Peace Gains Threatened By GOP, Stevenson Says

assistance programs the Kemlin can change its signals quickly.

"We all know in our bones that it is dangerous to talk tough unless we are ready to act tough," he declared. "The new Republican policy—and I am sorry to say this—is to talk tough while we simultaneously weaken our defenses and alliances.

"That just doesn't make sense to me. That is a sure road to disaster."

Stevenson has contended that Eisenhower's call for a 20 billion dollar budget cut would mean a slash in defense funds.

Volleyed At Old Guard
 Accusing the Republicans of trying to scrap the bi-partisan foreign policy, he sailed into Eisenhower on this point.

"What the campaign has clearly brought out is that the Old Guard of the Republican party wants to scrap that bi-partisan foreign policy—and that their candidate with the new look, the General of the army, has either forsaken his own treat past or become the policy partner of Sen. Taft and some enemies of similarly eccentric views about our world," the Democratic nominee declared.

"Senator Taft and the Old Guard, of course, have fought our bi-partisan foreign policy right along. They have said that it costs too much, forgetting that however expensive peace may be, it will cost as nothing, compared to a new world war."

On the other hand, Stevenson said he thinks the Democratic administration's policies have been "mightily successful."

"They have rallied and united the free world and have checked the spread of Communism," he declared. "If we stick with these policies, I deeply believe we shall avert a third world war."

Grated By Big Crowds
 St. Louis gave the Illinois governor a whopping send-off at a night meeting where Police Chief Jeremiah O'Connell estimated 13,000 persons crowded into a 10,800 seat hall, 3,500 more sat in an adjoining auditorium and 3,500 heard his address outside the hall.

This total compared with 11,500 who assembled in the same auditorium recently to hear Eisenhower and "several thousand" which police said were turned away when the doors were closed.

Despite the fact that his talk obviously was aimed at the larger television and radio audience and, in his own words was "not a pouring speech," the crowd interrupted the Democratic nominee with applause 38 times. Some even rang cowbells.

Opportunities For Douglas Jobs Show Decrease

Job opportunities in Douglas County as of Oct. 1 were fewer in number than at any time since last March, reports George Foster, manager of the Roseburg office of the Oregon State Employment Service.

Closing of the woods during the latter part of September, because of the fire hazard, resulted in a large drop in employment, Foster states. Some woods workers were absorbed in sawmill and other types of work, but others will be unemployed until rains reduce logging hazards.

Foster reports 87 job openings on hand at the first of the month, with approximately 42 per cent in trade and service classifications. Shortages also existed in skilled and clerical occupations.

Claims for unemployment insurance benefits increased over the month of August. These claims resulted directly from closure of the woods.

The Service is observing National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week. A local committee is at work on the program, endeavoring to match abilities of ready and willing handicapped workers with suitable jobs.

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the banquet room 60X60 feet in dimension.

A new basement entrance will be constructed on the north side. Complete air conditioning for the basement will be installed.

Ramberg stated that Norman Hoffman, Portland architect, has been employed to design the remodeling and to draft plans and specifications. He will advertise for bids as soon as exact plans have been approved by the hotel management. This is expected very shortly.

The stairway in the main lobby is already being changed, to make way for extension of the offices. The civic room will not be changed, and will continue to be used for civic club meeting purposes, as it is already large enough for such use, said Ramberg.

The hotel kitchen is to be reduced in size, but modernized for more efficient use. This will permit enlargement of the coffee shop westward. After this portion of the work is completed, the front of the hotel is to be altered and a third banquet room will be provided along the east portion of the coffee shop.

The entire front of the hotel will be given a face lifting, with alteration of the hotel entrance. The lobby is also to be renovated.

The construction plans, said Ramberg, will be carried out a bit slower than it could otherwise be done, so as to cause as little as possible confusion to the normal operation of the hotel.

Ramberg, who took over ownership of the hotel last May from J. A. Harding, expressed faith in Roseburg's future business prospects. He said this city is the hub of this part of Oregon, and because of its central location can attract large gatherings and conventions.

Ramberg has purchased a home at 1228 Madrone Ave., and recently moved with his family from their quarters in the hotel.
