deputy County Assessor Morris Bowker, Douglas County Judge Carl C. Hill and DeVoe.

Douglas County receives some \$3,000 annually in property taxes from the federal government on some 15,000 acres of scattered lands between Lookingglass and the Coos-Douglas line.

The lands are reappraised each 10 years. Some 60,000 acres of the lands are situated in Coos County.

Author Branded 'Red' Faces Likely Eviction

LOS ANGELES — Reuben Ship, who wrote the "Life of Riley" radio show for seven years, may be deported to his native Canada under the McCarran Act.

He was named by two witnesses who testified before the House Un-American Activities Committee here last week. They identified him as a member of a Communist radio workers' cell in Hollywood.

Ship refused to answer questions before the House Un-American Activities Committee here a year ago. He did tell the committee that he came to the United States in 1944 but never became a citizen, but he declined to say whether he had ever been a member of the Communist party.

Immigration officers booked him at the county jail yesterday. He was released late on \$5,000 bond.

William Bolman, Sutherlin City Manager and William Riddleburg, superintendent of Sutherlin Schools, were guests.

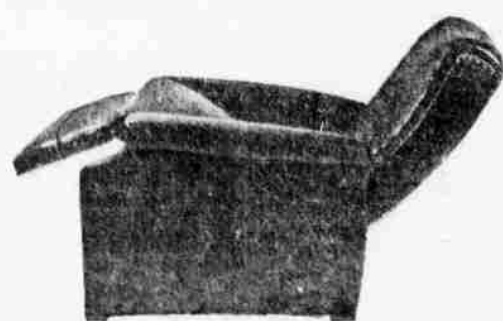
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
